ST. LOUIS FLYERS ORDERED DOWN TODAY

EAST SWEETERS IN FIERCE HEAT; SEVERAL DEAD

Temperatures and humidity combine to cause much suffering. SEVERAL DROWNINGS ARE ALSO REPORTED.

Weather Bureau Announces Lower Temperatures in Middle West.

NEW YORK, July 29 (UP)—Thunder showers brought partial relief to a parched countryside last night but had little effect on the heat wave which enveloped the entire east. The forecast for today is fair and "not quite so warm."

Many Irritations. Three deaths and 11 prostrations are reported to have been attributed to the heat, and five drownings were reported in the metropolitan area.

The maximum temperature here was 91; Washington and Albany, N. Y., reported high marks of 93; Denver, Boston, St. Philadelphia, St. Pittsburgh and Portland, Ore., 92.

Two fatal deaths were reported from Philadelphia.

Cooler in Middle West. The weather bureau announced a change to cooler in the west but in all other sections of the United States, except the northwest, it is "not much cooler."

The precipitation of .02 of an inch at St. Louis, Mo., and .01 at St. Paul, Minn., was reported.

During the storm a crowd of about 200 people gathered for lighting and 25 persons were hurt in the rush for the rear exit during the storm when a row of chairs containing six men collapsed in the East river, off Flushing.

MISSOULA, Mont., July 29 (UP)—Urgent calls for volunteer fighters have been broadcast to every large town and city in Montana as western winds continued to whip forest fires and drive them through the Missoula River flood and Lake National forest.

Missoula resembled a war zone, with flames visible from the streets of the city. The fires are being fought by the local fire department and volunteer fighters.

The need for fresh material in becoming urgent. Forest officials announced in Missoula a general call for more men.

Fighters were reported having difficulty controlling a large fire running rampant in the Blackfoot country. Fires in the latter forest were spreading but were being kept under control.

Smoke from the fires, heavy over Missoula and flames can be seen from the streets of the town at night.

WASHINGTON, July 29 (UP)—Army aviation may bear a cut in expenditures of the war department under the new fiscal economy project, it was indicated here today.

Secretary of War Good and general staff officers who have surveyed the situation found that the army's aviation budget for 1930 is \$100,000,000. Navy aviation is \$100,000,000.

Defends Reserve Activities. Secretary Good recently went on record in defense of the reserve activities, including those of the national guard, U. S. M. T. and U. S. A. C. He stated that these activities are essential for the defense of the country.

Remaining possibilities of drastic reduction include delay in making new equipment, reduction of military activities, and reduction of military activities at interior posts which are now of little strategic importance.

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Men of Science Study Sun Spot of Great Power

Enough to Cause Storm on the Earth.

SPOT CAUSED BY HOT GAS MASSES ON SUN.

Brilliant Electrical Displays Are Seen in Some Localities.

PASADENA, Cal., July 29 (UP)—A sun spot, "large enough to cause a storm on earth," is under observation at the Mount Wilson observatory, it became known here today.

Brilliant Displays. During the past week, according to the Mount Wilson observatory, the sun spot has been observed with the aid of powerful telescopes and cameras.

The present spot, it was said, is only one of the many sun spots which appear on the sun's surface.

It was explained that the spots are caused by masses of hot gases coming up from the sun's interior, creating rapidly white stars in the surface. The cooling at the surface of the sun results in black spots which are visible to astronomers.

Spot Under Observation. The spot now under observation is about 100,000 miles in diameter. It is located in the southern part of the sun's equator.

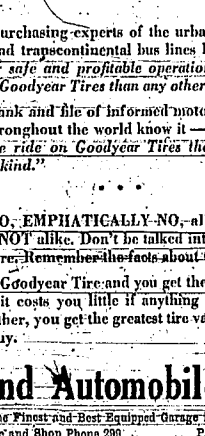

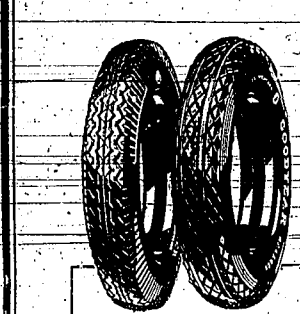

EXPERTS TERM RADIO STILL IN ITS CHILDHOOD

WASHINGTON, (UP)—The art, though three decades have passed since its birth, is still in swaddling clothes, radio technicians here declare as they foretell the wonders of television, facsimile transmission, and the refinement of transmitting equipment. In a prediction compatible with greatly narrowed channels for point to point communication.

"Although developments in the field may bring new experimental equipment to the point of communication, the improvement of point to point communication and facsimile transmission matters on which commercial interests are centering their attention.

"Although the Federal Radio Commission now divides the commercial radio spectrum into some 100 channels, it will be necessary to the next international radio conference at the Hague next September that a further division, according to approximately 2,500 channels for domestic service.

"At present the separation between short-wave channels is two inches of one percent. The Commission will recommend and it envisages a further reduction to one inch, or one percent of one percent.

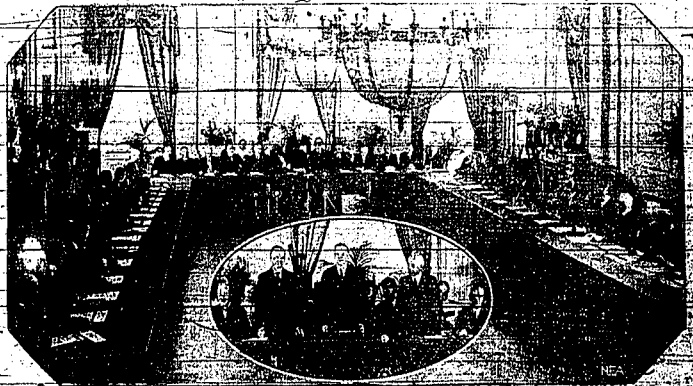

HERE'S A NEW WRINKLE—THE "SUNSHINE CHORUS"



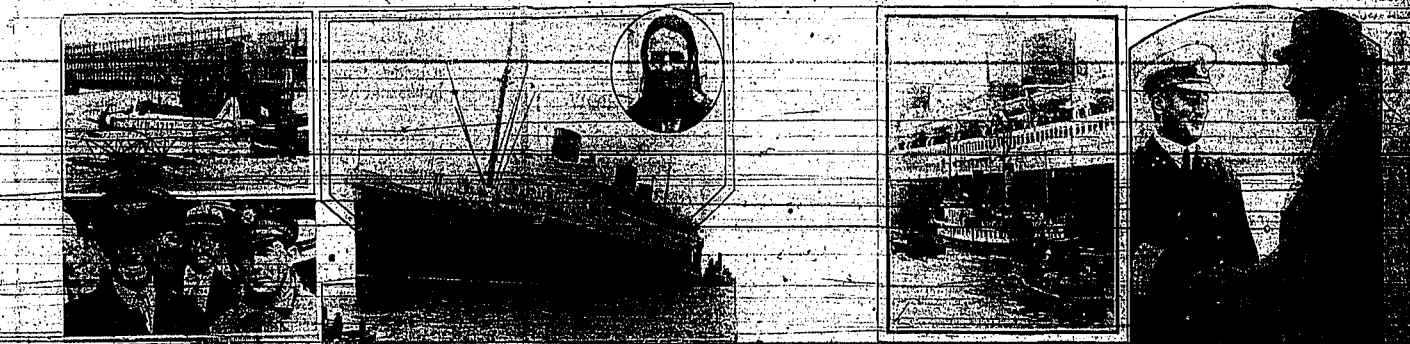
