Cleveland, Aug. 1 (UPI)— The interval since early in June has brought an extraordinary improvement in the economic position of the American farmer. During this period the price of wheat, the ratio of crop to grain, has increased by more than \$1,500,000,000. This enhancement of grain only has brightened the outlook for agriculture, but it has lent considerable prestige to the business world as well.

Two months ago grain prices were already depressed and gloom pervaded the agricultural market. Now, however, the situation has been so greatly relieved that the farm economy is no longer considered a dead weight on the business world.

The American wheat crop, estimated at 100,000,000 bushels last year, is up to 110,000,000 this year.


