DEPIILING BEAUTY

A SHORT distance north of Twin Falls is a beautiful bridge that spans the Snake river canyon.

The bridge itself has enough of beauty to make it harmonize with the majesty of the scenery that Nature affords in the canyon of the river.

Thousands of persons visit the bridge every year. Not only is it the highest traffic bridge in the world-but it also spans one of the most interesting rivers in the world.

It is eminently worth seeing, and few who go to catch a view of it-and of the high canyon walls-and the body of the river try to get away without spending an hour of their time.

Such attractions as the bridge have a real value to a community. It would be natural to take it for granted that no citizen in the community would do any thoughtless act that would impair the beauty either of the bridge itself or of the rugged scenery that attends the bridge.

Such an inference is unfortunately untrue.

Garbage, trash and waste are, or very recently have been, dumped over the canyon wall not far from the bridge. A stench has been raised by such activities, and the beauty of the spot marred.

Visitors notice such defects and are quick to resent them.

The reflections cast are borne by the community because the spot is one of community interest. The community should see to it that the practice of defiling a beauty spot of scenic interest is stopped.

HUNTING KILLERS

IN FACE of the fact that far too great a percentage of murderers get away in the United States, it is a source of reassurance when those who take life are apprehended.

Certain primitive qualities inherent in our characters cause most of us to be particularly pleased when the perpetrators of any heinous crime are caught. Murder is murder, but some are more revolting than others.

The reported confession of three of the men who killed a banker and his son and two others at Lamar, Colorado in May, 1920, clears up a mystery that went unsolved for more than a year. Then one suspect was captured and held. He finally told the officers enough that they were enabled to make two more arrests. The information gained from the trio has put the officers on the trail of a fourth.

It has taken a long time for the officers to unravel the mystery created by the killings, but their persistence has enabled them to win a partial victory, and the initiative displayed lends confidence to the public in its belief that the fourth man will be apprehended.

The lid maxim that murder will out is not literally true, and never has been. Many murderers have escaped the coils of the law. They may have paid almost as dearly for wrongful acts through the lashings of conscience as they would have through execution under the law, but the fact remains that many have committed murder and got away with it.

The men who murdered in Colorado have been apprehended, or three of them have been caught. They have con-

fessed, the officers claim. Every effort is being made to catch the remaining suspect.

The work done by the officers in this case constitutes a very real service to society. Killers should not be at large. They menace society, notwithstanding the sentimental affection some morons display toward them, and menaces should be treated for what they are.

SAFETY FOR CHILDREN

DO WE need a new standard of consideration of the safety of children on the part of the motoring public?

Recently we saw figures indicating that last year there were 5,000 children under the age of 16 killed as a result of motor car accidents. Those figures indicate that we need to pay more attention to the matter.

Several times each year in different parts of the country the public has unfolded before its eyes atrocities perpetrated by criminals against children. The Aune case is one of the latest, and a short time before that a little Salt Lake City girl was murdered by a fiend.

Our blood boils against the depraved members of society for such acts, and public opinion is arrayed against them in no uncertain spirit.

But if 5,000 children are sacrificed as a result of motor accidents each year in this country, the public needs to redouble its caution in driving so that this terrible toll may be as nearly eliminated as possible.

Children lack responsibility when it comes to protecting themselves against the menace of a rapidly driven car. That very lack of caution on their part only increases the responsibility of the driver to use a double caution, care that he shall not be responsible for an accident involving a child and care that he shall not snuff out a child's life on account of the child's lack of caution.

Motor car accidents undoubtedly will continue to take a toll of lives of children, but it can not be conceded that 5,000 deaths represents the lowest possible minimum.

IS A PLEDGE A PLEDGE?

Senator Borah has a way of talking straight to the shoulder when he has something to say about matters pending in the United States senate. He also has a way of reminding with his belated and ringing pleas for a pledge to abstain from political pledges. He has something to say about the matter.

Those who have the interest of agriculture at heart and those who believe that the pledge made ought to be kept, are in duty bound to endeavor to change this bill in the senate.

It is a pity that the bill regarding the suit between the finance committee convinces me that there is very little difference between the two bills so far as the effect of the pledge to abstain from agriculture will suffer the same inequality, the same injustice, that we were pledged to remedy.

It is refreshing to hear Senator Borah insisting that complete pledges ought to be kept. It is refreshing to see a senator insisting that political pledges ought to mean something.

The Republican party pledged itself in 1912 to place agriculture and other industry in this country on a basis of equality. It was in full force at that time. But there was no mention of the pledge to abstain from political pledges. The party platform of 1912 provided equality. But there was no equality for the third consecutive time. The only way to get equality for agriculture and industry. The answer to that pledge is a tariff bill, instead of a complete pledge to abstain from agriculture and industry. Though duties on agricultural products are increased in the bill the duties on other products are not. The bill is so far advanced that the returns to agriculturists through their own added duties will be entirely swept away and a further burden imposed through the operation of living.

Senator Borah is eminently correct when he says that "those who have the interest of agriculture at heart, and those who believe that the pledge made ought to be kept, are in duty bound to endeavor to change this bill in the senate."

The grounds have had their day in court in Washington.


