CUBS LIKELY TO SET NEW RECORD FOR ATTENDANCE

New York Yankees Hold Present Record But Chicago Team Is Going Strong Now

CHICAGO, Sept. 3 (UP)—It now seems almost certain that the Chicago Cubs will set a new attendance record for the end of the 1929 season. The present high mark is held by the New York Yankees who in one year played to an aggregate of about 1,250,000 persons but the Cubs appear to be destined to better that mark and reach 1,500,000.

The greatest indication of their ability to do so is the fact that they were given a great sending capacity would continue to hold the record despite the fact that the attendance record is held by the Yankees.

But Chicago is somewhat unduly optimistic. The Cubs are certain to win the pennant and the Chicago team ever since the banking withdrawal near Joe McCarthy's boy has been out of the picture.

Four out of five makes no difference to local Cubs fans. Yesterday's game was given a great ovation as he took his turn at bat, and every place of good news which the Chicago players turned in was applauded by a deluge of straw hats on the field.

The Cubs passed the million attendance mark during their fourth home game. It was the third time in four years they had done this but the other years were not productive of an attendance record.

However, that attendance records appear almost certain how the Cubs seem destined to play to at least 10,000 more than the Yankees record of 1,250,000.

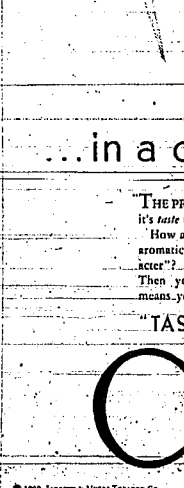

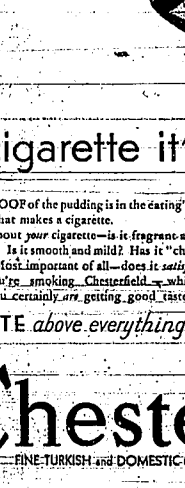

COLLECTIVE THINKING
 THE FOLLOWING editorial, published under the above title by the Nampa Idaho Free Press, contains some pertinent thoughts on the farm problem which is particularly of interest here in view of the recent meeting on farm problems held in Twin Falls for the farmers of the southern part of the state.

Chairman Legge of the federal farm board is credited with the following statement:
 "What we farmers must learn is to do collective thinking to solve our problems. A lot of fellows think the reason big business gets results is because big business has a lot of money. But the real reason is that big business has a lot of men in its organization who sit around a table and do collective thinking, and out of these conferences big business works out its problems.

"The 'collective thinking' to which Mr. Legge refers is certainly not a simultaneous effort at conversation by a group of men in order to produce a superman thought product. It is more after the order of the aphorism 'intelligence sharpeneth intellect' or 'in the multitude of counsel there is wisdom.' And, we may also add, those who meet to confer are neither super-mind nor extraordinary geniuses in their business. One more restriction—they are not, as a rule at least, a body of men seeking to perpetuate sharp practice. The members of these conferences, if they are more than average business men, have become so because of diligence each in his own affairs.

"The 'collective thinking' at which these conferences arrive is plain good business sense achieved by welding individual experience and observation into a workable program designed to produce the desired results. Such conferences might well hang up a sign 'No faddists, theorists or would-be geniuses wanted.' Only such men are wanted as have sought to work out their own problems of business and are willing to submit plain statements of the results of their efforts.

"We need business as well as social and religious prophets. We need seers with vision, it is true, but like all other true seers and prophets, their visions must be proved, corrected and balanced by concrete and definite knowledge and experience—just such experience and knowledge as the average business man, or farmer possesses in relation to his own affairs.

"We are saying these things because we are entering a world consciously committed to and based upon the idea of cooperation. From the Kellogg peace pact to govern the relations of nations; to marketing by commodity products, our modern world is seeking to mould its plans to the ideals of cooperation. The basis of this cooperation is the conference. And the family and the effectiveness of the conference is, in turn, based upon the knowledge, the experience and the disposition of the individuals in the conference to contribute, not what one thinks some one else thinks he ought to think, but what he knows.
 "We have worshipped the 'golden calf' slogan of 'Money is power.' It is and has power. There is no doubt about it, but it is far from being the

We are a motorized nation—which means, of course, that our economic and social machine could not function without oil. That one well has multiplied to more than 325,000. Oil has completely changed our entire life. Somehow, it seems as if that first well ought to have some kind of tablet in memorial. It was the beginning of a new era.

Best Editorial of the Day
POLITICAL MISREPRESENTATION
 (Hans Phillips)

Among other rumors reported by the Pioneer last week in the editorial story dealing largely with an "incident" conference at Bellevue, was that certain tax-ex-service men of Idaho were interested in getting two places on the state board of examiners. This board includes the Governor, Attorney General and Secretary of State.

The editor of the Pioneer has for not of the years given great attention to the confidence men and business of many out-standing ex-service men and knowing their motives to be of a high order, has always taken with plenty of salt any political rumors that come from them. 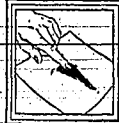

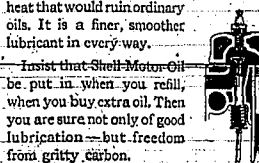
