**THE FRONTIER**

**IN HIS TALK** on the subject, "Development of the Frontier," before a local service club yesterday Edward Laird Mills, editor of the Pacific Christian Advocate, uncovered to his audience some tendencies in our history that not only have interest to us because they clarify past developments but because they indicate some steps we may take to insure success for our future.

The frontier has developed in this country as a result of the exodus of people from older settled communities to newer countries. The movement has been like that of water, sometimes in spectacular floods in great waves, and at other times by the slow process of quiet percolation, so unobtrusively as to create no interest at the time.

The frontier at first was merely a way station. It marked a stopping place of the emigrant. But with the passage of time, the stopping place took on permanency, became a center of homes and took on the functions of an organized community. Schools, churches, hospitals were founded, trade and commerce developed and all the works that society demands were performed in greater or less degree.

This part of the Snake river valley in Idaho has done these things during the quarter of a century since water furnished the means for the pioneer to conquer the desert. It is a tribute to the various communities that they have done so well in so short a time.

In a sense we are still on the frontier. What among us studies public problems has heard the statement, "The people of Idaho are lacking in state consciousness." The explanation is easily found in the fact that our settlements are in effect oases developed out of wide deserts. We are a few people spread over magnificent spaces. We have very recently we have not taken the time to penetrate beyond the desert spaces to the next oasis to visit with its people and to know their problems. Our own problems have progressed to the exclusion of a consideration of the problems of our neighbors.

That such conditions have existed could not be escaped for the reasons that have been enumerated. But we gain a little of leisure as our country and we grow older. We need to extend the scope of our knowledge and interests. From Bliss to Declo on both sides of the Snake river valley the big interests of the various communities are identical. We have all too seldom been aware of that fact and have been so busily engaged in the problems of our own communities that we have not thought of our district.

One of the best ways to build state consciousness is to increase the scope of our interest in the communities surrounding us and it appears to this newspaper as a good idea to encourage such meetings at the one recently held there to consider ways of applying benefits of the farm board law. They might be sponsored by the state chamber of commerce as was this meeting. Actually the old frontier is gone, but we are still bound in too great measure by our lack of acquaintance with each other and the problems facing different communities. To foster clearer understanding and reader sympathies

we merely need to know each other better. If interest in each other's problems is aroused consciousness of our district will develop and we can thereby push back the walls of the frontier of isolation that still exists in greater measure than it should.

**TRAFFIC ACCIDENTS**

**IN THIS newspaper** Thursday a news story recorded some half dozen automobile accidents that had occurred in the vicinity of Twin Falls within 24 hours. Fortunately, according to the news story, the greater part of the damage done was to cars and not to occupants.

Once in a great while an accident occurs in traffic that may justly be described as unavoidable. Nearly always someone is to blame. Half a dozen collisions in a 24-hour period in Twin Falls is too many.

If the community were called on to endure a series of burglaries, a half dozen or so each 24 hours, many throats would be raw from criticizing the law enforcement officers. Yet we go ahead and inflict ourselves with as many auto accidents which in the aggregate cost a considerable sum of money and think very little about it.

We need to be more cautious in this business of driving cars.

**"ON THE BOTTOM"**

**SELBOM** does a book having sufficient appeal to us to lead to a recommendation of its perusal to our friends, but an exception is made in behalf of "On The Bottom" by Commander Edward Ellsberg of the United States navy.

The book deals with the successful efforts of the naval forces to raise the submarine S-51 which went to the bottom off Block Island when struck by the City of Rome.

The recital has appeal on several scores. It will stir the blood of the most jaded because of the heroism of the men whose exploits in seamanship and deep sea diving it records. For those who like engineering problems the book will be interesting as the record of the overcoming of almost insuperable problems connected with raising the submarine from its resting place in the clay on the bottom of the sea at a depth of 132 feet.

The writer of the book has a graphic style. One soon finds that he has written to the student of engineering problems as well as to patriots. Technical terms are used freely in discussing the problems attendant on raising the boat, but even though one may not be able to understand the whys and wherefores of all that is done, the manner of the telling and the human interest of the book give it an appeal that pulls one breathlessly through the passages in which the engineer overtops the leader of men.

Read "On The Bottom." It contains some excellent writing done in a straightforward, vigorous manner all too lacking in this day and age. It is a lesson in patriotic devotion to duty under obstacles that will make the average citizen shudder. If it deals with brutal forces they are at least elemental, and the conquest the men of the American navy secured in the feat of raising the ship that had become a tomb will inspire respect and a deep appreciation.

Wonder if the pumpkins are not shivering in apprehension of the time when they will have frost on 'em?

**Best Editorial of the Day**

**SMALL CROP! GOOD PRICE**

The probable wheat yield of this year's prairie province this year is estimated by bank of Montreal factors as "the best" since 1914. This may be fairly close to the mark. Other estimates have been higher and lower.

Eastern observers have been impressed with the fact that the present crop will be little more than half that of last year. While many grain growers will be hurt by the smaller harvest, the total loss throughout the prairie provinces will not be so great as feared earlier in the season. Compensating factors are the excellent crop prices for wheat, the reduction in harvesting costs, and a higher quality of grain. The steady shifting of market favors throughout the grain-growing belt is another instance against a wheat failure.

The latest monthly business summary issued by the bank of Montreal refers to these developments. "The people of the prairie provinces," it is informed, "no longer have all their eggs in one basket. There is a growing diversity of industries and stock and dairy production is large. Higher prices for all classes of cereals, and there is a carry-over from the Canadian crop of 1928 of 11,000,000 bushels of wheat.

"Another basis of the situation is touched by the Toronto Globe when it says:

"The wheat is setting an example in its philosophical 'No. 1' production. It is 'foolish' to expect bumper crops every year; records cannot be kept appearing, and the thing to prepare for now is next year's harvest."

**SAFEGUARDING OF PRESS FREEDOM AIM OF CONGRESS**

**WASHINGTON, Sept. 6 (UP)**—A movement is under way in congress to safeguard the freedom of the press by limiting the power of judges to punish the press through contempt of court procedure, the most of federal courts which United Press learned today.

The move is a direct outgrowth of the contempt sentence recently imposed upon editors of the Cleveland Press, a Scripps-owned newspaper, by Judge Frederick Wadsworth of the court of common pleas of Cuyahoga county, Ohio.

It is sponsored by Senator Arthur H. Vandenberg, Republican, Michigan, a former newspaper editor. Vandenberg revealed today by introducing a study of the local press of the situation with a view to introducing legislation in the regular session of congress opening in December.

Vandenberg explained he is attempting to work on the situation not only for the protection

of the press but also for the protection of the nation's individual citizen, which he feels is endangered by automatic use of the contempt procedure.

He is not yet ready, he said, to introduce any legislation on the subject, but is considering proposing a law which would require direct contempt cases to be tried by a jury instead of the contempt court.

He said the Ohio case in the state courts has focused much attention upon the possibility of judicial tyranny that could be established by such a procedure. He said a new formula for punishing the press would be a model for state courts, Vandenberg said.

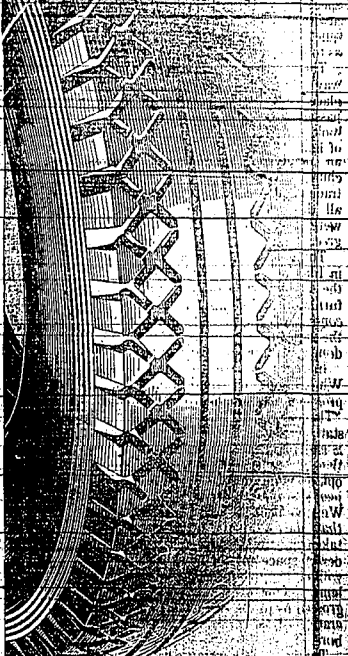

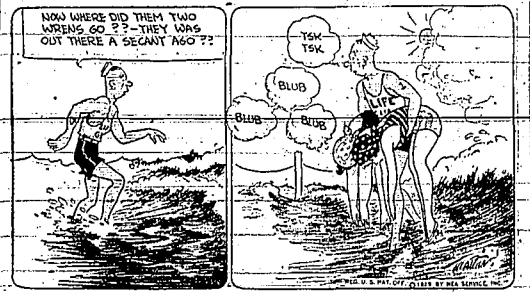


