Fat years in spuds make the memories of lean years less painful and are welcome to growers.

FROST, THE VANDAL
 THE plant the other day by a farmer's wife that the frost did considerable damage at their place because it killed most of her flowers, even though the field crops were not hurt, is not illogical.

Flowers may not have the utilitarian value of beans—they do not have any such value in this district—but their value is, nonetheless, real. They furnish color and yield joy out of all proportion to their cost. They aid in creating homes out of mere dwelling places.

Frost, if it comes before their lives have ended in maturity, is a vandal in the flower kingdom. The time of his likely appearance is a time of worry to the keepers of flowers, and his arrival brings regret. The fact that the touch of Jack Frost lends magical colors to leaves is some compensation for robbing the garden of flowers, but it does not absolve the icy-fingered rogue from all blame.

DEMOCRACY OF GOLF
 GOLF used to be considered a recreation for rich men—for rich men and for men who were too feeble to perform any hard manual labor.

Now, however, golf seems to be the most democratic game there is. The New York, New Haven and Hartford railway held its annual employees' golf tournament the other day at New Haven, Conn. President John W. Penney was one of the two men to win top honors, having a low gross score of 78. And the man he shared the top perch with was none other than Jack Garrity, fireman on the Shore Line express, who turned in a low net of 67.

The democracy of the links seems to be a genuine thing. Incidentally, you would have thought, a score of years ago, that a railroad fireman would ever be able to win top place in a golf tournament?

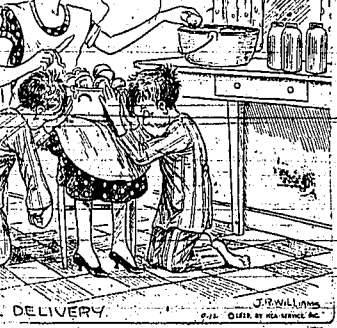

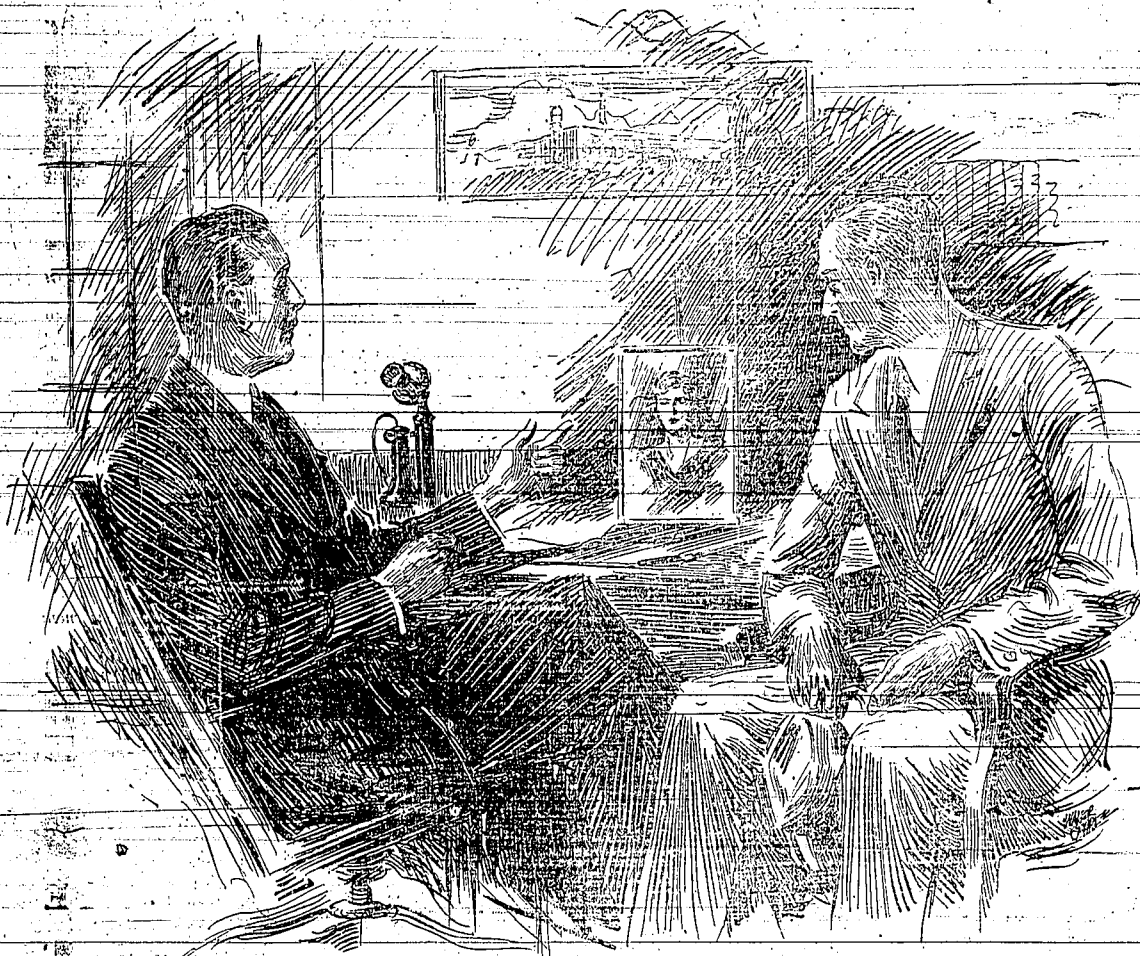
