FLAMES CONTINUE RUINOUS MARCH IN REDWOOD FOREST

Large Armies Fighting Fires in Region of Ukiah, California Today

Ukiah, Calif., Sept. 16 (UP)—Four large forest fires of threatening proportions are being fought by fire-fighters active throughout the night and early today in California's Ukiah region.

Between 900 and 4000 acres of forest were destroyed by seven fires, which began in one and spread on to the others.

Big Ten Starts Fall Football Practice

TWIN FALLS BOY A MAINSTAY ON ILLINOIS ELEVEN

Wade Timm Helps to Form Nucleus of Great Gridiron Team for Coach Bob Zappke

CHICAGO, Sept. 16 (AP)—The Big Ten conference football team will be officially today as the Big Ten conference team began their first practice.

Handicapped slightly by the Western conference rule which prohibits practice before September 15, the Big Ten teams, as in past years, are confident that their football will be on a par with the rest of the country and that their four of them expect to be distinctly in the running for national honors.

While they wait, that they have formidable opposition in all sections, Illinois, Wisconsin, Michigan and Minnesota believe that their team this year will be able to make a good account of themselves against any opponent.

The four are coached respectively by the Big Ten championship Illinois, winner of the title in the past two years, the seven-time champion Michigan, the Illinois, a great player in Norman, a tackle who probably can't be replaced. However, Coach Zappke has an excellent nucleus in Captain Frank Ward and Gordon in the line and Bill Timm, Peter, Lambert, Walker and Humbert in the backfield.

Michigan has fourteen veterans, including Timmer, probably the best end in the conference, and Brockway, a back who looks as a barrier for opposing team. The new lineup, however, is said to be only average but Coach DeWane has a great group of veterans to build around and the team doubtless will be the training camp champion.

Wade Timm was named MVP last year and Backus, Bill, and Wagner were named MVP. However, Coach Zappke believes that still has a fine backfield and hopes are especially bright when several new candidates for the line showed great promise in their practice. It is expected that Coach Timm will have a fine year in the coaching from the Big Ten.

A bulletin from the department of agriculture reports that the Tongass and Chugach national forests in Alaska are capable of maintaining a permanent, large-scale pulp and paper industry—an item of some importance. Since the price of paper has shown a tendency to rise for years.

HOW IT WAS DONE

AS A result of the discovery through scientific research, of practical means of controlling the Hessian fly, insect enemy of wheat growers, and the application by farmers of the control measures developed by the research, there has been no general outbreak of the Hessian fly for ten years, says Dr. W. H. Larimer, entomologist of the Bureau of Entomology, U. S. department of agriculture. Only too often, says Doctor Larimer, entomologists are forced to relate a dolorous tale of heavy losses caused by some pest of plants or animals, but in the Hessian fly control campaign there is a story of a different kind, a story of losses prevented by the efforts of crop growers.

"Before 1919 the Hessian fly caused losses running into hundreds of millions of dollars, and entomologists had come to expect severe outbreaks at five to seven year intervals," says Doctor Larimer. "Now I am happy to be able to report, over a large part of the winter wheat belt, the pest is comparatively scarce. The decline in the numbers of the pest came from two causes—the discovery through research of an effective method of control, and the application by wheat growers of the results of this research."

Control of the Hessian fly is based upon the planting of the wheat late enough in the season so that the Hessian fly will oviposit before the wheat is in a stage to invite attack. The fly lives only a day or two, and without young wheat on which to lay its eggs it dies without multiplying its kind. Control of the Hessian fly required no new or expensive method. Farmers needed only to appropriately time their customary operations.

SKEPTICS AND MIRACLES

A FEW days ago the papers told about a woman preacher who had been elected mayor of a small Louisiana city.

Telling reporters how she filled her job, the preacher-mayor remarked that she always prayed for divine guidance when an especially tough problem came up. Then she told this little story:

Her city had no water—or almost no light service. For years efforts had been made to provide them, but they had always fizzled out. She had conferred with business men, civic leaders and others, but had been unable to make any headway.

So, one night, utterly discouraged, she knelt and prayed that divine aid might come to the rescue and help the little city get the modern conveniences it needed so badly.

The next day—out of a clear sky, so to speak—a group of business men called at her office and told her that they were going to form a corporation to establish a water and electricity supply for the city.

Thus—she told the reporters—her prayers had been answered. What weeks of effort had failed to do, a prayer had accomplished.

Now it is altogether too easy for us to scoff at that story.

Many a reader, no doubt, laid down his paper and snorted, "Humph! Those men had their plans already. Prayed or no prayer, they'd have been ready to go ahead with the job. She's just kidding herself if she thinks her prayer really did anything."

That may be true and it may not be. Meanwhile, one is moved to wonder why it is that a generation whose daily life is attended by uncounted miracles should be so much more skeptical about things that it cannot see and handle than all previous generations have been.

When you sit in your home at night and tune in on a radio program, picking music out of the silent air, you are taking part in a thing as wondrous as the star over Bethlehem.

Suppose you turn on your phonograph. Whom do you want to hear? Curuso? Very well; he has been dead seven years, but he will sing for you, his voice as clear and rich as ever, though his body is dust.

Far over your housetop soars an air mail plane. The pilot cannot see the earth below. Mist obscures the beacon lights. But that same miracle of radio tells him, unfailingly, that he is on his course.

Those things are commonplace. We have even stopped marveling at them.

The mystery of prayer is far older—old as the day that the first barbaric cave dweller made his first desperate appeal for help to the force that he could not see.

Why should we be skeptical? Have we swallowed our new miracles only to reject one that is as old and familiar as the race itself?

MAKING PROGRESS

IT IS not a good thing to be too optimistic; and the obstacles that lie in the pathway that leads toward complete, friendly agreement between the United States and England on naval matters are, admittedly, many. Yet friends of peace have a right to feel encouraged by the most recent developments.

When Ramsay MacDonald announced that the two governments had already reached agreement on 17 of the 20 points at issue, he did not clarify his statement by explaining what the three points are that are still the basis of disagreement. Nevertheless, the mere fact that negotiations are continuing, and are reaching some sort of goal, is a cause for optimism.

YOUR STOLEN CAR
(Oregon Journal)

Lock your automobile. Police and other authorities say you can't do it.

Nearly 100 per cent of all motor cars are carried out of the state of stolen automobiles that the owner has left unlocked, but that reason enough for you to lock your car.

The key is sometimes carefully left in the automobile and the car is left unlocked. All the criminal has to do to mount the driver's seat and steal away on the career of night-ride. When you see your car unlocked you help rob somebody or kill somebody—and you yourself may be the victim.

In one-by-day the holding man didn't have things to do much his own way. He had no stolen automobile in which to make a quick getaway. It was easy to apprehend him. If police were quickly notified the criminal was often caught making his way out of town from the scene of his crime.

It is different now. Your unlocked automobile has been stolen and is in waiting just around the corner. An accomplice is in the driver's seat and the motor is running. 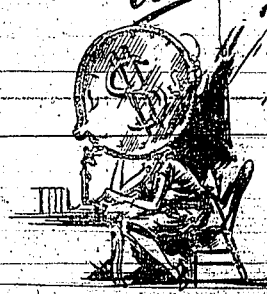

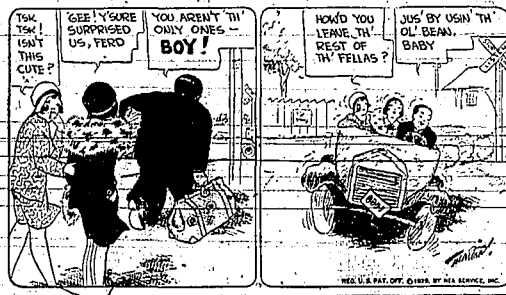

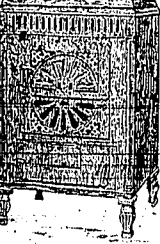
