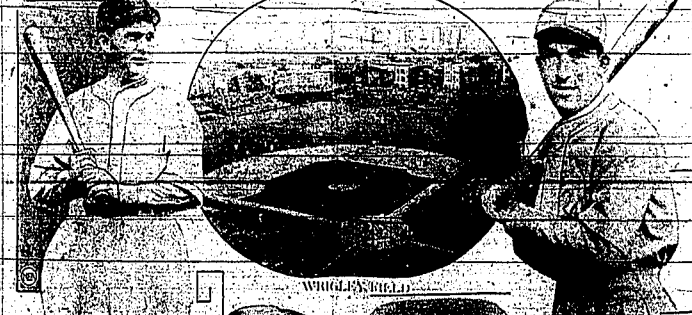

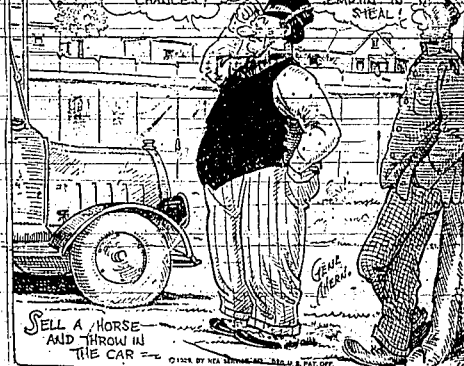

GIVING BABIES A CHANCE

IN THIS fast moving age we pride ourselves on the accomplishments that we can write down to our credit...

One of the failures of Twin Falls county that is entitled to serious thought and remedial action...

That death rate is 10 per cent, a high one on averages, which is not a comforting thought...

Through a lack of applied intelligence, to put it in other bald words, we in this county permitted more than 20 babies to die...

Those who wish quarrel with the statistics and discount them, but the unnecessary death of half that number of babies would still reflect seriously on our standard of citizenship.

During the same year the deaths from meningitis were measurably less than the deaths of infants.

We have instituted the best approved methods known to deal with the problem and prevent any recurrence.

But the public has displayed no decided interest in what appears to be even a graver problem.

Constant care, observation and study, and steps taken immediately by the enlistment of skilled medical attention for a sick baby, together with the following of sound feeding practices...

Twins Falls county undoubtedly need no feel that is in any fault in this shortage than other counties.

Our failure in meeting a great responsibility has been pointed out to us while other communities fail probably in us great, probably greater, measure than we have done.

A failure exposed should lead to prompt measures of correction. Within this county health unit itself we have the leadership to show us the way out of the difficulty.

Public opinion needs to be awakened to the seriousness of the situation and co-operation extended to effect a cure.

THE MYSTERY REMAINS

PROFESSOR C. JUDSON HERRICK of the University of Chicago believes that man is simply a machine that thinks.

After spending years in the study of anatomy, Dr. Herrick has concluded that all life—physical, mental and spir-

itual—is simply a mechanistic process. He has just written a book setting forth his views, and in it he says: "Mental processes are biological functions of the body in general and of the brain in particular, in just the same sense that circulation of the blood is a function of the heart, or breathing is a function of the lungs."

The present age is distinguished from all former ages by a number of things; but chiefly, it would seem, it is set apart by the fact that never until now have men been able to conceive of themselves as seamless bits of machinery.

Probably this is only natural. We live in an era that moves by machinery. We are far removed from the social and economic conditions of a century ago as we are from the builders of the pyramids.

It is a mistake, however, to think that one solves any problems by adopting such a theory.

A machine? Very possibly. But what a marvelous one! A machine that can lift itself by its own bootstraps; a machine that can create beauty so compelling and haunting that the beholder, involuntarily, is persuaded of his own immortality; a machine that can be heroic, can suffer hardships for a cause, can sacrifice itself for the sake of other machines—what kind of machine is this, anyway?

The mechanistic explanation may be a very good one. The facts of physiology may support Professor Herriek's theory right up to the hilt.

WASTEFUL ECONOMY MODERN industry has no greater foe than the executive who has short-sighted ideas about economy.

This is the conclusion reached by Charles F. Abbott, executive director of the American Institute of Steel Construction, in a speech before the National Industrial Advertisers' association at Cincinnati.

Industrialists, said Mr. Abbott, must realize that true economy often lies in spending money freely, while the worst waste is that caused by a tight-fisted and parsimonious policy.

"We must lift up an entire industry toward a higher average in tools, methods and business principles," he said.

"We are willing to spend money, individually and collectively. That is courageous and creative spending, the statesmanship of consumption and genuine progress."


