THE WAREHOUSE DISTRICT

ACTIVITY is keyed up to maximum speed in most lines of endeavor during these autumn days, but no where is this more noticeable than in the warehouse district in Twin Falls and in the other shipping points in this big district.

"If you feel prosperous; just spend an hour or two in the warehouse district and you will feel more prosperous," a friend said the other day, "or if you feel poor, the sight of all the produce being handled will make you feel richer."

The statement is true. Apples by the carload are being put through warehouses for grading and packing, and they are going into refrigerated cars for movement to market. One house this week saw a total of 28 carloads moving out. Some growers have their own packing sheds in or near their orchards which materially increase the movement above that of the warehouse district proper.

Beans are also being received and cleaned in preparation for shipment. Prospects are that this year's crop of beans will establish a new record for this county, and probably for Idaho, due to the fact that acreages both inside and outside of Twin Falls county are greater than ever before.

At the dehydrating plant tons and tons of apples of the smaller sizes are awaiting processing when the plant opens Monday.

Along the highways and through the streets of Twin Falls trucks spin along with well rounded loads of sugar beets being transported to the sugar factory for grinding. The volume transported by truck from nearby areas is augmented by carloads from the receiving stations at railroad sidings.

Last potatoes and onions will replace apples and beans in some degree and claim the center of the stage.

SCIENCE AGAINST THE CRIMINAL

NOW we are informed "precision methods of measurement and comparison" are being utilized by European police as the latest means of detecting the perpetrators of crime. The methods will be extended in this country to combat the spread of crime, according to Dr. William Souder, bureau of standards expert of the department of commerce.

A recent pronouncement by him on this latest development follows:

"The Bureau of Standards has taken up the problems of identification of written and typewritten documents, signatures, guns, bullets, etc. Dr. Souder declared in his article, 'In an effort to establish standards for these classes of work. There are only a few experts who make identifications in a logical and precise manner, but there are many so-called experts who recognize no limitations, no standards, and no equipment as essential in this field.'

Positive identification, he continued, is based on the "law of probability." This law is interpreted, he explained, from the fraction which represents the ratio of the number of times a specific characteristic appears divided by

the maximum number of appearances possible, and for two or more characteristics appearing simultaneously the probability ratio is represented by the product of the individual fractions."

The Twin Falls police department has established an enviable reputation for itself on the thoroughness of its record keeping. Some of these days our local force members will have to figure ratios, fractions and appearances to find out the probability ratios, to establish the indication of criminal guilt.

Such developments promise a lot of complexities in several ways. For one thing they are likely to make the uncertain life of the criminal even more risky, and think of the tables in fractions the police will have to conquer!

REAL PARITY NEEDED

HERE is a vast amount of opinion being expressed regarding the naval reduction conference to be held between the president and Premier MacDonald and the wish is general that the conference will succeed, but does any one know the basis of the tentative agreement? That is the important part of the story and it is the one point on which the public seems to be in the dark.

The nearest approach to a summary seems to be provided by the Washington Star which offers the following as the outstanding features of the Hoover-MacDonald agreement as gathered from various dispatches:

"Reduction and parity of the American and British fleets are to be arrived at in 1930. The British will give up their new building program during the next seven years, i.e., authorizes to construct any ships not already provided for. America concedes the British fleet a certain superiority in smaller cruisers for 'police' or trade protection purposes. The British will give up their American antagonist, will yield Britain's position in 'combat strength' as against the American fleet. There is to be a heavy reduction in the destroyers and submarine fleet of both navies. America's parity would be maintained in the first division, but the British would be reduced to the second division. The British will give up their 'battle fleet' and the Americans will give up their 'cruiser fleet'.

Does that mean the new cruisers authorized by congress are to be built or not?

If not, in what condition with respects to parity will this country be placed? Naturally everyone would like to see a naval agreement on a parity basis but prudence requires that the parity be actual, not theoretical.

The chief difficulty is over-enumeration and the subject is one that should permit of an adjustment. The need is for a settlement on a middle ground basis, ignoring on one hand the extreme naval propagandists and on the other the pacifists who frequently do not know enough to go inside when it rains.
