WASHINGTON, Oct. 7 (UP)—Announcement of the invitations today to the London five-power naval conference gave assurance that Prime Minister MacDonald's mission of friendship to the United States has made an auspicious start.

President Hoover and Prime Minister MacDonald reached an understanding during their week-end conversation at the isolated Rapidan mountain camp that will prevent the United States and Great Britain from being a stumbling block at the next naval conference as they were at Geneva in 1927.

MacDonald and Hoover agreed to meet in London the third week in January.

Out on the north side, Wrigley field, home of the Chicago Cubs, National League champions, stood ready to receive the thousands of fans who are expected to flock to the grandstands to witness the opening of the roof of the new ballpark.

The baseball spectators that come annually to witness the series are expected to be in the breaking point, drew a host of notable and near-notable to the city on Lake Michigan that boasts of a baseball field extending from Pop Anson to the city hall.

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BORAH PICKED AS MEMBER SENATE LOBBY TRIBUNAL

Sub-Committee Headed by Senator Caraway of Arkansas; Thorough Inquiry Planned

WASHINGTON, Oct. 7 (UP)—A sub-committee in which the Senate Republicans group holds a pre-eminence, was named by Chairman Norris of the senate judiciary committee today to conduct the lobby investigation into Washington propaganda sources.

Senator Thomas of Arkansas, instigator of the inquiry, was named chairman.

Other members are William E. Borah, Idaho, leader in the farm bill movement against the republican tariff and the man who started the Shearer naval bill inquiry; Thomas J. Walsh, democrat of Montana, who almost single-handedly uncovered the Teapot Dome scandal; and Senator Charles McNary, Oregon, who has been a vocal critic of the public lands committee.

John G. Malone, independent republican, was named a leader in the La Follette group in that state.

Arthur Robinson, republican of Indiana, who may be considered the only regular republican on the committee.

The full judiciary committee met in executive session and decided to hold a public hearing to conduct the inquiry.

FORMAL INVITATIONS SENT POWERS FOR COMING WORLD NAVAL MEETING

LONDON, Oct. 7 (UP)—Invitations to a five-power naval conference in January were sent by British secretary Arthur Henderson today to the United States, Japan, France, and Italy.

They were handed in the embassy of the respective powers.

The invitations, the wording of which has been agreed to by the British dominion and presided by U. S. Ambassador Charles G. Dawes, were signed by Henderson.

It had been planned originally to issue them at the time President Hoover and Prime Minister MacDonald called for the United States, but later it was decided to delay issuance until after MacDonald and President Hoover had reached an understanding regarding Anglo-American parity as a basis for the five power conference.

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IDAHO BEAN CROP THIS YEAR BEST IN ITS HISTORY

Quality and Quantity of Product Remarkably Good; Big Yield Reported Everywhere

BOISE, Oct. 7 (Special)—Never before in the history of bean growing in Idaho has the Gem state produced such a crop, quality and quantity combined, as before harvest.

That sound almost like fairy tales has been reported from all sections of Twin Falls and Jerome counties which are the principal bean producing counties of the state.

In fact, experts say that the worst part of the present crop is the grain in the vicinity of Edna and Hazelton, the best land for beans in the country. Beans are also produced in commercial quantities in the Upper Snake river valley and in some of the northern counties of the state.

Production from Twin Falls and Jerome counties this year is greater than ever before with the average yield running between 40 and 45 bushels to the acre.

Individual yields on small tracts have run as high as 65 and 57 bushels to the acre. Last year the average was between 20 and 25 bushels. The average for the United States in 1928 was 10.6 bushels.

A great many of the bean growers are organized into the Southern Idaho Bean Growers' association. There are more than 400 growers in the association and their estimated production this year is 400 cars. Total production from Twin Falls and Jerome counties is given as between 3000 and 4000 cars of beans.
