WASHINGTON, Oct. 9 (UP)—A mission in Anglo-American relations has been told and Prime Minister MacDonald is expected to say farewell to President Hoover at sunset today.

Dexter Dayton, 25, Confesses Killing His Sweetheart Marjorie O'Donnell

ROW OVER OTHER MAN CAUSE OF THE CRIME

Salesman Intended to Take His Own Life, Placed Under Arrest

WASHINGTON, Oct. 9 (UP)—Dexter Dayton, 25, insurance salesman of Kansas City, Mo., has confessed to choking his beautiful sweetheart, Marjorie O'Donnell, 21, to death Monday night in a fashionable local hotel, police said today.

A quarrel over "another man" which had gotten out of control, prompted his act.

Dayton told police after showing his sweetheart he intended to commit suicide and drink could enable him to sustain his courage.

Police in the past have told that he said he fell asleep on the bed beside the slain girl, his arms about her.

Dayton was taken to police headquarters and charged with murder. He asked for a priest.

MAN FOUND IN ORIENT WHO IS 252 YEARS OLD

PEKING, October 9 (UP)—The world's oldest man, who, if his given age is correct, would antedate the American republic by almost a century, has been found in Kaituma, a town in southern Szechwan province, in the opinion of Professor Wu Ching-chen, a member of the department of education at Nankai University here.

The man in question is Li Ching-Yun, dynamic records verify to the professor's satisfaction reported by a Japanese doctor that he is 252 years, or more than one-fourth as old as the oldest man in the world, who is 263 years old.

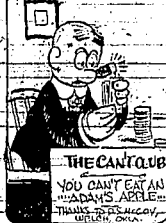

ELECTRIC STORM HITS NEAR BUHL

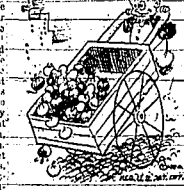

A glass-walled building is being erected around and over the little one-and-a-half-story building, erected in 1822, which served for years as the study of the pastor at Derry Church, an academy where meals were prepared for the early settlers, who walked or rode on foot to the morning service and remained for the evening rites.

The little study is 23 feet long, 11 feet wide and one story high.

On concrete foundations around it has been erected a steel framework, with a glass roof. Glass is being fitted into the framework, so that the interior of the building can be seen while the decayed wood is protected from the elements.

The study is the only original building remaining of the old Derry Presbyterian Church, established in 1724, when immigrants first came to the area.

Marked Changes in Methods and Increased Demand for Products Cause of Trouble

WASHINGTON, (UPI)—Development of the present serious farm export situation is the result of marked changes in the world war—while the demand for farm products is the result of increased demand for raw materials, in the opinion of G. C. Sills, Agricultural Department expert.

Expansion of production in the United States and other countries, coupled with the war devastated area, with the unequal footcandle to carry on exports, a major export problem when European nations recovered and began to supply their own wants in the post-war period.

In addition to this factor, the World War by creating sudden demands for large quantities of farm products caused the agricultural industry to introduce many new labor-saving appliances and to utilize existing machinery to the fullest extent. This greater use of machinery has encouraged a continuation of the export of production in many countries.

Many changes in world agricultural conditions have resulted since the war, while others are the result of forces regarded or considered by the war.

The changed boundaries which have caused the international trade in farm products, caused or made possible agrarian reforms which have affected production in many countries, and stimulated the development of new agricultural areas in many other countries.

PAINTING BRINGS FORTUNE IN CASH

INDIANAPOLIS, (UPI)—The first picture sold in London for \$25,000 is a painting which three years ago sold in London for \$1500.

Some weeks ago it was announced that the British Galleries had sold Romney's portrait of "Blue Boy" in the United States for \$1500 by Walter Burn, who inherited it from his mother, the sister of the artist, J. M. Norton.

The National Gallery ruled that it was not sufficient, "and the picture" was to be exempt from death duties.

"Master Tennant" is a comparatively unknown Romney portrait in blue of the young son of William Tennant. Romney obtained \$250 for the study.
