

## DEFENBACH, AUTHOR.

BYRON DEFENBACH, state treasurer of Idaho, whose interest in Idaho history has been reflected in a series of articles dealing with the early history of the state and some phases of its later economic development, is the author of a book.

Its title is, "Red Heroines of the Northwest." In the telling of the stories of the lives and activities of three Indian women, he also goes into other historical information that furnishes a knowledge of some of the background of the Northwest territories not well-known.

There is no reason why Idaho should not be contributing more than it has in the way of books that go to make up the record of our national literature. The state is comparatively new, and its people have been actively engaged in the business of reclamation and development. Its wealth of material to the literary worker is almost limitless, awaiting only the touch of the artist writer to add to the wealth of American letters. ## Best Editorial of the Day

## FOR CO-OPERATION AGAINST WAR.

(Portland, Oregon)

One of the most dramatic events in the history of the United States and Britain was the speech of former Minister of Britain to the United States Senate, Lord Northcliffe, who had seen and heard it, he would have been amazed. A speech from the humble class which had not the right to vote for members of parliament in his day appealed to the nobility. The nation had known from the earliest days of the war that Britain was interested in preventing war and welcomed that interest equally in naval power. Through the century and half that has intervened between North and South, these two nations have traveled toward a common purpose—the prevention of war.

That understanding has been reached at infinite personal conferences between President Hoover and the British Ambassador. The foundations of an enduring peace all over the world are being laid. The cornerstone of those foundations chosen by Mr. MacDonald is the mid-war treaty which he wrote with John Bellamy and Ireland. This meant to him only an instrument of aggression but to the United States it is a declaration of war to the United States to co-operate with Britain in perpetuating peace.

The same line of thought which Mr. MacDonald developed in his speech to the senate has been followed or has defined by many millions in America. It leads to a policy of co-operation against war.

That policy relates to the political junket and conflict between the right of blockade and freedom of the seas and the right of status, British naval supremacy and the power standard. These represent a just cause which John Bull gladly stakes from his shoulder, which he mourned by none but a few antiquated

and unprogressive persons.

The Hoover-MacDonald conference, of which the premier's speech may be taken to express the spirit, fails to show that the nations can solve the problem of disarmament without revealing their way of thinking about war.

They will not fight, and they will not resolve that they will not fight and that they will co-operate to prevent other nations from fighting, they will be faced by so many other nations that they will be compelled to fight.

But this serves principally as a symbol for what every citizen should do the year-round in the exercise of fire-prevention methods and in protecting his family and his property against fire.

Fire Prevention Week serves to emphasize the need of safeguards. It
