UNIVERSITY OF IDAHO, MOSCO, Oct. 15.—Idaho's nineteenth annual state seed show will be held at Jerome, November 14-15, announced J. D. Bonham, chief agronomist and state seed commissioner with the university of Idaho college of agriculture extension division, in a special issue of the show following the state show at which approximately \$1000 in prizes will be awarded. The Idaho seed samples will be offered in the International Grain and Hay show at the convention center at Boise, November 20 to December 7.

All applications for entry must be in the hands of the county agent of Jerome county on the secretary of the seed show no later than Friday, November 14. All samples for the show must reach Jerome prior to November 5. Entry blanks may be secured from county agricultural agents or from the secretary of the seed show in the office of the extension division office in Boise.

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PRESS ROOM OF WHITE HOUSE IS NOW LUXURIOUS

Splendid New Equipment Added to Reporters Quarters At Chief Executive Mansion

WASHINGTON (UPI).—President Hoover's falls in good looks but were practically applied to that "miserable no man's land" of the White House, the press room.

It was first started on the floor of the president's office, that is not news; but it had a great deal of a press room, anywhere that news of the first inauguration.

As a part of the remodeling of the executive offices, at a cost of \$50,000, President Hoover gave to the committee of the White House Correspondents' Association authority to draw their own specifications for the work room. Equipped today with new furniture, office furniture, an electric clock, running hot water, perfect telephone facilities, fans, smoking stands, book shelves, new labor rack and a steel filing cabinet.

The old press room, which had been the main entrance to the executive offices, was apparently an architect's error. The opposite end of the room was given over to one window and one door, which imposed one way traffic and no parking at all hours.
