MacDonald Voices Stirring Appeal for Labor's Help in Furthering Cause of Peace

British Prime Minister Ramsay MacDonald today made a fervent appeal to American labor to aid him in his crusade for universal peace. In an address before the convention of the American Federation of Labor, MacDonald speaking "not as Prime Minister, but still as a worker," pleaded for the "American workers to unite in a new war, not a war of revolution, but for the ballot box."

"I want you to feel I am still a workman, just as I was before," he said. Labor bears a heavy burden in the modern warfare. Labor bears the brunt, and he added that brunt will be even greater in the next war if there is one. He pointed to a day picture of the next war as he spoke.

In addressing the gathering the prime minister, he said: "I have been invited by the American labor leaders and I have accepted the invitation. A GOOD PLACE TO LIVE
 OCTOBER has a way of impressing us of virtues that life possesses and of glossing over those imperfections all too apparent when the year is more in the drab.

Idaho is particularly happy in Idaho's rich irrigated district during the peak of the crop year.
 Harvest is rapidly nearing completion. A small army of men and women, and boys and girls in some cases, is enlisted in the apple harvest, soon to be finished. Most of the larger orchards have their own sorting and packing equipment and their small mountains of empty containers stacked alongside sheds to receive the fruit as it is ready for shipment.

For those orchards whose owners do not care to operate their own machinery there are commercial packing plants equipped to do the work. Fleets of trucks skim rapidly over modern highways transferring great volumes of the fruit to cars or warehouses.

The harvest of Idaho's famed potatoes is just getting under way in this district. Some digging has been under way for more than a week, but the harvest is now general. With high prices now being paid and in prospect, the big field that this part of the state promises to deliver will bring such per acre returns as few countries are able to show.

Nearly every year the Twin Falls country has the good fortune to make a gold strike on at least one crop, and per acre returns mount in the gross to the selling price of land, sometimes more. Potatoes have done this stunt times without number in the past. Various kinds of seed crops have also returned one year gross as much or more than the value of the land.

Beans in many cases this year have produced such big yields, sold at high prices, as to bring practical independence to their producers. Sugar beets are upholding their reputation as producers of real cash income this year.

The crop year of 1929 has been particularly kind to this part of Idaho, yields of all sorts of crops have been at least normal, probably higher than our usual high standard, and prices on most of the things we have to sell have been reasonably profitable.

Our material blessings as October dawns another crop year are wonderful to contemplate.

We have real reason for rejoicing that we live in Idaho.

UNSALVAGED
 JUST a few days since there was committed from Twin Falls county a mental wreck-of-a man to the state hospital for insane at Blackfoot.
 He is an ex-service man. His examination to determine his mental responsibility followed his arrest and detention on a minor criminal charge, the poisoning of some toads.
 The man was found to be mentally incompetent. Efforts were made by the American Legion to secure institutional care for him in a government hospital for ex-service men. The hospital at Boise turned down the case on the grounds that it was not equipped to handle mental cases.
 Efforts were then started looking to

ward securing hospitalization for the man in one of the hospitals that handles mental cases. The hospital was full and could not take the case.

Legion officials were still determined to go further in their efforts to get their comrade in a government institution in the belief that the greater corrective care that might be expected from a federal institution would enhance his chances to be salvaged and returned to useful citizenship. The efforts failed, and the ex-soldier was committed to the state institution.

The Twin Falls post of the American Legion asked of an authority in Washington why government hospital facilities are not equal to the need for taking care of those who served in its military forces whose minds have broken. In essence, the local Legion men found that the government does not take the protestations of the American Legion so seriously as formerly when the Legion speaks in behalf of its comrades whose lives have been crippled as a result of war experiences.

Why does not the government heed the Legion's pleadings? For the reason that the Legion's membership of less than a half million out of the more than five million who saw service is not considered sufficient to make a real mandate to the government. Get a bigger representation of your eligible men within your organization before you seek to impose your will on the government, is the gist of what the organized ex-service men's body has been told.

A more reprehensible attitude cannot easily be imagined. The government's debt is not to the American Legion for anything the Legion has done, or may do. The debt is to disabled veterans. The government, we have a right to infer, is not concerned over the principle of justice in handling the cases of disabled veterans, but is responsive only in the measure that political pressure is brought to bear. What splendor of idealism!

Once upon a time young men joined the army to help make the world safe for democracy. The style in slogans should be changed to meet the difference in spirit in 1917 and 1929. Ex-service men now should join the Legion to help salvage their comrades and comrades. And they should do so now!

SAFE, DESPITE ACCIDENTS
 ALTHOUGH 384 persons were killed in airplane accidents in the United States last year, a writer in the current Review of Reviews demonstrates that traveling by a modern transport airplane is practically as safe as traveling by automobile, train or steamship.

Only 13 of these 384 casualties occurred to passengers on authorized air lines. The vast majority of those figuring in accidents were stunt flyers, amateurs who had not learned how to handle their planes, army and navy flyers engaged in experimentation and others following the more risky branches of aviation.

When you book passage in a recognized transport plane, your chance of being killed is only 1 in 4000. That safety margin ought to be nearly wide enough to suit anybody.

Apples and beans will soon be harvested, if the weather man behaves himself in a seemly fashion. Then will come the spud harvest, then fall plowing. A busy crop year hastens rapidly to its conclusion.

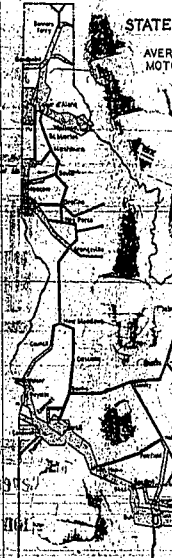
