It will be observed that the Twin Falls rate is 1 1/2 cents higher than that from Shoshone a 12 cents higher, the Boise rate is 9 cents out of the line and the Caldwell rate is 10 cents higher than is charged for hauling the same product an equal distance to one of the great lake ports.

Note that the Missouri export rate to Portland is 16 cents lower than that of the Twin Falls rate. This is because the Twin Falls rate is not a southern Idaho rate too high!

Should it require a suit to deal with the interstate commerce commission in such a case, the Idaho growers should be ready to stand up for the rate of friendship and fair play. It is not peace preferable to war or litigation. Since our farmers produce the crops that maintain towns and districts why should they not have treatment on a par with that given growers elsewhere?

EUROPE WANTS CHEAPER AUTOS

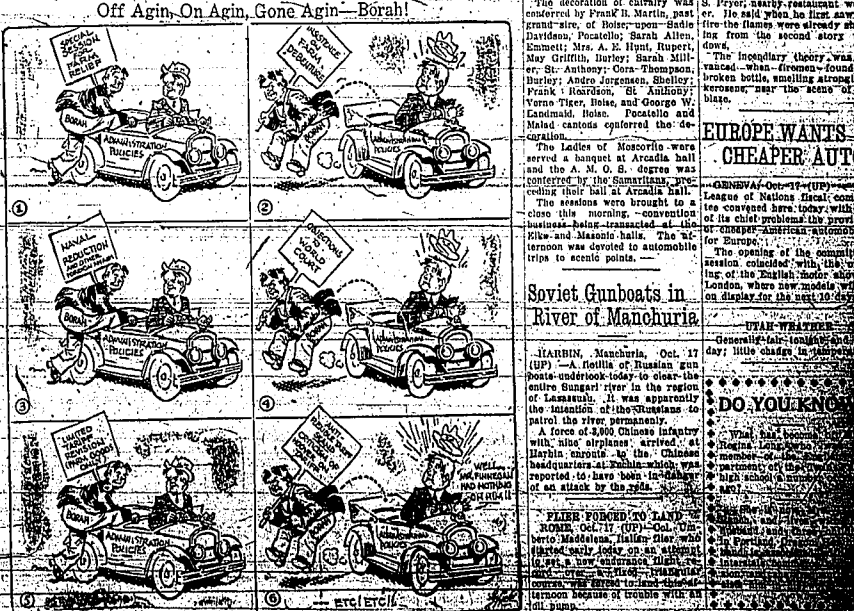
GENEVA, Oct. 17 (UPI)—The League of Nations fiscal committee today reported that Europe wants cheaper automobiles.

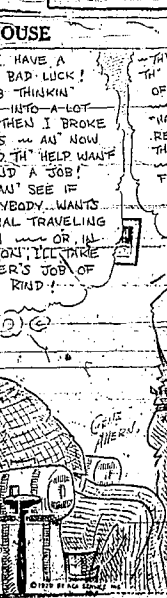

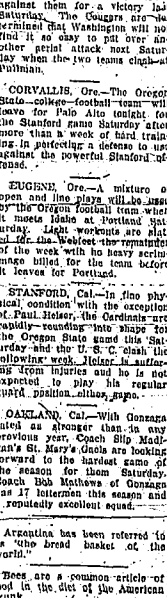

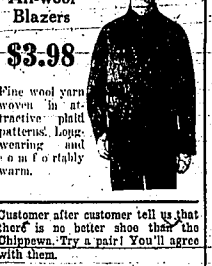
