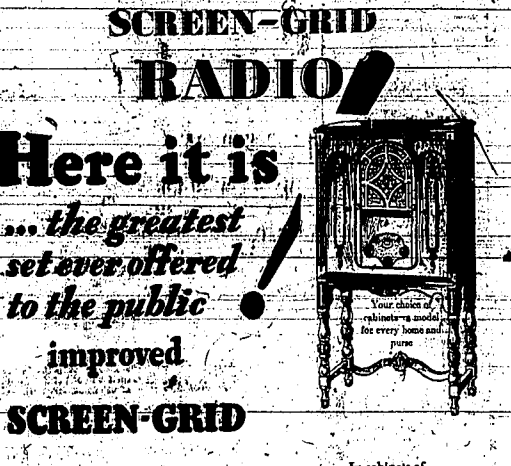

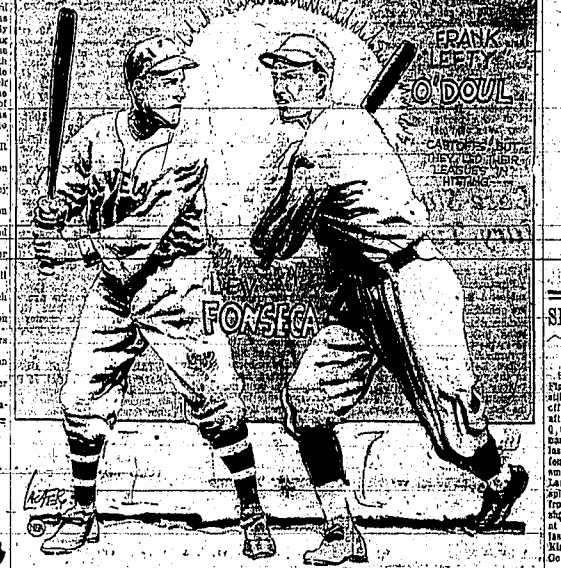

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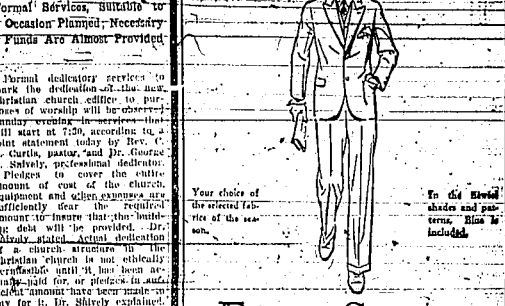

society, business and public activity. We publish them, formal complaints, trials when they merit it, and the findings of the court. We do not discriminate and make the rule apply equally to a poor man and then refuse to apply it in the case of a rich, or influential man. In our news handling, we treat all alike.

We handle all traffic cases whether they are important or petty. The reason for this is that traffic accidents have come to have a very important place as a cause of much human suffering and property damage.

Out of an experience in newspaper work that has been gained in some eight or ten cities, the writer has never worked in a community that made so little fuss about news items. Occasionally, however, a case of publicity given according to our fast practice is resented by someone who thinks he or she should be exempted of notice in such a connection.

We do not make exceptions, nor grant exemptions. We like people and will do everything we honestly and ethically can to do to make their lives easier, but we are not now, and never will, help them to the extent of giving them one kind of treatment and then turning around and doing the exact opposite in the case of someone else.

Self respect, fairness and good business dictate that the rights of people be treated impartially when their acts get into the news. This statement is made so that our readers can appreciate our principles of publishing.

THE FANS' SPORTSMANSHIP THE American baseball fan is usually supposed to be pretty hardboiled. "Volives," the players call their audiences—and sometimes the audience live up to the appellation.

Yet, when you consider the recent world series, you'll have to admit that baseball fans can show a pretty fine sense of sportsmanship, on occasion.

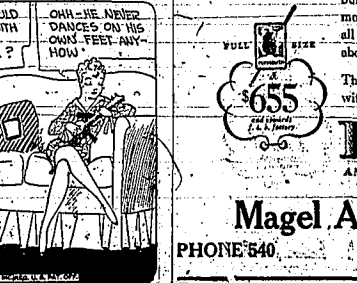

DISPARITY ON FREIGHT RATES ON GRAIN IS VIGOROUSLY PROTESTED

Portland Attorney Tells Growers of the Pacific Northwest that those in other sections of the country with regard to freight rates.

Explained to Commissioner Mayo the great dissatisfaction felt by wheat growers in Oregon, Washington and Idaho over the preferential treatment which the railroads have accorded other grain flowing sections through temporary voluntary reductions upon wheat and wheat products.

Commissioner Mayo and Chairman Lester of the federal farm board against the disparity of treatment accorded wheat

transported from Buffalo to north Atlantic ports consists of Canadian wheat and flour imported from Canada wheat. It seems large enough to wheat growers of the far northwest to have preferential rates by American carriers, without rubbing it in by giving similar preferential rates to American carriers to their competitors across the international boundary line in Canada.

The temporary voluntary rate upon wheat grain from Buffalo to the north Atlantic ports of New York, a distance of about 400 miles, was 7 cents a bushel, just one half of what the wheat growers of the inland Empire are paying for that distance.

In his discussion with Chairman Lester, Geary "batter" that he had urged that the federal farm board use its influence with the railroads to prevent grain growers of the Pacific northwest from being discriminated against, by voluntary reduction to Atlantic and Gulf ports only. Lester pointed out, however, that the temporary reductions to north Atlantic ports were in effect September 30 and the rate situation is entirely in the hands of the interstate-commerce commission.
