WORLD WAR IS TEXT OF BOOK STUDIED

The highly gripping and informative book, "WORLD WAR ON THE WESTERN FRONT," written by Georges Remarque, setting down accurately the stark actualities of the butchering hostiles.

There were 140 cows tested out of 550 cows in the 23 herds tested by the Pioneer Dairy Herd Improvement association during the month of September. The average production per cow was 40 pounds of butterfat. The average production for the month was 25.3 pounds of butterfat and 645 pounds of milk, according to the report of W. J. Byrne, official.

High in the large herd division was the one of 29 Holsteins and Jersey cattle owned by John Gott of Twin Falls, produced an average of 32 pounds of butterfat and 865 pounds of milk. The medium size class herd of Mr. Foster, of Rockwood, 11 cows, January, was high with 25.8 pounds of butterfat and 871 pounds of milk. In the small herd class George Evans of Elmore, with 10 cows, January, was high with 44.4 pounds of butterfat and 1119 pounds of milk. 



## REFORMERS IN PEKING RENEW QUEUE ATTACK

Undaunted by previous failure, the faction seeks to abolish many ancient customs.

PEKING (UPI)—Undaunted by their failures during the past two years in attempting to eliminate the queue, the Nationalist municipal government is making a new onslaught on bound feet, queues and the festival of the Chinese New Year.

The most recent campaign of the Kuomintang reformers is heralded by a decree that all queues must be cut off by January 1st and that all bound feet yet hopelessly deformed shall be unbound before that date.

At the same time, another decree has been issued stating that the Chinese New Year festival must not be celebrated in 1930. The reformers also a decree—referred to as "queue-free"—that no longer has been issued, stating that the Chinese New Year festival must not be celebrated in 1930.

For Clue to Queues.—Thus the people gradually went ahead with their plans after lists of decrees were issued by the leaders of the reformers at mass meetings and in small gatherings. The Chinese New Year festival in 1929 was observed by the Chinese, who abandoned the strict formalities as being superior to that in any recent year.

The reformers have encountered a strong difficulty with those tenacious old who stick to their queues. Decrees against queues and bound feet have been issued since the foundation of the Chinese Republic in 1912. Several such decrees have been issued since the Nationalists assumed power in 1924. But a few old-fashioned queue-men stick to their "pigtails."

When the Nationalists came into Peking they found that more feet must be bound and that women with bound feet must remain—the buildings within the city were filled with decrees against queues. But three months passed, and the decrees were not obeyed.

An official who decided that a little more time was necessary to instruct the people, and another three months' extension was granted. Some progress may have been made but not enough and apparently the case is still open.


