





OUR RAILROAD TRIBUTE

FROM THE beginning of its history, Idaho has been compelled to pay more than it should for its freight haul. The state is far removed from the big central markets, and the southern part of Idaho has not been blessed with competing rail lines. As a result rates have been high. They have been high beyond all reason.

Data gathered by the Idaho State Association on livestock shipments by S. M. Coffin, secretary, tell the following story:

During 1926 Idaho shipped 14,827 carloads of horses, cattle, sheep and hogs to the leading markets and paid an overcharge for freight amounting to \$326,996.03.

This overcharge, as compared with rates prevailing for other more favored districts with approximately the same length of haul, amounted, per car, to \$24.59 on horses, \$21.12 on cattle, \$19.80 on sheep and \$26.60 on hogs.

Those figures are for the average. To some markets the discrimination against Idaho livestock shippers is much greater as the following comparative figures will show:

Average freight per-car to San Francisco from Utah points, Brigham to Five Points, inclusive, averaging 814 miles:

Horses, \$189.90; cattle, \$156.10; sheep, \$156.70; hogs, single deck cars, \$127; double deck cars, \$164.05.

Average freight per-car to Idaho points, Buhl to Minidoka, averaging 761 miles:

Horses, \$204.55, an overcharge of \$14.65; cattle, \$171.45; an overcharge of \$15.35; sheep, \$179.50, an overcharge of \$15.80; hogs, single deck car, \$151.23, an overcharge of \$23.35; hogs, double deck, \$224.05, an overcharge to Idaho of \$60.

The following comparisons are for freight charges from Montana points, Garrison to Monida, inclusive, to Chicago, average distance 1770 miles; and to Chicago from Idaho points, Weiser to Twin Falls, averaging 1763 miles:

Montana, horses, \$263; Idaho, horses, \$291.80, an overcharge to Idaho shippers of \$28.80 per car.

Montana, cattle, \$218.40; Idaho, cattle, \$230.36, an overcharge to Idaho of \$11.96 per car.

Montana, sheep, \$209.30; Idaho, sheep, \$223.10, an overcharge to Idaho of \$13.80 per car.

Montana, hogs, single deck, \$198.90; Idaho, hogs, single, \$230.35, an overcharge to Idaho of \$31.45 per car.

Comparisons of rates to Missouri River points from Montana points, Garrison to Monida, inclusive, averaging 1232 miles; and from Idaho points, Weiser to Twin Falls, inclusive, averaging 1275 miles:

Montana, horses, \$227 per car; Idaho, \$242.20, an overcharge to Idaho of \$16.20 per car.

Montana, cattle, \$179.40; Idaho, cattle, \$195, an overcharge to Idaho of \$16.50 per car.

Montana, sheep, \$174.80; Idaho,

sheep, \$188.60, an overcharge to Idaho of \$13.80 per car.

Montana, hogs, single deck car, \$168.30; Idaho, hogs, single deck car, \$199.32, an overcharge to Idaho of \$31.02 per car.

The Montana rate on hogs east means nothing because Montana ships no hogs east, railroad officials have informed us, but Montana does ship cattle and sheep east. Why is the Montana rate lower than the Idaho rate?

Why is Idaho in the position of having to pay this extra tribute in the way of freight rates?

Best Editorial of the Day

A CANDID SLANT AT CHICAGO

The rattle of machine guns and the popping of automatic pistols, levied with murderous intent by gangster at gangster, is only a vague echo of the days of the "Wild West." It is not, however, for this we have the word of an able agent of Justice, for one Pat Roche, chief investigator for the state's attorney's office, who is said to have made the entire gangster bandit gang that he helped to bring down. This has given him a good deal of somber, since so many authorities on the theme have of late years passed abruptly onward to the valley where the wicked cease from troubling the weary in spirit, and he has said that he will be willing to "accept the statement" that Mr. Roche speaks with authority when he says:

There won't be much more of that stuff. The days of the gun are past. If there is killing this town will stand up to fight. They can't make a dime. They had a taste of following the massacre of the Moran gang, and don't want to taste again.

Up to now we are greatly mystified in the appearance, this is, a cynical, unashamed administration that, through a "direct" relation between the official and toward a closed or open city and the criminal, has put the state's gangster bandit gang, in all probability, in a much more or less than a dead lock, and that the gangsters are picking their teeth with an incentive of future running and selling with a minimum of official hindrance and even with official knowledge and tolerance. The threat of the death penalty, which would be the end of all their livelihood, is obvious. Rather than suffer financial loss they are expected to forego the sin of murdering one another.

Mr. Roche is quoted correctly and it is based upon the facts. It seems to be an admission that, but for a flavor traffic which can be stopped by authority of the state, the gangsters would never have occurred, blood. Gentlemen who sip their cocktails and toast each other over their highballs in all the saloons in Chicago, cannot escape the direct responsibility for the gangster bandit gang. They evade the ugly charge that is also self-evident. If Chicago can be cleaned up, as we told it can—so much time, why isn't it cleaned up? Chicago waits for another gang war to prompt another visit.


