Italian Demand For Naval Parity With France Stands As Possible Bar To Accord

LONDON, Nov. 7 (UP)—Serious obstacles facing the forthcoming five-power conference are reported under discussion today in British conversations with representatives of Italy, France and Japan. The Italian demand for parity with France, in addition to the opposition of Japan to the abolition of submarines, has been cited as one of the most dangerous obstacles ahead of the conference.

DO YOU feel that you could really do something worth while if you had more time, if you were freed of annoyances, if your surroundings were pleasant? All of us do. But the chances are that if you really want to do something, conditions won't stop you—and this is strikingly set forth by Charles G. Norris in a current magazine. Mr. Norris relates how his wife, Kathleen Norris, now one of the country's most distinguished novelists, wrote her first successful long story:

"We were down in a Long Island boarding house at Freeport. With our small baby we had one room under the roof. The new addition to the family was an exacting one, and Mrs. Norris had little time—in fact, she had none at all—in which to write. Only at night, when the baby was asleep, was she free—Even then the noise of her typewriter would wake him, and she was forced to carry her manuscript to the living room. Every night was a sweltering one. The parlor was filled with people, some playing cards, some at the piano, laughing, talking or singing. And everyone was eager to ask Mrs. Norris what she was writing and to give advice."

Could you assemble more handiaps to literary effort than those? Nevertheless, the story, "Mother," was written, and in one form or another it has set a sales record of more than 950,000 copies in the years since.

A DESERVED REBUKE
HIRAM BINGHAM, senator from Connecticut, was censured by the United States senate the other day in a way that is new. A resolution expressing

censure of him for secretly employing an employe of the Connecticut Manufacturing association to assist in framing tariff legislation was adopted by a vote of 54 to 22.

Senator Bingham deserved the rebuke. In the light of the disclosures made since the matter came to light he probably deserves more than a mere rebuke. A good many persons are asking whether he should be occupying the high office of a senator.

We need not feel, however, that all will be as pure as perfume of roses with tariff legislation just because the senate has slapped Bingham's wrist. Tariff legislation, if we knew all about it, probably would be more smelly than sweet.

It is reported that American farmers living near the Canadian line in Montana and North Dakota haul their wheat across the line to Canadian warehouses to sell it. After paying 12 cents a bushel duty they net 30 cents a bushel more than they could get in this country. That situation is either a high compliment to the Canadian wheat marketing arrangement or else a terrific slam at the marketing methods in this country.

HIS RESIGNATION IN ORDER

Boise Capital News
There will, of course, be a wide difference of opinion over the action of the United States senate in rebuking one of its members, something it has not done for a matter of a century.

His frown of disapproval fell upon Senator Bingham of Connecticut, former Idaho senator and now in action, because he employed as his secretary an officer of the Connecticut Manufacturers' association.

That employment gave the attitude necessary to the confidential tariff meetings of senate committees. Naturally, as his association is engaged in a protective tariff, it was kept fully informed as to what was going on in schedule making.

There can, however, be no difference of opinion as to the ability involved in the episode. Even the condemned senator admits he was in error in not informing his colleagues as to the relationship of his secretary with the manufacturers' association.

The suggestion that the entire episode is that Senator Bingham, a man of extensive education and experience, fails to differentiate between duty to the people as a whole and duty to a small group of manufacturing constituents.

To be the instrument or the cause of divulging valuable legislative information to the advantage of a few and the disadvantage of the many, using the cloak of his office to shield his acts, virtually makes the senator from Connecticut from holding office.

The censure virtually annuls the effectiveness of Senator Bingham as an influential member of the United States senate. He has lost by vote to his constituents—the people of his state.

There must be definite and fixed rules of conduct in public office. Once they are transgressed, the cause of the people is in jeopardy. The senator from Connecticut may not realize it, but having lost the confidence of the people and his colleagues, his resignation is in order.

FREIGHT CHARGES

IN ONE of the most comprehensive broad-minded editorials on freight rates that has appeared in a long time, recently published by the Portland Oregonian and reprinted in the Evening Times Tuesday, the following significant paragraph appeared:

The rate structure of the whole country was built during a period when each railroad was free to follow its own devices in capturing traffic for which other roads actively competed, was free also to foster certain industries by various forms of discrimination. It was formed according to no general principle of law or equity. It already existed when the interstate commerce law introduced such principles, which required an entirely new structure. That would be such a tremendous labor, consuming so many years, that before the commission could complete revision it would need to begin again in order to adjust rates to new conditions. Railroads no longer occupy the entire field of transportation. They have to compete with intercoastal ships, trucks and buses, bare lines on inland waterways, and now with airplanes.

Rates were fixed in a rather haphazard manner a good many years ago. If competing lines served a territory, competition took care of the matter of rates after a fashion, and the territory was not penalized. If competition did not exist, the rates were fixed on a high basis, and the territory not blessed with rail competition paid high rates. It had no other alternative, except to dispense with the service of railroad transportation an impossibility.

Probably this lack of competition is one of the reasons why this part of Idaho is discriminated against in the matter of freight rates. In competition for westbound traffic from Montana against the Hill roads, the rate on wheat to Portland, for instance, was reduced to a lower figure than prevails for this part of Idaho. Because of competition for business Montana wheat farms beat this part of Idaho several cents per bushel on wheat, whether the movement is eastbound, or westbound.

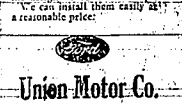
In view of the fact that the J. P. Nevell study on wheat rates for the Oregon public service commission has not been controverted and that it shows rates as they apply in Oregon could be reduced 50 per cent and still provide a reasonable return for the carriers this part of Idaho finds it impossible to believe anything else except that it is being discriminated against in this matter of freight rates.

Few there are who will be surprised that October's bank clearings in Twin Falls established a new record in volume and none who will not be gratified over the good showing.

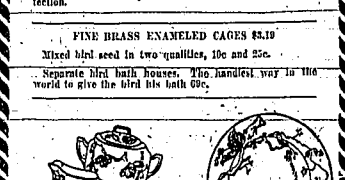

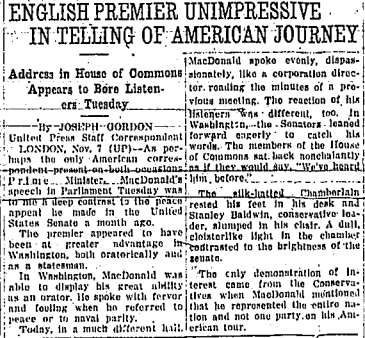
