And remember that out of the impulse generated by the common people when they are united in their demands is formed that titanic force, public opinion, which is the master of statesmen.

#### \$600 PER ACRE

THE Union Pacific system undoubtedly is interested in the fruit industry in the state of Idaho. It has a right to be vitally interested, as the following figures should show:

John W. Hardin of Kimberly is one of the pioneer apple men who has kept on the job through thick and thin and ups and downs.

During this year he has paid the railroad company \$80,000 for freight. He has a 50-acre orchard. He shipped in six carloads of baskets and one and a half carloads of boxes. He shipped out 70 carloads of apples. The freight on his apples cost \$378 per car, he said, with \$13 per car added for ice and ice service. That brings the total bill for outbound freight to \$27,370. The freight on baskets and boxes brought the total up to \$30,000.

And a freight bill of \$30,000 against 50 acres of apple orchard makes an average of \$600 per acre.

This newspaper does not attempt to convey the impression that the freight bill was too high because it does not know whether the charges were equitable and fair. On wheat rates applying in Idaho we are convinced that Idaho is grossly discriminated against, even on the present scale of rates applying in other districts that can ship at cheaper costs. Maybe the same is true in apples, though we do not make the claim that this is true.

There is apparently no room for argument that Mr. Hardin paid \$600 per acre freight on his apple crop this year.

#### WHERE BUSINESS GOES

IN THIS day of keen competition for business, the pithy statement by Perry B. Arnold, made yesterday before a local civic club, should have a message for all business men.

"Business today goes where it is invited and stays where it is appreciated," is the way he expressed his philosophy of success in selling.

Another statement quoted from Babbson by the business analyst and sales counsellor should be pondered by those who merchandise good: "Selling today is where manufacturing was 100 years ago."


