NEW YORK, Nov. 14 (UP)—Only 15 major football teams in the country remain undefeated and nine of this select group face dangerous rivals Saturday.

NEW PATTERNS FOR NEW DAYS

TO SERVE this rich valley of Idaho with railroad transportation a branch line from Minidoka to Twin Falls was built more than 20 years ago and then, a couple of years later, was extended to Buhl, the present terminal point. The railroad demanded that this territory guarantee interest on the investment if the road should prove unprofitable. No interest ever had to be put up directly by this territory because the road paid from the start.

A good many years later the Union Pacific system built from Rogerson south to Wells a cutoff that reduced materially the distance of the haul to California points. This cutoff was built only as a last resort by the railroad, and Idaho and Nevada communities raised considerable money out of their own pockets to help the venture. This money was raised after some promises had been made by the railroad of definite things it would do in Idaho and Nevada communities delivered the cash, but some of the most important promises made by representatives of the Union Pacific system are still nothing except promises.

In the light of accumulated facts over a period of years this part of Idaho is convinced that the Union Pacific system is willing to carry the Rogerson-Wells cutoff along as a weak link and to keep the son just as weak as possible to the advantage of the older and stronger sons. The railroad, we may safely assume, would loudly denounce any such parental intentions; this part of Idaho, however, has watched long enough to be able to discount any such protest.

Southern Idaho has been making efforts for many years to get a shorter outlet to California markets. Two of these efforts have been tied up in the fight for the Crane-Crescent Lake cutoff through Oregon, and the Nyssa-Winnemucca cutoff. No success has resulted from either of these fights, nor did the Homestead-Lewis outlet north yield anything except defeat.

A new pattern of transportation outlet is needed for Southern Idaho. It is quite significant that when the Union Pacific system is being assailed for some of its other construction work it talks about extending a Buhl-branch to the main line. This kind of talk has been indulged in at least twice, but when it comes down to brass tacks and turkey officials assure us that talk of the Buhl branch extension was not authorized.

Extension of the Buhl branch offers a solution to three problems of rail transportation that are of vital concern to this part of Idaho.

It would shorten the distance from Twin Falls to the Pacific coast about 100 miles.

It would shorten the haul of Boise valley points to California more than 200 miles by way of Twin Falls and Wells.

It would get the best part of Idaho to get some benefit from the Rogerson-Wells cutoff.

We may assume quite safely that the Union Pacific will say that prospective traffic does not justify the extension. We refuse to admit that claim. We do

declare positively that public convenience does call for such a step in railroad construction.

POLICE CHIEF, EDUCATOR

WHILE the theory of all sorts of preventive work has been explained to many of us times without number it will be information extraordinary to a large number of local people to be told that the chief of police of Twin Falls has been doing a material amount of straight educational work during recent months in efforts to prevent traffic accidents.

These efforts have taken the form of talks delivered to special groups. Chief Leighton has discussed various phases of the traffic problems that result in accidents. He gives these talks as a result of special requests made to him.

He has talked to Grange bodies and explained traffic restrictions. Most of his talks, however, have been delivered to dependents of concerns that have to employ on motor truck delivery as an cardinal part of their service. It is interesting to note, too, that companies that have availed themselves of this special instruction have profited by a marked reduction of losses chargeable to traffic accidents.

STABILIZING PROSPERITY

THE importance of the group life insurance scheme, which more and more business organizations are adopting for their employes, is shown in figures just issued by B. A. Page, vice president of the Travelers Insurance company, who announces that approximately \$80,000,000 will be paid out this year to the families of some 53,000 workers insured under the group plan. This averages nearly \$1500 per family—a sum that is larger than the estate left by 65 per cent of the country's wage earners. Thus the wages or salary of many individual workers have been projected into the future a year or more beyond death.

The payment of these sums to insure money not only serves to save many families from suffering; it acts as a strong stabilizer of the country's prosperity. Eighty million dollars is no small contribution to the nation's annual buying power.

FIRST GRAIN REGION TO ORGANIZE

Portland Oregonian

Formation of the North Pacific Grain Growers' Association as the first regional unit of the Farmers' National Grain organization extends to the chief farm industry of the Pacific northwest the benefits of agricultural marketing acts. This is the first of the five regional units through which the federal and local units will be gathered in the national corporation, rightly it is the first organized, for though the Pacific northwest produces a comparatively small proportion of the total American wheat crop, at least four-fifths of it is so exported. The primary purpose of the federal farm marketing act is to provide means for disposal of surplus crops that service for this section will have an importance to the whole wheat industry from the Pacific northwest to the Pacific northwest's share of the national surplus, not to its share of the national crop.

Great work is in prospect for the regional co-operation. It has to gather farmers into local units, these into district units and finally into the national body. This reorganizing involves instruction of farmers in the use of legal agreements, contracting of contracts by means of operating to sell grain to the corporation or to market grain through it for a special period or appointing it agent for marketing. The regional corporation will need to have less or build warehouses and elevators at interior shipping points, and at terminal ports. It will obtain loans from the farm board and from intermediate credit banks in order to make loans on wheat stored with it for sale or buy wheat. Direction and advice in these matters will be given by W. A. Schoenfeld, representative of the board in this region, who has been stationed at Portland for several years as agent of the bureau of agricultural economics.

As the North Pacific Cooperative gains strength and extend its activities, we may expect to see a change in the methods of marketing the crop of wheat after harvest that has usually consisted of railroads and elevated elevators at terminal ports will shrink until it ceases. Foreign buyers will gradually lose power to depress prices, by staying out of the market as they have done recently. When will not only wheat and wheat products will cease to worry farmers; for they will either have sold it to the cooperative or will have delivered it under a sales contract and have received a substantial advance on it. There will be a steady flow to port through the sea.

Farmers in each agricultural industry will hereafter have a sales agency of large proportions as that of any great manufacturing corporation, which will not only sell their products but will give them the information on supply and demand throughout the world and on everything pertaining to their business. The days of last-or-never growing and selling of crops are past.

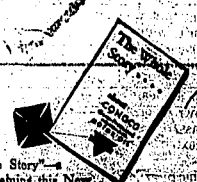
