IDAHO A BRIGHT SPOT

ACCORDING to news accounts of the proceedings of the national convention of the Grange in Seattle, formal reports by state Grange masters indicate that the four western states of Idaho, California, Oregon and Washington have had the best year in agricultural lines and have more confidence in the immediate future than any other states in the country.

Spring floods in some parts of the country, followed by drought in the summer, reduced the corn crop in some of the states in the middle western districts.

In one way or the West may be pardoned a smile over the situation. All of us regret any misfortune to others—that should be understood without saying—but it is a bit of irony that the Grange has drawn delegates from representatives from all over the country to the west coast and that proceeds to tell "our and show" that the West is forging ahead agriculturally.

It is of especial significance to this part of Idaho to know that representatives of the Grange from the West in their reports have indicated that one of the greatest needs to improve the condition of agriculture is adequate rail facilities. Another is highways that lead into market centers.

Twin Falls folks are "easy pickins" according to the opinion held of us by those more astute than clean "knights of the road" as reported in this newspaper the other day in a feature news story. That part of the population which works hard at trying to get along with a minimum of formal labor finds people here soft-hearted. Officials, including the police, are not "easy marks", but the people are. This information is brought to public attention again for such action as may seem wisest to individual householders.

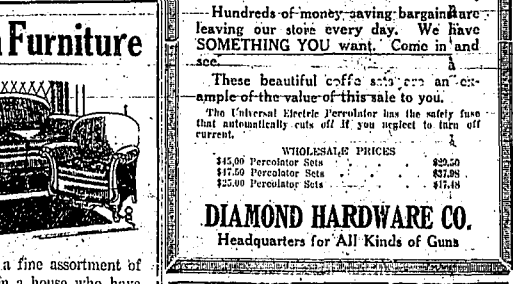
Former Alaska Residents Visit

PART OF THE FARM PROBLEM... A COMPARISON of the amount of indebtedness of the industry of farming with the amount of debts the allied governments owed the United States for war loans at the end of the war was made recently by Gray Silver of West Virginia, long prominent in national farm organizations and credited with having been the organizer of the farm bloc in congress. His comparison throws the farm problem out in bold relief.

When the war closed agriculture had a valuation of about 80 billions of dollars and owed debts amounting to about four billions... At present agriculture owes in excess of 14 billions of dollars. The allied war debt to the United States when the war ended was between nine and ten billions, but it was agreed that this sum was more than they could pay, so the sum was reduced to half that amount, notwithstanding the fact that the nations owing us this sum had aggregate population of 150,000,000 people.

The new federal farm bill is the legislation that was finally evolved after 10 years of effort as a solution of the farm problem. Government money becomes available to agriculture for its use in carrying and marketing farm products. The workings of the federal farm board law will help some in the marketing of farm products. It is conceded on every side, but that it will provide a solution to the handling of those commodities of which we produce a surplus which has to be sold on the world market few of who are informed will concede.

What comes under this latter heading—and wheat-growers are not going to be convinced that their problem of receiving a reasonable price will be solved by distribution even of the magnitude possible under government financial backing... A way to increase the low world price so that wheat that is exported can command a price that will permit a profit is sought now as it has been sought for more than eight years.

The debenture plan is now being considered. It would compensate the grower of wheat that is sold on world price for export out of the federal funds one half the tariff on wheat, or 21 cents per bushel. The plan provides no check to keep production at its present status, or to force it lower. The McNary-Haugen equalization fee did have this feature, that the bonus paid on wheat for export should be provided by funds contributed out of the selling

price of all wheat sold. Machinery was thus set up to help wheat-growers minimize the penalty inflicted on them because they produced a slight margin more of wheat than we need for our own supplies and placed on them the responsibility of keeping acreage and production down by the prospect that if production gained too much, the bonus paid would be equalized, or even exceeded by the tax on all wheat required to assure the bonus.
