Noted Flier Believed Lost In Arctic Wastes

FEARS FELT FOR SAFETY OF FLIERS. CARL B. EILSON DARING AVIATOR UNREPORTED AFTER TAKING RESCUE FLIGHT IN STORM. HAS NOT BEEN HEARD FROM SINCE NOV. 9TH. ONCE SIGHTED BY NATIVES OFF NORTH CAPE BUT FAILED TO LAND.

Secretary Good Passes Away Monday Night At Capital

Death Comes Peacefully After Cabinet Member Had Lingered For Hours In Comatose Condition

WASHINGTON, Nov. 19 (UP)—Secretary of War James William Good, 63, died at the Walter Reed hospital here at 8:30 o'clock last night of complications which followed an operation last Wednesday for acute appendicitis. Death came after Good had lingered in a semi-conscious condition for more than 24 hours, a victim of peritonitis infection spreading through the blood stream. He died peacefully without regaining consciousness. Only his robust vitality, maintained through Saturday afternoon when physicians virtually abandoned all hope.

"I have never lost a fight in my life," Good told his physicians shortly before he sank into the long comatose which ended in his death, "and I am not going to lose this one."

NEW YORK, Nov. 19 (UP)—Lloyd Carl Eilson, the famous "blind spot" flier of the Arctic, headed his plane into a blizzard off the Siberian coast on Nov. 9 and has not been heard from since. Officials of the aviation corporation here today received advice from "Teller," Alaska, today that Eilson had started on another flight to rescue Norton, stranded on the ice. Eilson was reported to have the Arctic flier. He already had made one flight to the vessel.

Today's message was received from Frank Dehrbrakt of the Alaska Airways, Inc., at Teller, It said: "Eilson and I left Teller for North Cape, Siberia, on Nov. 9. Our hope was to turn back. Eilson went on. There was a blizzard and it was storming then. Eilson was struck by a north wind off North Cape but did not land. Visibility was poor. We kept trying to locate him."

Chances Not Hopeless. Officials said that unless Eilson was seen and returned landing the chances were good that he was alive and unharmed. They said he had ample provisions for a week and carried firearms. Report said Eilson had a motor launch and a small boat. Eilson was international pilot when he and Sir Hubert Wilkins flew across the "blind spot" of the Arctic from Point Barrow to Spitzbergen. Although he had had ample opportunities to engage in lucrative aviation projects in more temperate climates, Eilson prefers the perils of the Arctic. He is the head and organizing spirit of Alaska Airways, Inc.

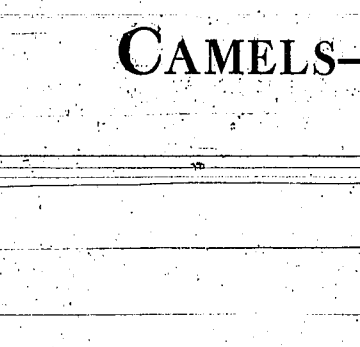

between the value of the grain on the day the farmer chooses to sell and the 75 or 80 per cent advanced to the farmer at the time he delivered the grain.

The stockkeeper or middleman who so acquires the grain from the farmer on the basis of the price to be fixed, then sells the grain on a similar basis to a middleman, broker or exporting firm. "The net result is that the grain almost immediately after it comes under the control of the exporter who is obliged to take delivery, as middleman and brokers also lack storage facilities.

The terms of the contracts "a fijar precio" differ considerably. They always specify for an advance to the man who disposes of the grain; such advance being from 75 to 80 per cent of the value on the day of delivery but in some cases the middleman actually advances the farmer less. In some cases the contract provides that the seller of the grain shall pay interest on the money so advanced at from 6 to 8 per cent.

In general, however, the stockkeeper does not charge the farmer interest and the leading grain exporters also state that they do not charge interest on advances which they make on grain which they take at a price to be fixed.

THREE R'S—THEN AND NOW

BOYS and girls of America are not only being taught a wider variety of subjects in the public schools of today than was taught in former years, but their training in the fundamentals, known of old as the "three R's", is more effective than it was in the early days of education. Dr. W. D. Vincent, commissioner of education, told an audience at Jerome recently.

To illustrate this declaration, the commissioner cited a case showing the comparative ability of students 80 years ago and students of the present day. A list of words used in a spelling test about 80 years ago in a Boston school was resurrected. The list was used as a regular lesson for a class in the school with the result that the class scored a 100 per cent grade on it. The class 80 years before had had a material number of grades of less than 70.

The new method taught in reading today also enables boys and girls of today to read much more rapidly without any reduction in the information secured than is true of those who learned to read under the old system. Commissioner Vincent stated that his 14-year-old son can read three times as rapidly as he reads. The difference comes in the fact that modern reading is done by the line, whereas present day adults read by the word.

Sometimes it seems that the public has a tendency to think that educational standards of the "old days" reached a high standard never since equalled. Educators, of course, know better. Some of the rest of the public does not.

Testimonial advertising seems to be dying a natural death. Whereas a few months ago the average business man would not have admitted that he would not use his testimonial because it helped Captain Priest sell his ship or chew Elevator gum brand sticks, now when men are playing the violin, they now seem barren of such appeals.

Most of it is no doubt due to the ever-changing character of advertising, the constant quest for new forms of appeal, the real and imaginary needs of the reader, but the growing belief that testimonial advertisements were hurting the integrity of all advertising also played a part.

There is undoubtedly something to be said for the testimonial advertisement. It is clear that this type of advertising pays the advertiser for a time at least. If that were not the case there would not have been so much of it. But there is bound to remain a large element of suspicion of such advertising. That is the natural legacy from the days when cures of cancer, tuberculosis and the like were heralded with the most extravagant testimonials.

Advertising can not afford anything which lessens the value of advertising itself, which is so indispensable to distribution in our modern, crowded days. It has to be not only honest, but it has to be, even a little more than that. It must be honest enough to appear that way to any reasonable reader.

"Trick" advertising cheats itself in the long run. Trying to sell a thing because the Prince of Wales has bought it isn't as sound a selling prospect as the honest, should buy it.

Where the whole force of a testimonial is merely the use of a name, the practice is unworthy of the dignity of business and ought to be discontinued. Where the purpose of the name is merely to gain a customer's genuine statement of the merits of the goods involved, the objection does not apply.

NEVADA PLANS TO BUILD

THE information received here that Nevada has tentative plans for constructing 45 1/2 miles of the Wells-Connolly link of the highway that serves traffic south-out-of-Idaho-through-Twin Falls is good news and will be gladly received in this part of Idaho.

The total distance from Wells to Contact is 53 miles, so with the completion of the Nevada 1930 program here will still be a gap of unimproved road, but the gap will be much shorter than it is at present.

Idaho completed its part of the highway to the Nevada state line early in 1929. It was understood here that Nevada would do its part of the work without delay so the entire stretch would be available for interstate traffic. The present year passed, however, without any work being done by our southern neighbor, and failure on the part of Nevada to do its construction has had the inevitable effect of causing both states to fail to realize on the expenditure made by Idaho.

Performance by Nevada of the program of work as tentatively outlined will automatically bring about benefits to both states of far reaching extent. Idaho welcomes this decision of Nevada to build 45 1/2 miles of the highway. Not only will Nevada profit by the work, but Idaho will also be the gainer.

HOW ARGENTINE WHEAT IS SOLD

THE inadequacy of storage and credit facilities in the interior has led to a special method of selling grain in Argentina, according to a report received in the Foreign Service of the Bureau of Agricultural Economics from American Consul General George S. Messersmith at Buenos Aires. This method is known as sales "a fijar precio", that is, at a price to be fixed "a priori" for the delivery of the grain. Under this system the farmer receives between 75 and 80 per cent of the value of the grain on the day of delivery, but reserves the right to finally dispose of the grain on any day he chooses, within a specified time, usually eight months.

The exporting of grains from the Argentine is concentrated in a few large firms which have branches in most of the principal cities—at home and abroad. About five of these large exporting firms handle from 80 to 90 per cent of all the cereal grains exported from Argentina.

The method of selling at a price to be fixed works as follows: The farmer, having harvested his grain and having no place to store it, disposes of it to the local stockkeeper or sometimes to a middleman on the basis of a contract at a price to be fixed. The terms of these contracts differ considerably but in general the stock keeper agrees to buy the wheat and to take delivery at once, advancing to the farmer from 75 to 80 per cent of the value of the wheat on the basis of the market price on the day of contract. The farmer agrees that within a period not exceeding eight months he will sell the grain at the ruling price of the day on which he decides to sell and the stockkeeper agrees to pay the farmer the difference
