**ABOUT THE NEW ORDINANCE
WHEN the Twin Falls city council**

passed and put into effect an ordinance making it unlawful to park more than one hour in certain sections of the city no objections were made by any of the people. But after the ordinance had been in effect for some little time some conscientious objectors made their appearance. They criticized the city councilmen and the ordinance in turn, declaring the rule an infringement upon the freedom of the people.

Now the city councilmen are contemplating the passing of a new ordinance, the chief provisions of which will be the prohibition of U-turns one block each way from the intersection of Main and Shoshone and the prohibition of left hand turns at the Main and Shoshone intersection. The ordinance has been placed on its second reading. Next Monday night it will

be given its third reading, a single publication, and then will become a law within ten days thereafter.

So far there have been absolutely no objections to this ordinance. No person has appeared before the council in its last two meetings to say a word for or against the proposed action. Apparently they are not interested at present.

Are the people going to wait until the law has been made before they decide they don't want it? Are they going to wait until the car is stolen before locking the garage? Are they going to wait until it is too late before exercising their right to express opinions?

The city councilmen are anxious to have the opinion of the people on this ordinance before it is passed, not afterward. People should appear before the councilmen next Monday night and call them by telephone, now or write them letters, expressing approval or disapproval of this new law.

In view of the fact that we do not think of this city as being a city of industrial activity it is rather interesting to note that the Sweet matress factory is to be doubled in capacity after having been in operation about a year. How many industrial opportunities are being overlooked by local people and local dollars that might react to the benefit of all?

**TARIFF SITUATION MORE
"MUDGLED THAN EVER."**

Events of the past few days tend to further obfuscate the tariff situation in congress, although there is still the possibility of a fairly equitable bill being enacted. It is now clear that the western group in the senate will be able to prevent the passage of the kind of a tariff the house approved, one giving the nation's share of the benefits to eastern industries and leaving the west out in the cold. The senate's refusal to vote for exorbitant eastern schedules sounds the death knell of a bill the financial barons of the east wanted. On the other hand the western group lacks the strength to force a bill through the house. There is a doubtful, although side issue, as to what it wants without making concessions to the other—the western element demands that the tariff be enacted along the lines advocated by Mr. Hoover before and after the election, namely to the relief of agriculture, with other changes to be restricted to those otherwise needed to help sick industries. Instead of that the house enacted a measure giving most of the aid to already prosperous eastern manufacturing industries and leaving the farmer by comparison worse off than before.

President Hoover might be able to bring some if he would frankly tell the two houses to stick to the purpose for which congress was called into special session, agricultural relief. But the east, upon which he must depend for future support, might repudiate him if he stuck to the republican platform pledges. At any rate he seems to hesitate, although his commitment to what is now the "insurgent" or "opposition" program was as clear as crystal a few months ago.

If the president does not act there is still some hope in the militant attitude of the some "guard," which is composed of men who also vote regular but who are for a progressive program. They may be able to bring the "elder statesmen" of their party out of the rut. A new republican leadership is badly needed.

**TEXAS TOWN NOW MAKES MUNICIPAL LIGHT PLANT PAY
BIG PROFITS TO TAXPAYERS**

SHERMAN, Texas, Nov. 20.—This town of 1,100 people know all about their electric power plant. They know about the much-discussed question of the municipal ownership of public utilities.

Last in 1916 the city invested \$21,000 in a run-down electric light plant and new equipment. That plant is worth seven times the original investment, citizens are getting better service and the tax rates have been reduced. A hall has been erected at no cost to the taxpayers, streets have been paved out of profits and the tax rate has been reduced from 75 cents per \$100 valuation.

The plant was bought for \$600, which was a healthy price, considering everything. It had a good motor which could give just six hours service a day. It was housed in an old sheet iron shack that was ready to fall down at any moment.

The machinery was antiquated. The wires were, in many cases, strung on ordinary fence posts.

When the plant was built, the city financed a \$16,000 bond issue to provide new equipment. A new plant was built and a modern system of power was installed.

A short time citizens were asked to pay 24-hour service, and the plant's capacity was increased, out of

profits, to 100 percent.

These profits go far toward paying the city's expenses.

Two years ago they provided \$10,000 for the construction of a new city

for a new sanitary sewer system.

The city's streets are blighted without cost to the taxpayers. Schools

in the new fire tract have been torn down, streets

have been graded—and much of

out of the plant's profits.

Mayer E. Hinde, who is 72,

and draws a salary of \$25 a week,

from the young people of the town. Work

is done in the north part of the city limits. He also points

with pride to the fact that an auto

industry company recently of-

fered the \$200,000 for the plant—an offer that was rejected
