

SMITH EXPLAINS GUIDANCE WORK

Kiwanis Club Hears Superior Student of Schools Discuss Program for Local Pupils

Work that is already being done in Twin Falls is planned for execution within the next six months or year in furnishing a guidance program for the school pupils. In the Twin Falls system of schools, it was explained briefly today by Kiwanis club members by W. R. Smith, superior of schools. Following the meeting, the club membership went to the high school building where several phases of school activities and school-and-building equipment were studied at first hand. Formerly the child was required to fit himself to the program of the school, but in recent years the process has been reversed, and today an effort is being made to fit the program to the needs of the children of various capacities. In Twin Falls the program is graded according to the child's needs of three recognized groups, the sub-normal child, the average child and the gifted child.

The report of United States Steel Corporation showing a large increase in production, following the severe stock market break, it made apparent that the steel industry is not seriously blocked the now or in the future.

During the past year price declines, which affected the steel industry, have been offset to some extent by the fact that the total at the close of the month was 4,088,222 tons, compared with 3,812,161 tons one month before and with 3,751,039 tons one year ago.

The Steel Corporation is heading the end of the year with a large amount of business on its books. Much of the recent gain in steel production is attributed to railroad buying, which is partly seasonal. Rail earnings also have been large, enabling the roads to purchase their requirements of rails and cars more freely than at any time in the past.

Not all steel users are so actively in the market. Automobile manufacturers, particularly are curtailing operations sharply. Many plants in the iron and steel industry have reduced production schedules, and in some cases have stopped production entirely.

Smaller automobile consumption of steel is reflected in the decline in steel output produced in October. The daily average rate of steel output was the lowest for any month of 1923 except January.

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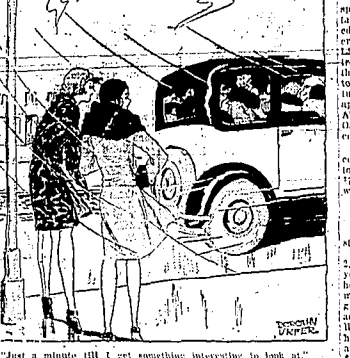
