Passing Leaves Vacant Important Appropriations Committee Chairmanship

WASHINGTON, Nov. 25 (UP)—For the third time this month, death has claimed an outstanding public man in Washington. Senator Francis E. Warren, 85, Republican, Wyoming, the second oldest man in the senate, died at his home here yesterday at the age of 85 years.

He was seized with a cold three weeks ago and bronchial pneumonia developed. He died with General John J. Pershing, the senator's daughter, at his bedside.

State Funeral.

A state funeral will be held in the senate chamber Tuesday as for Senator Burton of Ohio, the first of the three to die in the last session of the 71st congress. The oldest senator in years and in service, Warren was the last union soldier to serve in the senate.

Warren was a graduate of the United States military academy at West Point, N. Y., in 1857. He served in the Civil war and was captured by the Confederates in 1862. He was held in prison for 18 months and escaped in 1864.

Warren was popular with his colleagues and his 85th birthday last July the senate paid him high tribute.

Senators Charles M. McNary, Republican, Oregon, and Francis E. Warren, Republican, Wyoming, were present when the senator died.

Warren was the first governor of the territory of Wyoming and first entered the senate in 1880. Warren's death leaves vacant the senatorial chairmanship of the senate appropriations committee.

Senator McNary, Republican, Oregon, is next in line for the position, but as he is chairman of the finance committee at present, Senator Jones, Republican, Washington, is next in line.

After the funeral here the body will be taken to Washington Tuesday afternoon.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 25 (UP)—Agriculture was called upon by President Hoover today to offer its aid in stimulating business this winter. BOY DECLARED BURNED ALIVE BY FIVE MEN

Companion of Connie Franklin Reveals Story of Terrible Attack During Last Spring

MOUNTAIN VIEW, Ark., Nov. 25 (UP)—Five men were indicted today on charges of murdering a boy, the companion of a girl who was killed in a fire last spring.

The boy, who was named by the grand jury, was killed in a fire that broke out in the home of his parents in Mountain View, Ark., on the night of March 20, 1928.

The fire started in the kitchen and spread rapidly, burning for several hours before it was extinguished. The boy, who was only 12 years old, was found dead in the ruins of the home.

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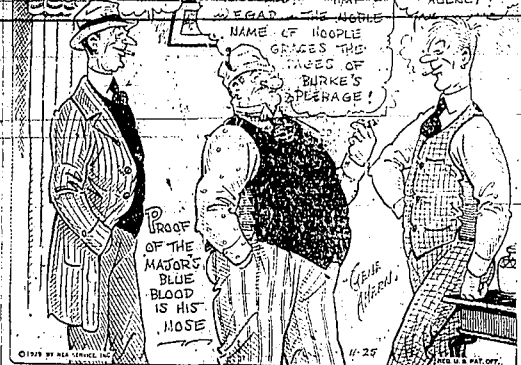

SOVIET RAIDERS CHARGED WITH MASS MURDERS

Chinese Communists Tells of Brutal Blaying of Whites Russians by Moscow Troops

HARRIN, (UP)—Once proscriptions colony of about 3000 Chinese Russians in the fertile Three Rivers district of Northern China have been all but annihilated in the face of a horrid massacre by the forces of Soviet Russia and the Manchurian regime, according to Chinese reports.

The Three Rivers district has been raided repeatedly by bands of Soviet "partisans," alleged to be plain clothes soldiers acting as part of the Russian Far Eastern Regiment.

The brutality of these raids is staggering.

A typical example is contained in the following Chinese communique:

"Shortly in October a troop of irregular Soviet cavalrymen, dressed as civilians and numbering between 100 and 200, attacked the village of Tyncho, which was inhabited by about 800 Russian emigrants and 200 Hanhs. The soldiers, as situated about 20 versts north of the Chinese Eastern Railway station of Yankai in the western part of Heilongjiang province, named Harpa, at a distance of about 250 versts from the Bling-shih frontier.

"The 'Red Commissar,' said to be Hungarian, 'commanded' the troops, summoned the village headman and ordered him to indicate the Chinese village population in the village, except those who had managed to make their escape among them even a boy of 10 years and old men, were put on their knees and slaughtered by the fire of two machine guns from a distance of a few feet.

"Close to 70 deaths.

"The total number of those murdered in this case exceeds what has been 60 and 70. A few survived by pretending to be dead and said that after the firing was over the raiders despatched those who had showed signs of life, by hacking them with axes, bayonets and daggers.

"Wives and mothers who had witnessed the murders were forced to return to the village and prepare bread and tea for the raiders who had been ordered to approach of a rescue party. On their way back to Soviet territory, the 'Red' troops are a number of other villages inhabited by Russian emigrants and committed other murders and outrages.

"The reports collected by the number of victims of this raid of Soviet troops into the so-called Three Rivers district, after an expedition of at least 100, including 1000 Chinese soldiers, is 11 years old.

"According to the Soviet press the raid was undertaken as a retaliatory measure for incursions of white partisans into Soviet territory.

"The number of white partisans of 140 Whites, under the command of a certain Penkoff, was annihilated.

The mob did not commit much of a sin against the man that was hanged because he had already been convicted of murder and was under sentence to die in the electric chair.

But that mob did an irreparable amount of injury to its own community, to the reputation of the state of Texas and to the cause of orderly government in these United States.

Collectively and under the spirit of mob madness that group of what may be believed was made up of average, peaceful citizens lashed itself into unreasoning fury, took the law into its own hands and did in shameful manner a task that the law had already determined should be done by the state.

Women and children were permitted to gaze at the spectacle of a group gone mad hanging a man three times to inflict death on him. The victim may have been so low that he deserved to die a dozen deaths even though he had only one life that could be taken, but the people of his community owed it to themselves and to the cause of good government and what we call civilization to keep hands off and permit the law to take its course.

We strive by every means to remove ourselves from the spirit of the brutes, to assure ourselves that we have marched a long way on the road from barbarity into civilization, but such instances as this compel the admission that the veneer of so-called civilization is all too thin and that we of this 20th century have little time to spend in complacent self congratulations about the extent of our culture.

ROMANCE WINS AGAINST LAWS

CENTRAL CITY, Nov. 24 (UP)—After a delay of seven years, Oklahoma law was defeated when Jim Doro returned here from Mason, Idaho, with his bride, on whom he had been engaged for nearly five years, and whom he had never seen until he went to Poland last fall for the wedding.

The law was introduced in public, through Miss Augusta Perak, by her brother, the Oklahoma congressman. After an exchange of letters and phone, Miss Perak came in from America and married Doro.

The couple were informed, however, that the immigration quota was filled and that Miss Perak would have to await her turn. A second attempt met with the same result.

Doro, through the aid of Congressman Howard, obtained permission to travel to Poland and marry the girl of his life, bringing her back on his wife. This was two years ago. His complications forced him to postpone his trip. Last August he was granted a visa and returned to his home in Poland, where the marriage took place.

The couple are now living on a farm near Silver Creek.

JEROME COUNTY TAXES INCREASE

JEROME, November 25 (Spokane)—The 1939 tax increase were set out Friday and Saturday morning. The total tax charge covering the city, mills, county, state, and public utilities was in the amount of \$48,794.25. This does not cover personal property taxes, which amount to about \$100,000.

The total tax charge for Jerome county is about \$1,000,000. This is higher than last year's. This does not however make any great difference to the majority of taxpayers as there are about three thousand in the county. The tax is higher than last year's because of the increase in the value of the county property, particularly the increase in the value of the county's real estate being placed on the county's books.

INADEQUATE FACILITIES

THE return of basketball season discloses again what has been glaringly apparent for a number of years—that our gymnasium facilities for the senior and junior high schools are sadly inadequate.

The Do-Nut league is just getting its program of scheduled play under way, and the popularity of the league idea has attracted so many players that the school authorities are puzzling their heads as to how in the world they can ever find a time and a place for all the athletic activities that students have evinced a desire to have.

The Twin Falls school system is more fortunate than a great many persons may realize in that its athletic program has been conceived and is planned and executed with the ideal of bringing the student to the athletic competition and organized sports efforts to the rank and file of both boys and girls. The old conception of athletics was that the various sports existed as an opportunity for the school to win games and contests to its own benefit and for the benefit of comparatively small varsity groups. In Twin Falls athletics exist on much broader plan, and benefits are more widely disseminated.

The wisdom of the plan is proved by the fact that students have responded and take a lively interest in group athletics. The Do-Nut league idea has been growing and enrolling more and more followers.

At present the school authorities are trying to accommodate the following groups for basketball: the Do-Nut league consists of 16 teams of seven players each, the boys' varsity squad, the girls' groups in the junior high school. The senior high school girls' league has waived the use of gymnasium facilities until spring.

Twin Falls has no plant equipment for either a Y. M. C. A. or a Y. W. C. A., and the community has too young and too small to expect any such facilities for a long time at the best. This fact strengthens the obligation of the community to do everything that may reasonably be expected of it in providing such facilities in the school system. The number of persons who take the stand that this obligation is not being met as it should be is on the increase in Twin Falls.

When God created the world, he made the world rhythmic vibrations and arranging elements of universe according to preconcerted plan—that was poetry.

"When God formed the mountains and traced the waters' course—that was sculpture.

"When God tuned the tides and

sums with mathematical precision and he has been a faithful comprehension—that was music.

"When God peopled the earth with men and women, he made them his external guest of spirit through matter—that was drama.

"When God created the world with tropics of green and gold and summer the purple shadows across the desert sage—that was painting.

"Thus we find the laws of each art convertible into the other. What do I mean by art? No only pictures and statues but nearly all of the objects that enter into our daily living. There can be beauty of form and color in almost everything we see.

"Why should we take an interest in the fine arts? We should cultivate art if it only gives pleasure, but knowledge of art means more than enjoyment to mankind. It is the means of livelihood, for art enters into almost every product. Some commercial activities such as rhythmic vibrations and arranging elements of universe according to preconcerted plan—that was poetry.

"The museum of art is a source of inspiration. The museum can be visited for pure enjoyment or for an opportunity to increase one's knowledge.

"The people of this country are beginning to realize that there is real pleasure and spiritual growth in the architecture and sculpture in our streets, in the colorful and plastic buildings that decorate the public buildings or are housed in museums, in harmonious and beautiful scenes of music and well staged drama.

"Love of beauty is innate and universal. No man or woman desires to create a beautiful home. Psychologists say that we are happiest when we live in a harmonious environment. What can art do for you and me?

"First, art can reveal new beauty in nature. Second, art can give charming viewpoint to the world. Third, art can make greater civic improvements. Art can put us in touch with the past. Art provides us with intellectual pleasure. By association of our thoughts with art we create our own beautiful culture.

"The standard of the finest of all the arts, 'The Fine Art of Living.' The art of life is not so simple yet so difficult. It means merely to live each moment to the full. Look before and after, remembering and hoping; yet never allowing regret or longings to mar the most beautiful gift of life—this moment of its full share of love, work and faith.


