



relation of what one must pay to what the property actually cost. The yields, or returns in profit, are not spectacular, it is true, but neither are they so low as to deserve neglect. There are plenty of residences in Twin Falls that can be purchased, for less than the replacement value of the buildings alone, and in some cases there are bargains we dare say, that can be bought for the cost of materials alone used in creating the property.

A lot of stocks are finding buyers at twice their par value. Real property does well, exceptionally well, if it brings a price anywhere near 100 cents on the dollar. A lot of it can be bought for 75 cents on the dollar and much lower even less. Yet property is not nearly so attractive as it should be.

Maybe the brokers who deal in property need to change their appeal and thus change the public's manner of appraising real property. As an example, we wonder if it might not put a different slant on things to state the case this way:

"Six room residence on 17th avenue, built in 1920, in excellent condition, quoted today at \$77. Costs of this property, including sidewalk and street paving which is all paid, was \$7800. This cost does not include any charge made for shrubs, trees and a lovely garden including a fine collection of perennials. Price today on basis of 77 quotation, \$6006 with \$1000 down and easy terms and immediate possession to responsible parties."

Or here is another hypothetical case:

"We offer comfortable 5-room home, modern except heat, on a quotation of \$68—Actual investment in hard cash represented in this 12-year old house with garage, half basement, sidewalks and paving, \$4760. On basis of market at \$63 you can take it on a margin of 10 per cent down at a price of \$2998.80 which includes brokerage charges. Possession in 30 days."

Quotations in this fashion might turn up some bargains none of us have suspected that lurk right under our noses.

A NEW ALIGNMENT

IT IS whispered about Washington that the next presidential campaign year may see an entirely new ticket in the field—a ticket drawing its support from the groups represented in the present senate by the western-southern combination that is so badly wrecking the administration's tariff program.

Whether this will ever come to pass, of course, is something that no man in his senses would try to say, definitely, right now. But it might prove a move in the right direction.

The one great criticism of American politics lately has been that there is little basic difference between the two major parties. Any development that would bring a more clear-cut differentiation would be a thing to be welcomed. Some of the western republicans are, at present, infinitely further removed from the administration viewpoint than some eastern democrats.

In view of the situation that exists, would it not be well for us to strike while the iron is hot? If we let other regions do their welding while we stand idly by it will not help our people any.

REAL PROPERTY VALUES

SOMETIMES we wonder if brokers who handle sales of real property are not overlooking a merchandising technique when they fail to differentiate between the selling price of property and what the property really represents in money invested.

After the recent stock market recession when common stocks that had been up two, three, or four or more times their original values slumped so that some of them were bringing only twice as much as their par value, a large army of operators decided that anything offered on the stock market counter was a bargain. This opinion was backed with millions of dollars that went to fill orders to buy.

In the meantime, real property, particularly residence property is away below par. There is not a street in Twin Falls, we confidently assert, on which there is not a considerable number of residences that may be purchased for much less money than it costs to construct the buildings and provide the improvements such as sidewalks and paving. And what is true of Twin Falls is true of whole flocks of cities.


