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

Distinct Federation Club News

By Mrs. W. J. BURKE, Club
 We are going to open our club this week with an excellent series of lectures by our district president, Mrs. J. B. Arthur, on the subject "What of the Club Program?" and upon that subject she has the following interesting things to say to us:

Mrs. Arthur's Suggestions.
 The club, a community asset, is a good thing.
 As the program is so well planned, as the club has so well organized its work, it will create our interest in our club programs, to be a vital force in our community. We need to have a program that is definite in its purpose, that is thorough in its execution, that involves intelligent discussion and that is shared with the public through well directed publicity.

Chairmen of the club program committees should make a study of the department of work outlined by the general federation, observe they cannot hope to outdo the work of the federation (the club) work. One cannot enter into the spirit of the work with one's thorough knowledge of the work in hand. So first we must acquaint ourselves with the objectives of the organization. If every club woman in the first district would pledge herself to study our outlines, work and progress, an informal report of club matters, our programs would take care of themselves.

Our program should have continually of subject matter, that couple the reading and studying of our work with the actual doing of the work. If our programs and club meetings do not better we in our community, then we may as well have no program.

The best type of club is beginning to take an interest in the trend of modern thought on matters of citizenship and government, industry, economic progress of the world, by science and invention and international relations.

In the field of art, music and literature there is room for infinite variety and interest. There is unlimited material to be found on these subjects.

The book reviews are popular and most interesting to our program. In order to make them a value to the club, they require careful selection and study. The life of the author, his significant and influence in the history of literature, the historical and cultural background of the book review, that never be kept in mind by the reviewer of any book.

Programs on prominent men and women are always interesting. General Federation headquarters suggests several books for reading on prominent women and their accomplishments.

The district executive should request club presidents to appoint chairmen for each of the club departments of work, these chairmen to be responsible for program work on their respective departments of work. Effective work cannot be done unless every club member is familiar with the aim and objective of the federation. A club may devote a year's program to each department with the division of work, or have one program during the year on each department.

As the club members of "Golden Idaho" will be found the names of all state and district chairmen of the club, through letters can call upon them for help, literature and papers upon their particular lines of work. There is no incentive for chairmen to become familiar with the work unless the club through letters call to call upon them for help. Suggestions for club program planning.

If the program committee will bear in mind that as the program as to will the club fee, and as the club is, so will the community be, we will have better clubs and communities of which we, as club women, may well be proud. There is no better one community life as we are not to give publicity to the work we are doing. Club women should strive to arouse public sentiment and form public opinion, then direct them into channels of good. If a club does something worth while that is new, and the public always looks for news.

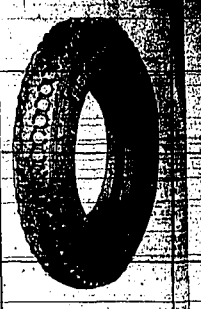

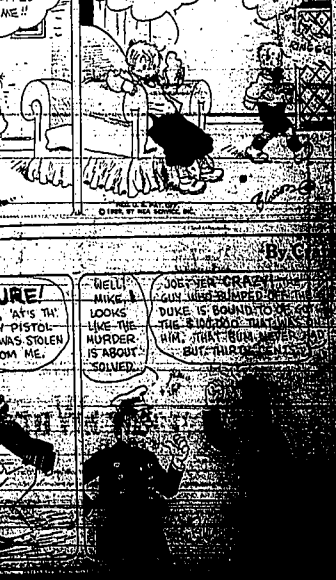

WASHINGTON, Nov. 26 (UP)—Uncle Sam is the greatest employer in the world. The new official list of the United States for 1922 shows 57,662 workers are now employed by the government through civil service.

The roster takes into consideration only employees in the executive branch of the government and does not include hundreds of thousands of others in the legislative, judicial or military services. 67,864 are employed in the District.

In the federal executive service of Columbia and 22,774 in the field. Of the total number \$2,601 are women.
