FROM the issue of November 21 of the United States Daily, published in Washington, D. C., the following article was taken:

Application of the Idaho Pacific Railroad, in finance docket No. 7516, to construct 238.7 miles of new railroad between Nevada, Oregon, and Winnemucca, has been dismissed by the interstate commerce commission upon motion of the railroad's counsel, it was announced by the commission on November 20.

The commission's action followed a motion of the carrier's counsel to dismiss the case. The motion was made at hearings held in San Francisco on October 15 before Examiner Haskell C. Davis. Harold H. Price, counsel for the carrier, declared at that time:

"I feel, and as representing the applicant at this hearing, I am bound in candor to admit that this case has not been presented as it deserves to be presented and as it is merited.

"For that reason I make this motion. I want further to state that there are a number of witnesses who have come forward as intervenors, who are vitally interested in this matter, who have come here on their own initiative and voluntarily. These people from this section of the country are entitled, in my judgment, to secure adequate transportation facilities. There is a district up there that is crying for an opportunity to extend, expand and develop, and so I think the action I am about to take on behalf of the applicant is, in view of the circumstances, justified. So, therefore, Mr. Examiner, I move to leave on behalf of applicant to dismiss this application without prejudice."

Thus ends another chapter of one of several efforts made by the southwest part of Idaho to shorten its railroad haul to California markets. Whether such efforts will be made to secure the Nevada-Winnemucca cutoff only time will tell, but it would appear that hope of securing that cutoff is remote.

What should be done in this matter as this newspaper sees the situation is for the southwest part of Idaho to join with this area south of the Snake River in securing construction of the extension of the Minidoka-Buhl branch to the main line.

Construction of this short unit of railroad would be of very real value to both districts. The Boise valley would shorten its haul to California markets by some 236 miles. This part of Idaho would have its haul to north Pacific coast points shortened 140 miles. In addition, the Rogerson-Wells cutoff would be developed to an extent where it would serve Idaho's interests to maximum benefit.

The opportunity afforded for cooperative action on the part of these two districts of Idaho offers such benefits that the people can not afford to neglect it. The construction required would be short in comparison with other the Nyssa-Winnemucca line or the Crane-Coequett-Lake line. It is here would be far reaching; Idaho faces a real challenge to co-operation. The challenge should be met.

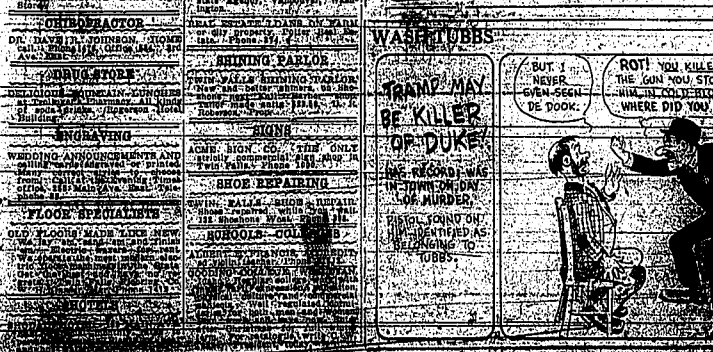

TOILING MASSES OF RUSSIA TO BE RESPONSIBLE FOR SPOILED GOODS

MOSCOW, Nov. 26 (UP)—at all. Factory workers hereafter will be held personally responsible for the spoils which they spoil. The questions from their wages and for extra cases dismantled from the job have been ordered by the Supreme Council of Economy for those who turn out inferior products.

When the Supreme Economic Council was under the leadership of Leon Trotsky some years back, it contained a special commission for raising the quality of production. With Trotsky's death, which it contained, this commission now fell into the hands of other hands.

All sorts of moral exhortation will also be brought to bear on workers. For instance, special exhibitions in factories and in districts will be in the name of the person guilty of spoiling the goods as 'spoiled property.'
