



A FUNCTION OF ADVERTISING
EARNST Elmo Calkins, an acknowl-
edged leader in the advertising
field in this country, was not indulg-
ing in mere gesture when he wrote a let-
ter to Julius H. Barnes, chairman of the
board of directors of the United States
Chamber of Commerce, under whose
direction President Hoover's program
of business stabilization will be work-
ed out, and called his attention to the
fact that no advertising man was called
in by the president in his conference of
leaders to make plans for the program.

"This," wrote Mr. Calkins, referring
to the fact that no advertising man had
been included among those invited to
confer with the president, "is a really
serious omission. There never was a
time when advertising men were more
needed or could be more helpful. There
never has been a slump so little related
to business conditions. The chief fac-
tor has been a state of mind, and state
of mind are exactly what the advertis-
ing man deals in. He creates them,
and he is the one to advise on changing
them."

"And again the advertising expert
says:
"This is peculiarly and emphatically
an advertising situation. It was a state
of mind that pushed stocks up beyond
reasonable levels. It was a state of
mind that pulled them down. And it
will be a state of mind if the country
goes steadily on unmoved by the com-
paratively small and isolated happen-
ings on the stock exchange. And state
of mind are the product of advertising."

The true significance of the severe
recession of stock prices is expressed
by Mr. Calkins in the following:
"The prices of stocks were like a tall
building which had been erected too
quickly with scamped work on an in-
secure foundation. It could have been
taken down brick by brick without dis-
turbance anybody, but the trouble was
it fell with a loud bang and a big smash
and scared us. But no other building
was even shaken. As soon as the dust
clears away we will see that very little
harm is done. But if we begin tearing
down our own buildings because that
building was unsound, we will be suffer-
ing a damage inflicted only on our-
selves by ourselves."

One of the correctives of the threat-
ened destructive state of mind pro-
posed by Mr. Calkins is to use advertis-
ing space to set forth specific facts of
the fundamental soundness of this
country. Whether his advice is fol-
lowed or ignored, the country is indebt-
ed to him for an analysis as clear-cut
as any we have read on our flurry in
business.

HYSTERICAL SENSATIONALISM

The assault and murder of a 12-year-old
girl in Idaho some weeks ago was followed
by reports of a series of such crimes.
The crime is of itself of most revolting
nature that the response of the general public
is particularly active, and the desire to avenge
is the first thought which comes into the
minds of many.

The character of the crime is such that
a great deal of publicity is given, resulting,
unfortunately, in hysterical and sensational
feelings and very poorly informed
girls and young women making a public spec-
tacle of themselves for the opportunity to mo-
mentarily shine in the spot light.

"Foolish as they are, if the result could
be confined to them it would be bad enough,
but in their desire to become heroines in a
way, even though it calls for a sacrifice of
virtue to play the part, place in danger the
life of innocent people.

The girl in order to make her story more
readily believed, gives a description which
might fit any unfortunate individual falling
a prey to an earnest but often misguided
man or woman and which could easily result
in the sacrifice of a life or at least a great
injurious one.

Several cases have occurred since the un-
fortunate first. In order to cover a lesser crime
in which they have been a willing partner or
even without a crime or an misdemeanor having
been done, also desire for publicity, for sym-
pathy, is so great that an attempt will be
made to pose as a victim.

Unfortunately again the "kisses" in the
first instance has never been "caught" all of
which may have, had some effect in encourag-
ing the foolish women and girls to become
victims in order to flatter their vanity.

Three cases recently in this section of
Idaho have proven the would-be victims to be
the sensational fiends, willing to admit an as-
sault upon their virtue in order to feel a
momentary glow of publicity and sympathy and
important victim to probable death. The officers
will do well to check such stories very care-
fully before an injustice is committed.



BEAN VS. POTATO RATES

IDAHO has to pay high rates on its big
shipments of potatoes to outside mar-
kets. Rates so high that in years of low
prices the railroads are the only hand-
ed of the crop to make any profit. But
the rates on potatoes are high the
rates on beans for a good many hauls
are much higher. The following com-
parative figures tell the story:

The rate on potatoes in carloads of
30,000 and 36,000 pounds from Twin
Falls to Portland, 701 miles, via Hunt-
ington, is 58 cents per cwt. The rate on
beans for the same haul is 70 cents
per cwt. for a car of 60,000 pounds and
85 cents for a 40,000 car. Stated dif-
ferently, it costs \$190.80 to ship a 36,
000 pound car of potatoes to Portland
and \$420 to ship a 60,000 pound
car of beans, and \$340 to ship a 40,000
car of beans.

The potato rate from Twin Falls to
San Francisco is 58 cents per cwt., the
rate as the Portland rate; but the bean
rate for a 40,000 car from Twin Falls to
San Francisco is \$1.06; and the haul
is 229 miles. In other words, it costs
\$190.80 for freight on a car of potatoes
from San Francisco from Twin Falls, but
\$1.00 pound car of beans to the same
point has a freight haul charge of
\$1.00, or a good deal more than twice
the charge for potato hauling.

The rate on beans over the Southern
Pacific from San Francisco to Yuma,
Yuma, 30,000 pound car minimum,
Yuma, is 60 cents per cwt.; the rate
from San Francisco to Twin Falls, 729
miles, for a 40,000 minimum car, is
\$1.00. The rate on beans from
San Francisco to Salt Lake City, 817
miles is 87 1-2 cents for 40,000 min-
imum car.

The bean rate from Twin Falls to Los
Angeles, 1072 miles, is \$1.06 per cwt.
for 40,000 car; and the rate on beans
from Bakersfield, Calif., to Salt Lake
City, 899 miles, is 82 1-2 cents on a
40,000 car.

The potato rate from Twin Falls to
Oregon, 1946 miles, is 91 cents; the
bean rate for the same haul is \$1.05 for
60,000 car. In other words a 36,000
car of potatoes costs \$327.60 for this
haul and a carload of beans costs \$630.
Idaho knows that its potato rates are
high enough, but why should beans
be paid double and more the tariff
on against potatoes? Just because
a potato rate is already confiscatory
or half the time and cannot be fur-
ther increased? And that bean rates
are ultimately twice as high, are still
quite confiscatory?

Maybe a railroad lawyer could fig-
ure out the justice of this rate. We find
selves unable to do so. Maybe our
lawyers can figure it out for their salar-
y. If they can we would wel-
come the chance to know the line of
law they follow. We admit that
the charge has us stumped.



Old Warriors Are Rapidly Thinning

WASHINGTON, Nov. 28. (UP)—The ranks of old American warriors are growing thinner year by year, the annual report of post office commissioner Earl D. Church revealed today. Only 7,000 remain of those who battled with Mexico in the '40s and only a few of those veterans remain to tell of western conquest with the Indians.

The number was "definitely" less than the number of the year before, in 1917, the report reveals; though "eleven" of his widows have notified them.

There were only 47,216 pensioners at the end of the last fiscal year, 1919-20, compared with 49,194 a year ago. More money is paid to civil war widows than any other class. Of the \$238,858,674 distributed in pensions last year, they received 58.4 per cent.

There are 25,945 Civil War veterans remaining of that band which served under Grant and Sherman in the Civil War, and 181,235 of their widows survive the pension rolls show. All but 1,541 of the veterans of the Indian wars are dead, and their widows number only 4,000.
