THREE COACHES TURN  
OVER IN THE WRECK

First Fatal Accident in Nor-  
folk Division During  
45 Years

CAPE CHARLES, Va., Dec. 2.—(UPI)—Ten dead and many more injured in a collision between a Pennsylvania passenger train at Olney, 25 miles north of here, early Sunday. In the first fatal accident of the Norfolk division in 45 years.

Northbound and loaded with weekend excursionists, the heavy train left here at 11:30 p. m. yesterday through a bitterly cold night. It ran into a split rail and leaped the tracks with a grinding crash.

Twenty-four passengers, in-

cluding eight men, were in-

itially killed, six passengers and a brakeman. An unidentified negro woman succumbed later to injuries.

Passengers who escaped but died members of the train crew in extricating victims of the crash, were taken to the nearby hospital.
