President Recommends Limited Tariff Changes

Confidence Restored in Business Following Wall Street Panic

WASHINGTON, Dec. 3. (UPI) — Renewing his recommendation for limited tariff changes outlined in the special message last April, President Hoover in his first annual address to Congress yesterday urged it to relieve business from further uncertainty by prompt action on the revision program.

"We are most hopeful if action should be taken at an early moment, more especially at a time when business and agriculture are both cooperative to minimize future uncertainties," the president declared. "But, just as there should know what the rates are to be."

In his first comprehensive survey of the domestic economy, the president outlined a picture since he entered the white house, the president outlined a broad program for dealing with the "problem areas" of agriculture, labor, and foreign trade. In the special message, he declared the chief problem confronting the new session of congress.

With confidence in business, the president outlined a picture of the development of the recent World House Conference with the country's leading financial, labor, leaders and business men on a stand, economic

"I am convinced," he said, "Wages should remain stable at a very large degree of industrial stability, and suffering which would otherwise have occurred has been prevented. Agricultural prices have reflected the general increase in costs."

Among the president's recommendations for legislative or executive action are:

1. An immediate reduction of one cent on both individual and corporate incomes for the calendar year 1930.

2. Renewed efforts to realize railroad consolidation, looking to elimination of a continuously mounting military outlay.

3. Modification of the world currency system so that the dollar will be the standard of value.

4. Immediate increase in the highway trust agreement.

5. Immediate increase in the waterways appropriations bill.

6. General revision of air mail rates "upon as more systematic and permanent basis."

7. Increased Marine Corps strength.

8. Revision of existing contracts of maintaining new routes established by the Post Office Department.
