

# SICKNESS STRIKES SCHOOL AT WEISER

BEAN RATES
MEMBERS of the Idaho Public Utilities commission are in conference with officials of the Oregon Short Line in Boise today in an effort to see if a voluntary reduction of rates on beans will not be made by the carrier.

BEAN RATES (continued)
We hope a reduction on the rates now in force may be secured amicably and by conference. It would seem that the commission not only has an excellent case as to why the rates on this commodity should be lowered but that the case is so strong that it should be pushed further if the efforts to secure reductions by conference fail.

BEAN RATES (continued)
Bean growers in this part of Idaho are paying from \$10 to \$20 per acre for freight on their beans, depending on the yield secured and the distance of shipping. The cost of handling and hauling to the carriers in moving beans should be less than the cost involved in handling wheat, or potatoes, yet beans are paying a terrific toll. If growers think for a minute that the consumer pays this difference he may quickly disabuse his mind of any such reasoning by the knowledge that bean prices to Michigan grow on an average are one-cent-per-pound, or 60 cents per bushel, or \$20 per ton, higher than the prices Idaho growers receive. If Idaho growers could receive half of that difference, or even a fourth of that difference, what a boon it would be!

THE WORLD'S SASSY BOY
THE response of the Russian government to the efforts made by the United States, England and France to secure peace between Russia and China marks the soviet government as the sassy boy in the international family.

THE WORLD'S SASSY BOY (continued)
Russia in effect told the three powers when they called Russia's attention to that country's obligations under the Kellogg agreement that they might just as well chase home and attend to their own business. The soviet government even had the effrontery in its reply to the American note to express astonishment that a government which refused to have diplomatic relations with the soviet should appeal to it with "advice and instructions." The notes to all the intervening powers carried expressions to the effect that the soviet government considered such action unfriendly.

MEN OR INDUSTRIES?
ON ITS face the statement by Edward N. Hurley, wartime chairman of the United States shipping board, that the destiny of the world and world peace are in the hands of 31 captains of industry in six countries, is likely to prove something of a shock to most of us.

MEN OR INDUSTRIES? (continued)
Mr. Hurley in a letter that furnished the basis for a news story by United Press stated that a "gentlemen's agreement" entered into by these captains of industry not to furnish raw materials to belligerent nations would constitute an effective guaranty of world peace.

MEN OR INDUSTRIES? (continued)
One of the first reactions of the normal mind on receipt of this statement is that a vast responsibility rests on these 31 captains of industry. So it does, but we are presuming altogether too much to think that these 31, standing together alone, could prevent war. If their forces were to be combined, the 31 captains could form in fact an "economic republic," according to the expressed belief of Mr. Hurley. They would have an effective control of iron ore, coal, rubber, manganese, nickel, aluminum, petroleum, newsprint pulp, tungsten, chromium and molybdenum, without which, it is pointed out, the waging of modern warfare would be impossible.

MEN OR INDUSTRIES? (continued)
The suggestion has a real value in that it points to the part industry plays in war. The waging of warfare requires men and the equipment they must have to live, fight and defend themselves. If a government is determined to prosecute war and possesses among its own resources the raw materials needed and a combine of economic forces attempted to stand in its way it would ruthlessly disregard these forces and commandeer their needs.

MEN OR INDUSTRIES? (continued)
The 31 captains, powerful and wealthy and wise as they are, remain nothing except 31 captives. Before there were other captains, and after they shall have become dust there will be still other captains. The industries themselves are the kings. The men are titular heads. We can go Mr. Hurley one better in application of this plan: enlist agriculture not to furnish foodstuffs for war purposes. The next best plan would be universal conscription of all resources for preserving peace.

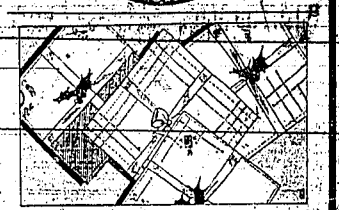

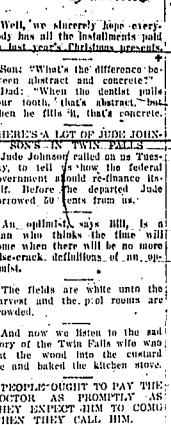

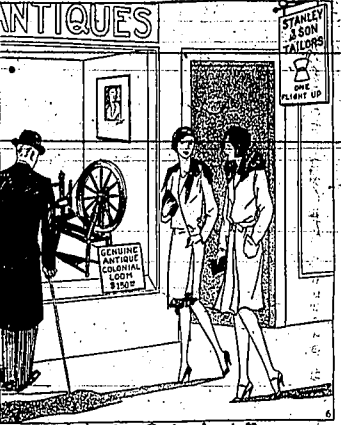
