Death Beckons To Idaho Pioneer Who Visited the American Falls Country in the Early Sixties

Long Before It And Other Tracts Were Developed

It will be again talked through the rapidly-thinning ranks of pioneers who crossed the plains in the middle of the nineteenth century... From American Falls, through the Press of that city, comes the word that Alva Zarine, 82, father of the late George Zarine, passed away at Walls, Wyo., late in November. Mr. Zarine was well known in some of the earliest incidents of early Idaho history, coming west in 1822 with his wife and children in week opportunities offered in a new and untraveled land.

They started from Iowa in April, 1822, and after a long and arduous trip, they arrived in the Walla Walla country in the middle of September. They made their journey by following the Old Oregon Trail, and in August they participated in one of the historic events of pioneer life. They were then the first to give notice to the survivors of the Indian battle at Mission Hill.

For several days before the massacre, his wife and children were isolated but later at American Falls to permit their trail-wagon to rest and repair.

After several years in the Walla Walla country, Mr. Zarine was again attracted to the mountains of Idaho, and in 1829 he returned to the Snake River country. He was one of the first to settle in the area around the present site of American Falls.

Mr. Zarine's party camped for the winter of 1829-30 at the mouth of the Snake River. They then continued their journey, following the Snake River to the mouth of the Snake River.

MUKDEN, Manchuria, Dec. 7. (UP)—A formal Sino-Russian conference to establish relations of the Chinese and Manchurians will open this month, possibly at Harbin, Manchuria, it was understood here today. The preliminary agreements reached between delegates of the Soviet and Manchurian governments for restoring the railway to joint control under the agreement of 1921 will be signed formally when the Mukden delegate, Tsai Yun-Sheng, arrives at Hararovsky, it was said. The preliminary agreement was signed by Tsai Yun-Sheng and the Soviet delegate, Simonovskiy, included among the points that they would refrain from distributing propaganda and the establishment of Communist organs throughout Manchuria, said in a circular telegram sent out by Governor Chang Hsiang-fan of Manchuria.

That is the sort of stuff on which the farmers, driven to the wall by the post-war depression, were fed for years. Now, however, the shoe is on the other foot. But is anyone talking to Big Business as they talked to the farmers? Not at all. The highest government officials lose no time in rushing to help. The nation rings with the trumpet calls that summon the captains of industry and finance to the barricades.

All of this is perfectly natural, of course, and probably it's all perfectly proper. It is, however, rather illuminating. It helps one to understand the exact nature of the civilization in which we are living.

The dollar, if squeezed hard enough, talks louder than any group of men can possibly talk. The banker and the farmer are men from two different worlds.

THE COST OF ILLNESS
THE chief reason for the fight against illness, of course, is because of the mental and physical suffering that it causes. A congressional committee, however, reveals that there are urgent economic reasons as well for striving to make this a healthy nation.

The 36,000,000 wage earners of the United States lose at least 250,000,000 work days a year because of illness; according to the committee. Figure that up in terms of dollars and cents and you'll realize what an enormous bill we pay for sickness.

Apparently the country is doing everything it can, though, to remedy matters. At any rate, the committee discloses that the United States has more physicians in proportion to its population than any other country in the world. Nearly 3,500,000 people are employed in this country in connection with the care and prevention of disease.
