RHODES SCHOLARS INCLUDE STUDENT FROM U. OF IDAHO

George L. Huber, Moscow, to Study at Famous Oxford University

ACADEMY AT ANNAPOLIS PLEAS THE MOST MEN Satisfactory Number of Par Western Students Favored With Scholarships

SWARTZINGER, Pa., Dec. 9. (UP)—Six scholarships from the United States Naval academy will be among the 22 American Rhodes scholar who will take up residence at Oxford University, England, next fall.

The Academy led the list announced last night by President Frank A. Slocum of Swarthmore college, American secretary of the Rhodes trustees. It was the first year Annapolis men had entered the competition. The U. S. Military academy was second with two, the others being selected from colleges and universities, chiefly in the west.

The scholarships were founded under the will of Cecil Rhodes, British empire builder, and entitled the holder of a stipend of \$2,000 a year, totaling for three years. Scholars are chosen for intellectual ability, combined with qualities of character and leadership, and interest in public.



low state debt. It should be kept low for some years yet. Then it will be time enough to think about bonds for state highways.

REMOVING A SURPLUS ONE of the ways to handle a surplus of production has been successfully solved by the California Fruit Growers' exchange in the record made during its last season in selling oranges, lemons and grapefruit of such a volume as only a few years ago would have been ruinous to the growers.

The above business for the year was \$118,874,102, according to the manager's report. But right here is the fact that will prove a surprise to most of us: 6,332 carloads of oranges and lemons were marketed to be used in electrical

extractors for making drinks, and the retail selling price of these drinks was \$63,000,000! In other words, it should be perfectly safe to venture the generalization that the difference between profit and loss in the marketing of these fruits lies in the increased use of the fruits for producing fruit juice drinks. If the exchange still tried to sell oranges, lemons and grapefruit only as fruit, the industry would have been smashed before this.

But the organization had leadership; that was smart enough to use some imagination. It promoted the sale and use of the electrical fruit juice extractors, and has about 54,000 of them in use. Every time those extractors work they are adding to the volume of business for the California organization. And they are furnishing work through demand that has been stimulated by attractive advertising done on a big scale through the medium of newspapers and magazines for the main part with some street car advertising.

Marketing costs during the last year were 2.68 per cent, including the advertising costs. During the year when gross business was more than \$118,000,000, advertising and merchandising costs were \$1,680,000, and plain common sense indicates that those costs were the best costs entailed by the organization.

The citrus fruit growers have used vision and imagination in meeting their marketing problems. Would not the same procedure be well in the case of some Idaho products, potatoes and beans, for instance? We handle these two excellent products in bulk. Would we do well to package them? A small package of Idaho potatoes and a small sack of branched Idaho beans might solve a lot of our problems. We do not pretend to know, but we do wonder.

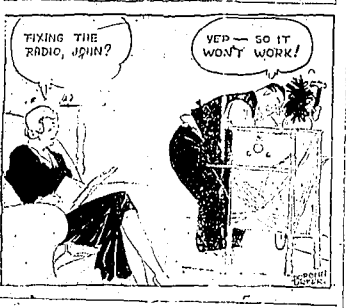
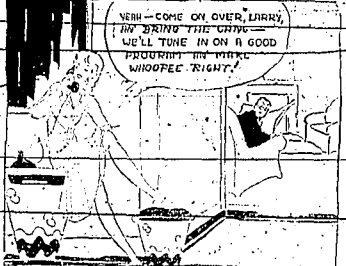

The International highway would create a great avenue of communication, with the markets for their potential products and it would give them stimulating contact with progressive business enterprises of the south. The highway would directly increase the purchasing power of Alaska and northern Canada for these benefits of the entire continent.

This highway project presents engineering difficulties, but not insurmountable ones. They must be bridged, for the fall and mountains elevated. But highway engineers have already done as much and more in the northern states. The International outlook is a good reason to plan for the construction of this great American artery. 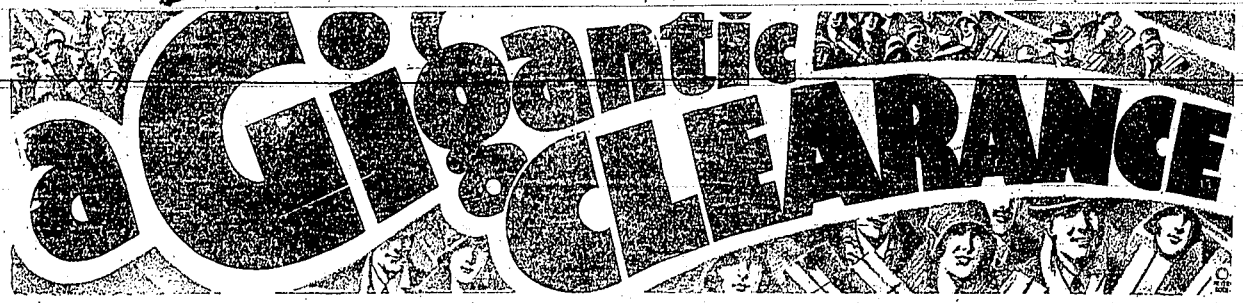
