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# PRISONERS AT AUBURN PENITENTIARY STAGE OPPONENTS OF CHANG KAI-SHEK

## LAUNCHING DETERMINED OFFENSIVE

### Capital of Nationalists Threatened And Heavy Fighting Continues In Four Sectors

SHANGHAI, Dec. 11.—(UP)—Chinese revolutionaries pressed fierce offensive in four sectors of China today, threatening the capital of the Nationalist government at Nanjing with drives to the north and southeast. With General Chiang Kai-Shek concentrating thousands of his troops for a determined defense of Nanjing, rebels were reported to have launched offensives at Chuchow, important rail point 40 miles north of the capital. Wounded already were arriving in Nanjing although the outcome of the battle was unknown. Reinforcements were being rushed by the Nationalists to the scene of the offensive by train and by river. Chuchow is slightly north of Pukow where the serious mutiny in the Nationalist ranks occurred last week.

With American British and Japanese warships converging upon the coast, the Nationalists were reported to have evacuated foreign residents from the capital, there still remaining in the city. The Nationalist government declared that the rule of Chiang Kai-Shek was not seriously threatened. The second rebel drive near Nanjing was in the southeast, in the region north of Lake Tai, midway between Nanjing and Shanghai. The third rebel drive was reported from the north, where the Nationalist army was ordered yesterday by Chiang Kai-Shek, which was to be directed toward the vicinity of Wang-Kuan pass on the Peking-Hankow railway.

To smash the drive of Nationalist troops and the irregular divisions of General Chang Kai-Shek were thrusting a campaign, from which Chiang Kai-Shek withdrew large numbers of Nationalist troops for the defense of Shanghai.

LONDON, Dec. 11.—(UP)—A forceful battle was being waged between Nationalist government troops and revolutionary forces today in a short distance from Canton, an "Exchange Telegram" dispatch from Hong Kong said. The scene of the fighting was approximately 20 to 30 miles east of Canton, where the army of General Chang Kai-Shek and the revolutionary "Ironclads" have headed the drive on the city. Preliminary reports indicate that the Nationalist division had not yet appeared.

THIS part of Idaho has launched the campaign for an extension westward of the Minidoka-Buhl branch railroad in an effort to secure connection with the main line of the Union Pacific system to the west.

No steps fraught with greater potential possibilities of benefit for this whole district of Southern Idaho could be taken at this time, and this newspaper doubts whether any more momentous decision has been made by this part of the state within the past 20 years.

It is significant that the initial meeting of the campaign, attended by directors of the chambers of commerce of both Buhl and Twin Falls, found opinion on the need of the construction project unanimously an enthusiastic unit demanding it.

The benefits that are to be secured by this railroad extension are many. Some of the outstanding ones are as follows:

It will give the country south of the Snake river in this part of Idaho a direct route west thus shortening the haul to north Pacific coast points by more than 100 miles.

It will shorten the haul to California points from the Boise valley by more than 200 miles over the present circuitous route.

It will provide at least some main line facilities for this part of Idaho with the resultant increase in convenience of travel and freight service which such service would make possible.

Such benefits as these are worth the making of real efforts to secure. They challenge leadership and spur it to its best endeavors. They have an appeal that should enlist united support from all the forces in all communities as they have enlisted the unanimous support of the chambers of commerce of two cities.

LEARNING HOW TO LIVE.
Oregon Journal.
How American standards of living are making the whole world a better place in which to live is indicated in National Foreign Trade Council reports for the first nine months of the year which show that American exports in that time amounted in value to \$154,400,000, a gain of 22 per cent over the next highest corresponding period, which was last year.

Manufacture exports were the highest on record, 25 per cent better than during the corresponding months last year, and the reports in automobiles and parts this year are the largest ever recorded and are greater than the entire domestic production of the industry in 1917.

Beneficial manufacturing exports in general, average about 30 per cent of the nation's entire exports, and therein it becomes apparent that the really big job the United States now has to do with the rest of the world is to equip it with machinery, implements and goods representative of the labor-saving devices, electrical equipment and other home furnishings that make life sweeter in the United States.

The "cotton famine" that there is no limit in sight for the sale of such goods almost to the people of foreign nations in the possibilities of the pioneer work done in educating the steady growth of our export trade, its advantages of higher standards of living, and as this knowledge spreads the demand for American-made goods increases.

Especially significant to the West Coast is the circumstance that South America is at present the most active field for our export trade, where the increase amounted to 25 per cent for the first eight months of the year.

In the same period exports to Asia increased 8 per cent, to North America 10 per cent and to Europe 4 per cent.

Europe now takes about half of the exports from the United States, country by country, but the war has lowered the percentage ascribed about equally by new customers in Asia, Canada and South America.

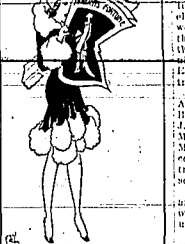

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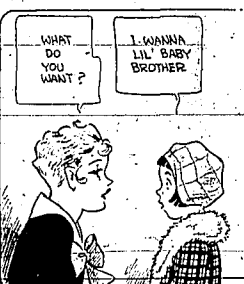

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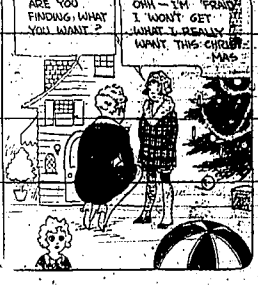

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# High Salaries Paid Teachers Cause Discord in Haiti

## TEN PROFESSORS HIRED ALTHOUGH POOR IN FRENCH

### Underlying Reasons for the Recent Outbreak Given by Prisoners on Negro Island

PORT AU PRINCE, Haiti, Dec. 10.—(AP)—A group of political prisoners alleged instigators of the student strike which precipitated the present crisis in Haiti charged from their cells Tuesday that nearly a dozen American instructors of the former American cultural school and practical farm extension work are drawing generous salaries and expense money while unable to speak the native French, and are otherwise unfitted for the work.

The United Press correspondent interviewed three employees of the Service Technique, which administered the farm extension work, who were brought after martial law was declared last week immediately after students and anti-government leaders formed in disorderly demonstrations. Two were newspaper editors, confined for their activity against the marine-aided administration of President Louis Borno, also were interviewed.

The instructors hired by the prisoners were said to be drawing salaries ranging from \$100 to \$5,000 annually in addition to expenses paid by Haitian taxpayers.

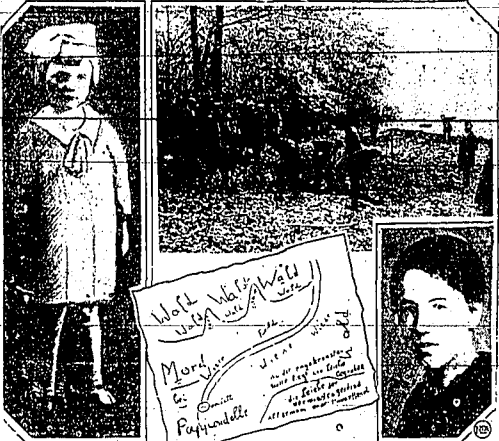
The prisoners were interviewed in the national penitentiary, a yellow painted, rambling masonry structure about a half mile from the presidential palace. The first three prisoners were members of the employers' committee of the Service Technique, who voted to strike five days before martial law was declared.

Professor Names.  
They named ten professors of the Service Technique and charged that not one of them could speak French and that usually they did not appear at classes but merely wrote out their lectures and had them translated to the students by assistants. On the other hand all three had high praise for some of the American instructors, including some whose French was good.
