QUET RESTORED AT PRISON WHERE RIOT CAUSED NINE DEATHS

Bloodiest Outbreak in History Of Auburn Penitentiary Finally Controlled By Authorities

AUBURN, N. Y., Dec. 12.—(AP)—The bloodied prison riot the state of New York has known was definitely at an end today, with the death penalty hanging over the convict muniters who were still alive after the desperate hand-to-hand fighting which put the revolt under control.

The band of criminals who gambled with their lives for freedom, and lost, was routed last night when nearly 300 national guardsmen stormed across the prison yard.

Two ring leaders of the rebellion in that last assault, two other convicts and the head keeper, George A. Durmford, had been killed in the fighting earlier in the day when there were moments when the life of Warden Edgar Jennings hung in balance.

A score of guards and convicts were wounded. All convicts who took part in the uprising, even in a minor degree, will be charged with first degree murder, it was announced from Albany by Raymond Kied, commissioner of corrections.

"By terms of the statutes," Kied said, "anybody who commits a murder while engaged in the commission of any crime and any of his accomplices, although they may not actually have committed the murder themselves, are guilty of first degree murder. Even though the rioters may have been in some other part of the prison when Officer Keeper Durmford was killed they are guilty of murder, and may be sentenced to the chair."

AUBURN, N. Y., Dec. 12.—(UP)—The official list of deaths in the Auburn prison outbreak: Principal Keeper George A. Durmford; Henry Sullivan, 27, sentenced to 20-21 years from Buffalo with an additional seven years for exciting riots; a rioter leader in the riot; Perry Johns, 41, of High Hampton, sentenced to a life term; Alexander Tchoukha, sentenced to life from Erie county; Robert E. Pavers, first degree murderer; Jake Donnell, 28, county convict, sentenced to terms, 20-25 years and 5-10 years.

A fourth woman is Mrs. Jeanette Rankin of Montana.

LARGE SUM WILL BE DISTRIBUTED DURING HOLIDAYS

NEW YORK Dec. 12 (UP)—More than two billion dollars will be distributed to Wall Street workers, brokers and the general public during this year's Christmas season.

THE FAITH OF A SCIENTIST IS THE modern age an era of doubt and broken faith? Not if you take the word of Dr. Robert A. Millikan, famous American physicist who recently won the Nobel prize.

In the current issue of The Golden Book Dr. Millikan is quoted as follows: "I believe that one of the greatest contributions the United States ever can or ever will make to world progress will consist in furnishing an example to the world of how the religious life of a nation can evolve intelligently, inspiringly, reverently, completely divorced from all unreason, all superstition and all unwholesome emotionalism."

IN SELF DEFENSE. PUBLICITY matter sent out by the national department of the American Legion to newspapers includes an appeal to Legion posts to secure a big membership so that a fight being made in congress to secure legislation for disabled veterans may have a better chance of being won.

On the face of it such a situation should not exist, we submit. The Legion does not care who knows that it is compelled to depend on the weight of membership it can secure to help force through legislation. This is shown by the fact that the publicity matter referred to was sent out for general newspaper use.

Whenever the action of congress in such a matter as providing needed facilities for disabled veterans is made contingent on the American Legion marshalling a big club in the form of increased membership in its organization something is wrong. Does congress understand no language except that of political force? Has the conscience of the legislative department of our federal government atrophied?

There are 5,543 veterans mentally ill who are now herded together in state institutions and jails, because of lack of government hospital facilities, a recent Legion survey disclosed. That should make it plain that the Legion is moved only by the highest of motives—succor to those in distress when it appeals for added hospital facilities. It is anything but a compliment to the United States that the Legion's hand has been so far forced, that it feels impelled to fall back on the political force of added numbers in order to secure this succor.

And if there are those who think this problem is a problem that may apply in Maryland but has no application in Idaho, the thought should be dismissed as erroneous.

A few weeks since a veteran was arrested in Twin Falls on a minor charge. He stole some tools. He was suffering from a form of insanity, Twin Falls post of the American Legion did its best to have him committed to a government hospital where it was thought special treatment might permit of his rehabilitation. It was impossible to secure this treatment, and he was sent to the state hospital for insane. That man was a graduate civil engineer, and it is our understanding that his trouble had its inception in war service.

BUSINESS IS HOPEFUL. NEVER before in history has American business showed such a determination not to be crippled by a stock market crash as has been the case in the past few weeks.

The National Association of Credit Men is the latest in the list of business organizations to insist that business is going to go forward in spite of Wall Street's gyrations. A bulletin from this organization declares that the freeing of funds formerly tied up in brokers' loans has brought about a positive improvement in the basic credit situation. "The shakedown has done in at least one good thing for business, in that it has scared away from the brokerage office a lot of people who had no right to be spending time and money here in the first place," adds the bulletin. FROM THE PUBLIC HANDLING OF POTATOES.

Referring to your editorial of the 8th regarding a "Supplies." We fail to find in your suggestion a remedy, but you are frankly admitting "we do not pretend to know." The writer must also make some admission but here's our idea: To compare the cost of marketing a generally high priced commodity with that of a generally low priced commodity is unwise. It costs just as much in actual effort and service, if that is the thing we pay for, to market a car of potatoes as it does a car of oranges, and we believe more as the citrus fruit has very little competition but this is not what we wished to discuss.

Here is: A few years ago, say eight or ten, potatoes returned the growers fully as many dollars per acre as they do now. Then they went out in any kind of bags just as long as they held potatoes. Some were operators, but some conceived the idea of branding, so branded bags had their start. The first season or two a premium of 2 cents to 10 cents per hundred was realized by the dealer for the actual effort and service, if that is the thing we pay for, to market a car of potatoes as it does a car of oranges, and we believe more as the citrus fruit has very little competition but this is not what we wished to discuss.

The potato is among the commonest foods. Practically every family in the United States uses them daily. Every innovation in the handling and packing costs money, and this fact gets that the potato grower pays for the innovation. The average consumer can afford to pay about so much for potatoes, beyond a certain price they become a luxury and are substituted. The average family cannot substitute the brand but can get the 5 cent carton that contains the fifteen pounds of potatoes.

We question if the grower of oats receives more for his grain now than he did when the small old rolled oats sold for 2 cents per pound on the other growers but we are sure that "Mr. Quaker" has not suffered. So it is, we continue to add to the cost of grading and packing, not that the grower may realize more, but that the individual or firm operator who deals in the bulk potato may make more profit and at the same time make the trade more financially, which tends to cut down consumption.

Just this season an innovation is being attempted in it to grade out all the potatoes under it ounces and put up a U. S. Grade No. 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, 9, 10. This year this quality is demanding a premium of 15 cents to 25 cents to the grower. If the growers are willing to stand for this it is just a matter of time until the trade demand from Idaho comes and up. Our premium will be no greater than heretofore but we will have no more and better number (two) that are now being marketed with small consumption.

Growers and newspapers are slow to realize that every added cost to the potato, either in sacks or cartons, or boxes or labor, the grower must be the spread between the consumer and the grower. And the eye level potato still, even though the name of Idaho is electrically burned in its misdeed.

Idaho is now doing too much SKIMMING. The cream of her potato crop is bringing the prices, which the grower does not receive. The skinned potatoes are sent to the trade as U. S. No. 1's or U. S. No. 2's with the large ones in the sack with the medium and smalls, so that the American housewife could select the size she wished without the cost of preparing. This she would not be forced to do. The large potatoes were all Fancy Bakers, too expensive to eat, or all small size, too small to prepare or eat.

In most quarters it is expected that more than half this two million estimated will eventually find its way into the stock market. Contrary to former reports, however by leading Wall Street analysts are confidently expected to break all records, notwithstanding possible large losses suffered by some of the buyers through the November break in the market. Business in stocks has broken all records and from present indications will continue extremely active at least over the first few months of next year.

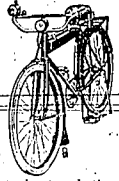

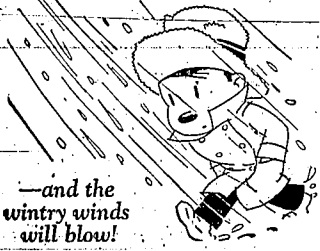

U. S. FOREIGN TRADE IS SURE TO IMPROVE

ONE of the most favorable factors in the outlook for American business is the improved prospect for foreign trade. Greater sales of the products of American farms and factories to consumers in other countries are expected to result from the entire credit conditions which have followed the latest market break. Such an increase would help to offset any decline in domestic sales.

High money rates in the United States over recent months tended to restrict the granting of credit to foreign buyers. This of course resulted in a reduction of their purchases. Present credit conditions are more favorable and larger exports are likely.

Actually in October sales of American goods abroad totaled \$270,000,000. This was a sharp gain, partly seasonal, over September, when the total was \$112,000,000. Imports amounted somewhat also, being \$220,000,000 against \$181,000,000 in the preceding month. During the first 10 months of 1929, exports were valued at \$1,772,600,000, compared with imports of \$3,275,000,000. It is notable that such expansion as there was of foreign sales in 1929 resulted chiefly from greater sales of manufactured goods. During the first 10 months, foreign sales of finished goods gained 18 per cent, while crude materials dropped off 2 per cent.

Most notable gains have been made for American machinery, electrical equipment and automotive parts. The value of the latter during the first eight months of the year, was \$27,612,700, or more than double that for the like period of 1928. The reason for this large increase is found in the greater number of assembling plants being established abroad by American car producers. Exports of machinery valued 25 per cent, while electrical equipment increased 32 per cent.
