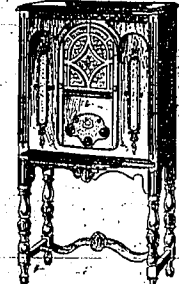

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DEFENSE QUIZZES EXPERT WITNESS IN LOWE TRIAL

Charles H. Kingsley Continues Testimony, Describing Handwriting on Court Exhibit

After having undergone a stiff cross-examination all members of the defense counsel, Charles Kingsley, Boise handwriting expert, started his second day on the witness stand this morning. He testified this afternoon in the trial of the case of the State vs. Kingsley, Kingsley's testimony on that day early Tuesday morning and testified for the state until late in the day. J. W. Taylor of the defense began cross-examination before court recessed today. It was understood at the court house that the next witness for the state would be George H. Kingsley, a handwriting expert. In his deposition was today that the trial would be postponed until Christmas. 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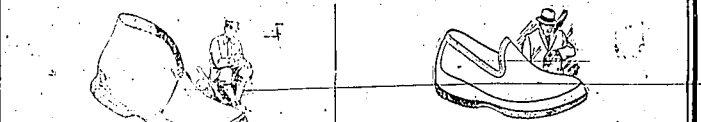

charges alone would nearly double the cost of the roadway product. It appears that unless a major greater bond issue can be made, the economic benefits to the traveling public would not warrant the indebtedness."

It is of interest to note that the \$35,000,000 now invested in the state highway system the federal government contributed 46.68 per cent, the state 21.72 per cent and local agencies 31.60 per cent. The state's contribution to the highway system from 1913 to 1927, inclusive, amounted to \$19,256,000, with the sources as follows:—by direct levies 21 1/2 per cent; by bond issues, 26 per cent; by motor vehicle license, 26 per cent; by motor bus taxes, 10 per cent; one per cent gasoline tax, 36 per cent. Continuing, the report states:

"The motorist has paid well over 50 per cent of Idaho's highway bill. Present state revenue is derived entirely from the motorist. The last state highway bond issue was in 1921. Except for retirement of these bonds, no direct levy has been made since the nine-tenths mill levy of 1921."

A short time since this newspaper expressed its opposition to the suggested proposal of a state bond issue to speed highway building. The commissioner's report shows that local districts have already contributed more than the state to put systems in place. What is not disclosed is that the contributions by local districts in most cases, probably, represent bonded indebtedness still unpaid. We do not need more state bonds for highway purposes until our local debts are more nearly paid than they are now.

OREGON'S CHRISTMAS GIFT
Oregon Journal
Order of the interstate commerce commission directing the Union Pacific to build the 185 miles, across-state railroad from Cranford to Coos Bay, prescribes the vital role of birth of the state. It sets Oregon's clock, almost 25 years.

The order prescribes exploitation of the great Central Oregon domain and new development in Western and Southwestern Oregon in timber, agriculture, horticulture, fishing, shipping and cattle raising that will be conducted by short-dipped rail transportation to outside markets. Southern Idaho and Northern California will rejoice no less than Oregon in the commission's order, and for similar reasons.

The order is complimentary to the Oregon public service commission and to individuals who have labored long and consistently to break down the one great barrier of inadequate transportation facilities that has blocked development in Oregon while adjoining states to the north and south have progressed in full measure. Washington has extensive railroads, smaller in area, it has twice Oregon's population. California has across-state railroads. She has taken her place in the sun.

It is Oregon's turn. The commission charged with final responsibility in the case has recognized the justice of Oregon's plea for relief from a situation that is manifestly unfair to a commonwealth where in such vast potentialities lie length from transportation starvation.

Busy Legislative Program Faces Houses of Congress

RESOLUTIONS FOR PROBE OF HAITIAN CONDITIONS HEARD

Early Action Expected on Proposal to Investigate Affairs of the Negro Republic

WASHINGTON, Dec. 18, (AP)—Work on various phases of President Hoover's legislative program kept congress busy Tuesday. Indications were that bills would be passed and sent to the White House for signature before the Christmas adjournment Saturday. The \$100,000,000 tax reduction already has been passed as the first law of the regular session.

The Paris resolution for a commission to investigate Haitian conditions was brought out of committee and action on the resolution was planned for today. The resolution was changed to limit membership on the commission to seven and require a report in six months.

The President's plan for stimulation of business by increasing government, building was advanced by an amendment to the senate committee report on the \$270,000,000 supreme court, building bill, passed by the house Monday.

The committee also promised to take up today the \$200,000,000 bill increasing federal building programs in all the states and the District of Columbia.

The senate cotton-price investigating committee got cheerful news from W. L. Clayton, head of one of the largest cotton firms in the world, who predicted more active buying by spinners after Christmas.

Thursday night the Jerome team plays at Shoshone and on Friday night the team will team up to be defeated by Joseph at Gooding.

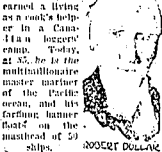
