### Grantland Rice's All-America Team

Ben Texnor, Harvard center and captain-leader of the 1926 eleven. **NEW YORK, Dec. 21 (AP)—**The "wise money" of Broadway was laid on odds of 5 to 1 against Morgan over Bass, and the heavy poundage of the purse for the championship fight was held up for more than four years, but it is being taken up in Philadelphia just as the money begins to dry up.

Whether the fight will be allowed to keep the championship with the champion of the New York State Athletic commission depends, however, upon the outcome of an appeal to the Supreme court which was launched last night after the loss.

Chairman Jim Farley, who was at the ringside, ordered the purses of both fighters held up and said his commission would inquire into all circumstances surrounding the bout.

The fight itself was sufficient by appearance to satisfy the average customer.

Two straight fights in the jaw early in the second round strictly decided the contest. Morgan's clinch helped to lay the dictates of a fighting rest. Knocked down for a second time at the start of the round, Tod Morgan got up only to run into a smashing right to the jaw which finished him. The knock-out came after 54 seconds.

Never before has a champion entered the ring on the short end of such heavy as took place around Madison Square Garden where the crowd had gathered to watch the fight, scheduled for 15 rounds.

Morgan was knocked out in 54 seconds in 1925 against Ben Holt in a since winning it from Mike Holt, defeated the championship by a score of 12 rounds, with Bass out a pound lighter.

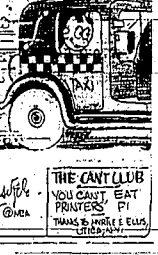
### GOLF TOURNEY IN 2ND ROUND

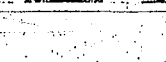

 Although I'm but a working man, I live by honest labor;

**THE SUSPENDED SENTENCE**

**OVER** in Salt Lake City the Tribune has been waging a campaign designed to decrease the number of traffic accidents and to make the streets safer for drivers of motor cars.  
 As a part of its campaign the newspaper has brought the torchlight of publicity to bear on the increase in the use of the suspended sentence in courts, and this phase of the subject has recently received considerable attention.  
 The theory of the suspended sentence may at one time have had more in its favor than can be said in its behalf today. Without pretending to pose as an authority on the subject, this newspaper concedes that at one time the suspended sentence may have come into use as a softener of justice. If mitigating circumstances existed a jail sentence and a fine might both have been imposed, the fine collected and the jail sentence suspended during good behavior without justice having been defeated.  
 But jail sentences today in many cases appear to the layman to exist chiefly as a club through which collection of fines may be assured.  
 The Salt Lake newspaper insists that if an individual does some deed which warrants punishment by a jail sentence, he should receive that kind of sentence and not a suspended sentence. Further, it states:  
 "The application of this doctrine to all convicted law violators, without regard to extenuating circumstances, will have the immediate effect of restoring respect for law. The offender who pleads guilty to a charge from which there seems no possible escape rests upon the hope of the suspended sentence. Another offender, convicted after a defense that proved futile, rather expects the same kind of treatment."  
 "But the court which imposes the suspended sentence need not expect either type of defendant to look upon his decree with seriousness or respect."  
 There is not the respect for law in this age that should exist, and that one who would insist that our respect for law is increasing would be either a fool or an optimist. If certainism of use of the suspended sentence will bring citizens who esteem the law lightly back into the ranks of those who have respect for it then the suspended sentence should be banished.

**A CONVICT SPEAKS**

**FROM** the lips of Lloyd Treseder, arrested in Twin Falls and held for the authorities at San Quentin prison from where he escaped early in 1929, were uttered some words of wisdom, which, if applied, would bring benefits to youth of the world which teachers, moralists and preachers have striven in vain to have believed.  
 "Don't dabble in crime," is the gist

of the convict's message, as uttered in a news story that appeared the other day in this newspaper.

The message was not delivered in a lecture hall or from a pulpit. It was soberly spoken in jail in simple words that are easily understood.  
 "According to Treseder's own lips, his record in part is as follows: Committed to San Quentin for a seven year term for burglary. He was a drug addict at the time and broke the habit by refusing to take any morphine. Though his fight to release himself from the drug's grip caused him to be ill for a month. After serving 19 months he and a companion trusty escaped from a road gang last May. His record for good behavior would have entitled him to parole within a few months.

After regaining his freedom he reverted to the use of morphine and now is habituated to it again in such degree that light doses have been administered to him by a physician in jail. Gone are the benefits of his good behavior record, and gone his liberty. Gone, also, is the fight he made to free himself from the drug's habit.

San Quentin awaits his return, and the grim prison will be home to him now for several years after he is returned.

"Don't dabble in crime," he said. He spoke out of his own personal experience. The wisdom of what he said has been burned into his consciousness by his own errors. That melancholy admission subscribed to by many human beings which he uttered does not help him much: "I wish I had it all to do over again." It should be remembered by others.

That little colored boy who stole his landlady's money to use for buying Christmas presents had a part of the Christmas idea correctly in mind. He wanted to make other children happy. He was wrong in that he had to make the landlady unhappy by stealing her money.

TO SQUARE ACCOUNTS

Can the Union Pacific afford to resist the order to build the cross-state line?  
 "This is not a novel question in Oregon. Years and year ago \$20,000,000 that it had collected in fares and freights from the people of Oregon was taken out of Oregon and spent in construction of lines in other states."

That was the beginning of the departure from the old days when the Oregon Navigation company and the Oregon Railway and Navigation company now part of the Union Pacific, were builders and developers of Portland and Oregon. And since that time there is a long list of grievances that the people of this state can cite against the great line that has farred so well and sacrificed to little in behalf of Oregon.

The same can be said of the late Senator Chamberlain, then governor of Oregon, who moved down to visit the late Mr. Harrison in his Klamsath Lake lodge and then begged the railroad king to build a line into Central Oregon, the reply was a prompt and decisive refusal.

And that reply was final until the late Jim Hill began to build a line into Central Oregon. Then the head of the Union Pacific bent every energy to keep the Hill line from entering the Central Oregon country. And another of a long roll of offending is the Union Pacific's strenuous hostility to the effort of Portland and Oregon to get in lowered freight rates the benefit of the low, or cost of haul through the Columbia gorge in hostility against shorter Portland and Oregon. In the aggressive effort of that road to have the Columbia Basin rate set aside by the commission.

And there were the fast trains that the Union Pacific and numerous great California cities and for a long time denied Northern west cities, a policy that there was every indication was to continue in effect, until the Great Northern announced a through fast train that drove the other roads into like action.

After all these and other affronts, isn't it at last time when the Union Pacific should meet at least one duty that it owes Oregon and build the cross-state line?

The cross-state line would shorten distances, without any westward or eastward, would have no effect. Would shorten distances that empty cars coming west for logs would have to be hauled, it would save cars and train crews and locomotive crews and locomotives by hauling trains direct instead of over cumbersome routes.  
 Best of all, it would give a railroads empire transportation for which there has been nearly a century of waiting. A fifth of the area of Oregon is railroads. Several Atlantic States would be able to add to the railroads less area without crossing its borders. The independence of railroads has had a lot to do with the fact that Oregon's population is nine to the square mile against Washington's 20 and California's 21.  
 The Union Pacific can wipe out the unpleasant past by building the cross-state line instead of quibbling.

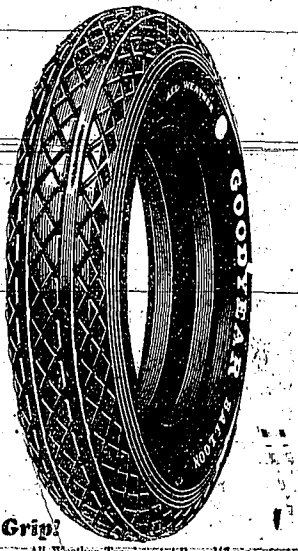

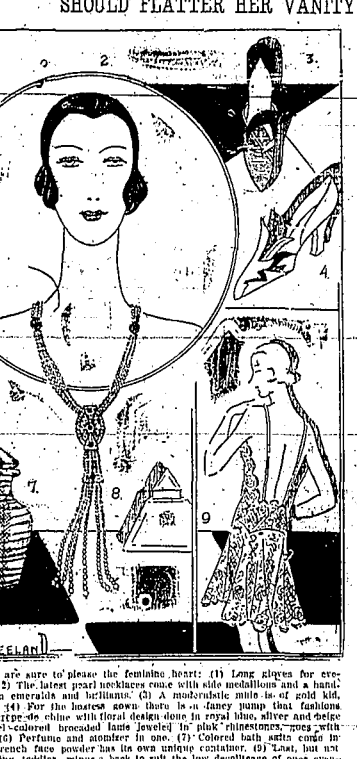
