### FARM BLOC SEES NO BENEFIT FROM PROPOSED MOVE

Faction in Congress Does Not Believe It Will Out Freight Rates  
METHOD OF ATTACK YET UNDETERMINED  
Republican Leaders Plan to Put Teeth in Proposal of Commission

WASHINGTON, Dec. 26, (UP)—Congress was far from ready today over the proposed railroad consolidation plan of the Interstate Commerce Commission.  
While the farm bloc members are printing with material from now the project because they do not believe it will reduce freight rates to the farmer, Republican leaders are planning a way to put teeth into the commission proposal.

Considered After Holidays  
The issue probably will be taken up in the house and senate tomorrow. The committee immediately after the holidays. The commissioners who stand the responsibility for the proposed plan are the dissenting reports probably will be called as witnesses. The farm bloc is expected to be in opposition to the plan. Under the law the proposal is largely up to the railroad. Most railroads have been inclined to favor a voluntary consolidation.

Republican leaders are wholeheartedly in favor of the consolidation. They are in the rail systems of the nation into 10 extensive units, five in the north and five in the south. They believe the consolidation will result in a reduction of freight rates.

Senator James O. Eastland, (Miss.) sponsor of legislation to bring strong pressure on the railroads that they will be inclined to follow the consolidation scheme. He has introduced a bill providing that if the consolidation is not approved by the commission, steps to force consolidation should be taken. The bill will probably be received along similar lines and reintroduced as it can be brought up to date.

### Manchuria, Russia At Last End-Strike

#### Protocol Signed Sunday Provides for Immediate Termination of Dispute Over Railroad

MOSCOW, Dec. 23 (UP)—A protocol providing for an immediate termination of bitter Chinese Eastern railway dispute between Soviet Russia and the Chinese Manchurian government, was signed yesterday at Harbin, leaving only minor questions to be settled at a formal conference here January 25.  
The protocol was signed by Tsai-Yun-Shen, representing the Manchurian government with the approval of the Nationalist government of China, and agent Simonyuk of the Soviet foreign office.  
The two chief provisions as announced are the immediate restoration of the Chinese Eastern railway to joint administration and the withdrawal of the Soviet forces from Manchuria as soon as possible.

Both China and Russia will release all civilian and military prisoners then since the dispute began in July. The Russian consulates in Manchuria and Chinese consulates in Russia will be reopened.  
A formal conference is called for January 25 to settle all remaining questions.  
The railway will be restored to the system for operation provided for by the agreement of 1924. It was the seizure of the railway by the Chinese last July which led to hostilities recently marked by the advance of the Soviet troops into Manchuria from the west and east.
