Reverent Mass Will Be Held Tonight; Thousands to Participate

BETHLEHEM, Palestine, Dec. 23. (UP)—These hills which were the home of some 1200 years ago appear today to be the scene of thousands of pilgrims come to worship as shepherds did on the first Christmas.

Pilgrims from many lands and all Christian sects, some in the older garb of the occident and others in the latest styles of the east, streamed along the five and one-half miles of winding road to take part in tonight's great Christmas mass.

Some came in automobiles, some on donkeys and many afoot. On the way they passed scenes treasured in sacred history, the tomb of the infant, dedicated to the three who sing of the east; the convent of Elizabeth, the wife of Joseph and David's well.

All were headed toward the great Church of the Nativity, containing the grotto which tradition says "baptized" the spot where the manger in which the Savior was laid.

Bethlehem has changed little over the centuries. The shepherds still tend their flocks in the hills, and there is the same type of ancient houses with arched windows and domes.

The son of the angels will be reproduced by the chanting workers in the church of the nativity.

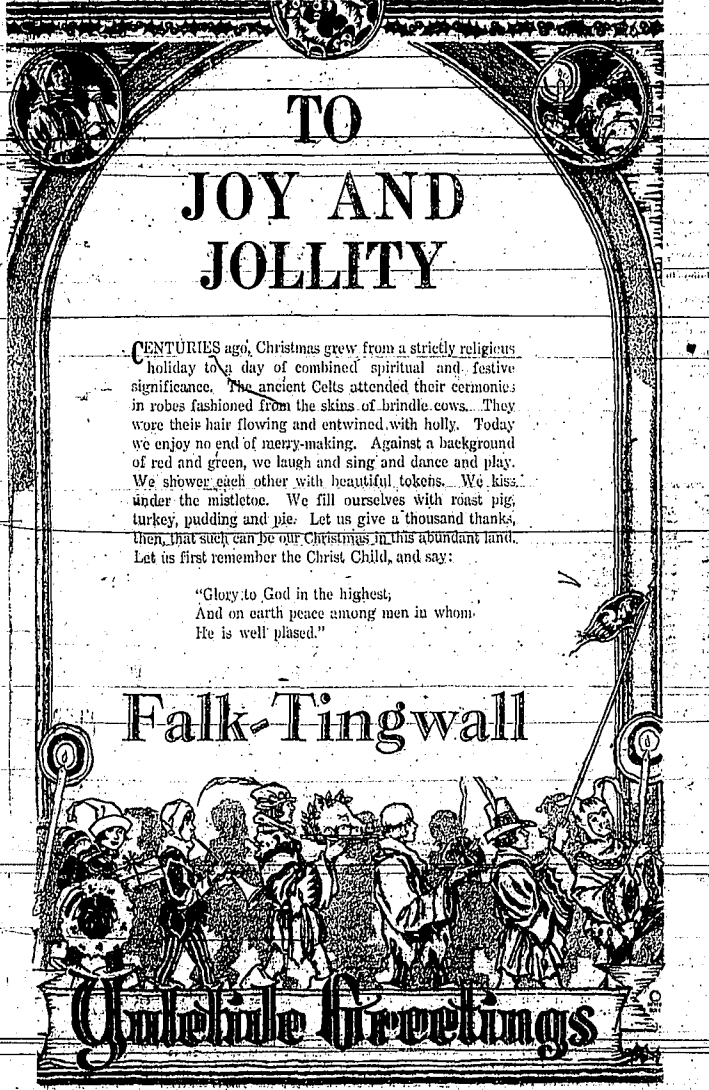

COMMUNITIES STEP AHEAD

New work is being done and new steps in development are being taken in communities round about us. Shoshone voters recently authorized the issuance of a bond issue of \$35,000 to provide funds for replacements in its city water system. Burley is now engaged in making further improvements on its airport out of the fund of \$19,000 recently authorized at a bond election.

Twin Falls is planning to replace old wooden pipes in its water system at a faster rate than has been possible heretofore. The plan here is to provide the funds through a rate increase to the user.

GET THIS INSURANCE

INSURANCE in the form of adjusted compensation certificates, commonly known as soldiers' bonus, provided by the federal government several years ago, stands to be lost by about 300 Idaho veterans unless they make their applications before this year closes. The average size of the policies is about \$1,000, depending on length of service.

Veterans in this part of Idaho should see either Terry Prater or Jake Roup and get their applications filled out for this insurance. It's theirs for the taking now, but after January 2 the right to take it will have lapsed.

Best Editorial of the Day

NO HARSHNESS TO THE RAILROAD
Portland, Oregonian

Commenting on the decision of the interstate commerce commission ordering the suspension of the central Oregon railroad, the Oregonian Gazette-Times says:

How would you like to be a railroad company and have your work all cut out for you by a government bureau? Before you say you would like to take a look at the set-up of the Union Pacific which has been ordered to build a line across central Oregon east and west for 135 miles through sagebrush where there isn't an acre of a family to the square mile on either side of the railroad track.

To which we answer: How would you like to be a railroad company and have the several forms of protection given to railroads by the transportation act? A federal commission strives to make rates that yield a fair return on fair value of the property. Competition in rates is taboo, that is rates of the kind that formerly caused wars. Railroads are authorized to combine, subject to approval by the commission, thereby to effect great economy in operation. Only about 70 miles of that 135-mile road will be through unhabited country, and it will be a bridge between two populated areas which the commission finds will soon pay a fair return. It is no hardship to build such a bridge line. Many of them have been built voluntarily. The Union Pacific built one from Rogerson to Wells, which is surrounded by desert. Obligation to building that road, is not inspired, we believe by genuine fear that it will prove a bad investment or by lack of the necessary capital, but because its construction is contrary to Union Pacific policy, which is surrounded by desert.

WINTER'S GIFTS

SO Gracious to us is summer in the beauties it showers on us in Idaho, and so lavishly does autumn treat us in dispensing gifts for our enjoyment that we could really feel no slight were intended if when winter came the world grew drab and ugly and lacking in the pleasures the other seasons yield in such bounteous measure.
