Idaho's Horses Lost
There were 2,811 head of horses lost in Idaho during the calendar year. The loss was the largest since 1918, when 3,572 horses and mules were reported to have fallen from a grazing on Idaho's ranches. There is a report that during 1920 there were 11,523 horses and mules lost in the state in the same way.



ageous enough to face the responsibil-
ities it may place upon us.

A DEPLORABLE TENDENCY
From the Oregon Journal is reprinted
the following excerpt of an editorial:

A FEDERAL judge has denied Amer-
ican citizenship to Mrs. Margaret
Webb, Richmond, Indiana, because
she is a Quaker.

During her examination for admis-
sion she was asked the question, "If
the law were changed compelling
women to fight, what would you do?"
She replied, "I could not fight."

Thereupon the judge said, "It all
seems to come down to the Schwim-
mer case," and the application was
denied. Whereat has it come to this,
that in our own United States "freed-
om of conscience," for which our
Revolutionary forefathers fought and
died on bloody battlefields, is some-
times "free" and sometimes not "free?"

Remembering, as we wish to do and
as we must, all of the talk that is be-
ing made about peace between na-
tions and the desirability of banishing
war as a means of settling national
differences, just what do such rulings by
our courts portend?

One of the questions quoted as hav-
ing been asked of this woman candi-
date for citizenship seems to point the
way. The question was:

"If the law were changed com-
pelling women to fight, what would
you do?" Her reply was that she could
not fight.

Is that the tendency in this coun-
try toward peace? Do we anticipate
the day when we shall have battal-
ions of women under arms in the
field? And are we preparing now for
that day, and do we anticipate it in
the examinations for citizenship re-
quired of women?

It would seem so, and such proced-
ure is far from creditable to this
country of ours.

As the editorial from which the
quotation was taken states, the mother
of President Hoover could not have
been granted citizenship under the
same procedure. Neither could any
Quaker women if they put the tenets
of their religion ahead of their desire
to gain citizenship.

In the future it will be possible for
the peoples of Southern Europe to en-
ter the United States and to be admit-
ted to citizenship; but Quaker women
of foreign birth may not become citi-
zens. Could any more stinging insult
be heaped on the head of Quakers
than this? Could anything be less
fair than this?

It is rank heresy to the minds of
many in this country to advocate the

principle of universal conscription of
all capital and all resources for use
of the federal government in time of
war. The time was when it was heresy
to advocate conscription of human
beings, too, but the frightful demands
of war made conscription necessary
and it was adopted.

Now we are granting citizenship to
women on the basis of their willing-
ness to bear arms in time of war.

They we have recruited widely from
the spirit that guided our country in
its early days. Capital is too precious
to be subject to the same provisions
as human life, but foreign born
Quaker women may not be admitted
to citizenship unless they forewear
their religious beliefs and swear they
are ready to bear arms for this coun-
try in time of war. Some may find
pride in such a state of affairs. We
do not!

THE DEBT OF THE STUDENT

WHEN you reduce the matter of a
college education to dollars and
cents, it is quickly becomes apparent
that the college student owes a very
real debt to his college—a debt that
puts him under a deep moral obliga-
tion to make the most of his oppor-
tunities.

The annual report of the University
of Chicago, for example, shows that
students' fees—tuition and the like—
provide just under 40 per cent of the
university's total operating income.

In other words, for every four dol-
lars that the student spends on his
college course, the university spends
six more. It is paying more of the
cost of his education than he is.

Obviously, then, the student who re-
fuses to study, who spends his time
as an idler and a "collegiate" do-noth-
ing, is literally cheating his college.
For it should be noted that similar
conditions prevail at every college and
university in the land. No student
really pays his way.

Best Editorial of the Day.

**MULLAN NOT ALONE IN ITS VICE
SHAME**
Lewisohn Tribune

Citizens of Idaho are inclined to blush
a little at its naughty little child, Mullan,
where it is alleged that the municipality
is indulging in the business of taxing
liquor and vice joints. We raise our hands
in horror at the audacity of the town and
carefully bestow on the Council of Mullan our
best holier-than-thou gaze.

But is Mullan the only dirty little sister
on the prohibition map? Is it the only
town which legal authorities dare to flout
that noble experiment of prohibition?

According to the Morning Astorian of Astoria,
Oregon, it decidedly is not. The Astorian
reveals that organized bootlegging also flour-
ishes in this city under a system of licensing
which differs from that at Mullan only in
its origin and legality. Instead of col-
lecting license money it is legally taken
at Astoria in the form of fines.

The Astorian tells us that

... it is a long time since an
Astoria bootlegger has had to do a
day in jail. The average bootlegger
is fined about three to four times
a year. The average fine in the police
court per "sinch" is \$300. Beer hall
operators sometimes get off with
feather sentences.

This business, a municipal license
fee of the "larger," to about \$40 a
month Sunday pay made and some pay
less, but none much more nor much
less.

Idaho and Oregon are among the original
"home dry" states Idaho by legisla-
tive act, Oregon by popular vote. Even
before the passage of the eighteenth amend-
ment these were considered strongholds of
prohibition. Yet they find themselves con-
fronted with evidence of quasi-official cor-
ruption in liquor traffic which would seem
to indicate a striking degeneracy in pro-
hibition enforcement.

It would be foolish to say that this con-
dition prevails in a majority of the American
cities. Yet it is widespread enough to raise
grave concern as to the future of honest
government under present prohibition con-
ditions.

Several recent events came to mind to
arouse this anxiety. The future city govern-
ment of Leadville, Colorado, was indicted
this summer for liquor conspiracy under cir-
cumstances similar to the Mullan case. Phila-
delphia awarded a contract for the city
which undermined the morale of the police
department, Chicago, afflicted with gangster
bootleggers, has been dubbed the "Crime
Capital of the World." Detroit has found
wholesale and systematic graft in the em-
ployees of the police force, practically the en-
tire personnel of the city and county adminis-
tration in South Jacksonville and Fort Lanier,
Fla., Florida, were indicted on charges of
conspiracy to violate the Prohibition laws.

No, little Mullan, is not alone in its
shame. Rather, as the Morning Astorian
says, "We cannot stare at the officials of
Mullan—they were just too damn frank about
it."

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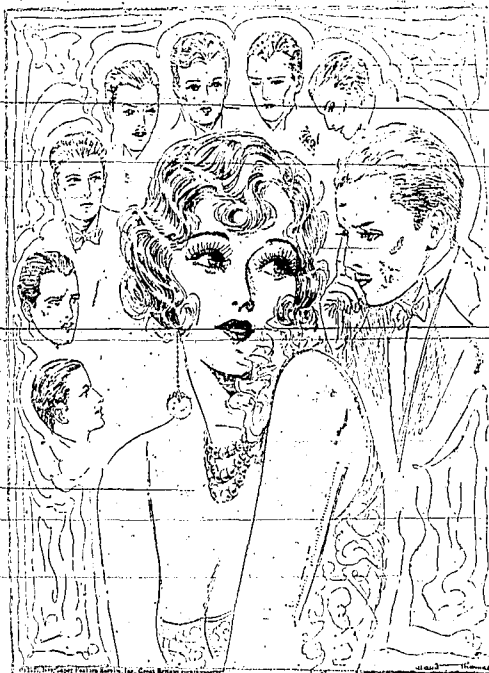

GUILLOTINE IS IDLE IN PARIS AND PROVINCES

PARIS, (U.P.)—The guillotine is becoming a relic of a past civilization. It is no longer used in France today, and never before.

Within four days, three self-confessed patriots and one avowed traitor were executed. The guillotine has not been called upon to work in Paris for nearly three years while in the provinces the guillotine has been called in months and only a few times in the past several years.

Sentences of death pronounced on five women during the year for the most horrible murders, including the poisoning of babies and husbands, were commuted to life in the Republic. Ten assassins have just been executed from guillotines on Devil's Island because of delicate health.

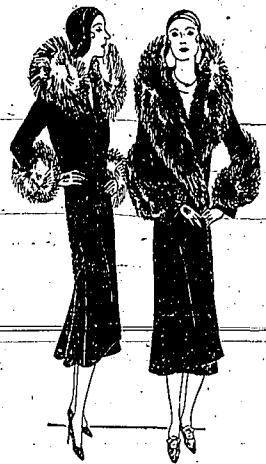
The Assize court of the Seine acquitted Louis Marchand, 37-year-old man, who explained that he killed his father because the latter made the boy's mother unhappy.

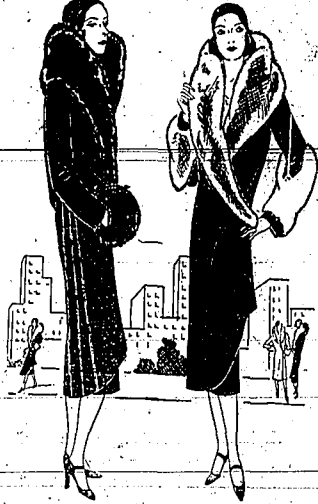
