MITCHELL ISSUES STINGING REBUKE TO DRY CRITICS

Attorney General Upholds the Work Done by the Registration Department

STATEMENT AIMED AT SENATOR FROM IDAHO

Cabinet Member Says Every Effort Is Being Made to Iron Out Defects

WASHINGTON, Dec. 26. (UP)—Charges of inefficiency and lack of efficiency among prohibition law enforcement officers, brought by Senator Borah of Idaho, were answered in a counterstatement issued last night by Attorney General Mitchell.

"I cannot for the honor of decent public servant allow this to pass without proper and a complete charge of indifference to enforcement," Mitchell said, "which has been leveled against United States attorneys, marshals, and other officers of the registration department of justice and appearing in the press this Wednesday morning."

"Challenges Borah Criticisms The statement clearly was aimed at the one legislator who has been in the forefront of the "dry" fight, in which the senator charged that "with the present program, nothing will be accomplished."

"These men are generally known in their own communities as men of integrity and sound judgment, their best to enforce the law," he said. "There has been weak enforcement has been working to eliminate them."

Engineering data having a bearing on the problem of drainage as it is affected by winter canal operation are set forth in a report made to the board of directors of the Twin Falls Canal company by G. D. Lawson, general manager.

"The report was requested by the board to afford a basis for intelligent consideration of the proposal that to the stockholders to disperse with winter operation. In the report the general manager stresses the fact that while the average water table level has been falling and approaching closer to a danger mark in the past, saturation of the soil on this tract is a much slower process than on other projects."

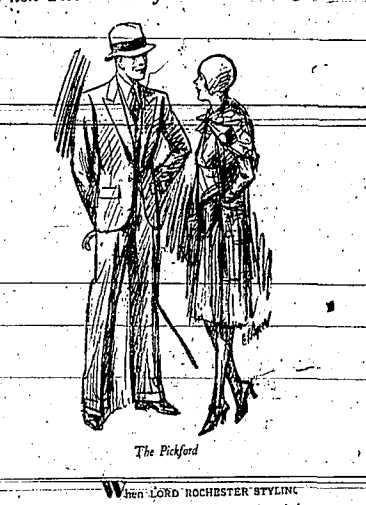

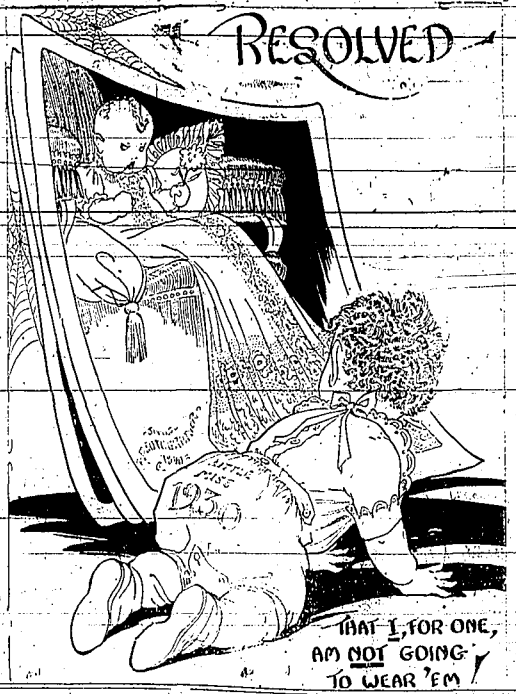

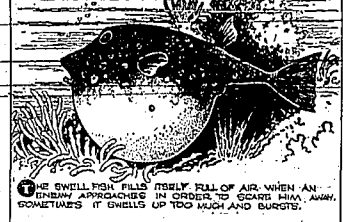
