M. Bleriot,
France's Lindy,
Predicts Planes
Will Fly
700 Miles Per
Hour—Within
The Next
Ten Years and
See Big Strides

PARIS, Feb. 8.—M. Bleriot is just beginning to fly his new plane in the opinion of M. Louis Bleriot, president of the French aviation club, the first man to cross the English Channel, the inventor of the 25 years ago.

He is expected now at a speed of 300 miles an hour, but the distance will not be long in coming when he is able to travel twice that fast, and with fewer risks than now takes in making speed flights. M. Bleriot is reviewing the progress of the new plane, a plane capable of flying 700 miles an hour, and traveling 2,000 miles, the approximate distance around the world, in the amount of 100 hours, in the opinion of M. Bleriot, one of the leading designers and builders of aeroplanes in France, has during the last few days been one of the most successful flyers in aviation. When he made his "historic" flight across the English Channel, it took him only 37 minutes to fly the 21 miles, and today, along the recent 3,000-mile circuit.

M. Bleriot has already taken steps to win international approval of his plan to put up a "world record" for "man against machine" by flying from Paris to London, a distance of 200 miles, in 24 hours.

He is expected to make the trip in a plane which he has designed and constructed himself. The hydroplanes of the past were of various types, but they were not really aeroplanes, and almost no wings. A good aeroplaner would have a machine which would be able to fly in any weather.

"Aviation is evolving toward aeroplanes and engines which are flying more and more rapidly, and which are able to fly in any weather," M. Bleriot said in an interview.

"I believe they will do 1,000 miles an hour when I start to fly in 20 years, and we make good in 10 years," M. Bleriot said.

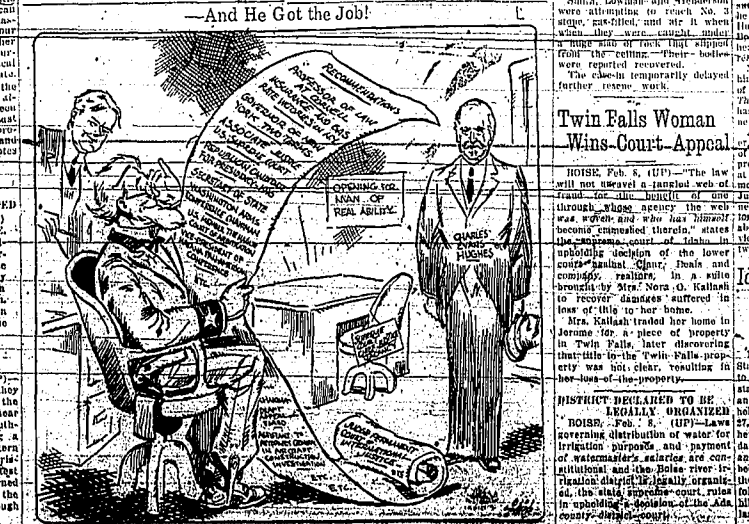

THE BUHL SUGGESTION

The Buhl Chamber of Commerce, through its board of directors has put forward a suggestion that presents great potential possibilities for Idaho. The suggestion is that highway administration in Idaho be put in the hands of a non-political commission of five men to be representatives of as many districts of the state.

Whether the Buhl chamber suggested is not a pertinent question, but the fact remains that by this suggestion it has put its finger on the nerve center of much of this agitation we have been having recently about highway building and highway program. It has indicated an opinion that highway administration in Idaho would be accorded a vast impetus in public confidence if it were divorced from politics.

Everyone in Idaho, or at least a vast majority in this part of Idaho, has been thinking the same thing, and the proposal of the Buhl chamber is a constructive step looking toward creating a setup in highway administration that will have behind it the confidence of the people of the state.

The suggestion of the Buhl chamber is an idea only, not a full grown plan. The details of the plan will have to be evolved as the idea is considered. The Evening Times is of the opinion that two requirements should be laid down as fundamental to the success of this idea:

One is that the men appointed be the biggest men in the state, men of knowledge, vision and such solid worth that they will have to be drafted by public opinion to be available for the task imposed. Idaho has yielded success in real measure to a large number of citizens, and they in turn can not turn a deaf ear to an opportunity of distinguished service for the commonwealth.

Both major political parties should be represented in the membership of this commission.

The second requirement should be that some way be found to secure a designation by the people themselves of what highways are to be constructed and what routes they shall take. Routing of highways by the process of political action is not, and never can be, a success.

Idaho is in neither the mood nor in condition to proceed with additional expenditures of funds for highways right now. Necessity for doing this big job does loom as something that the future must see done. We have had too much policies in highway matters to date, and a necessary change is to secure a plan that will eliminate politics and thereby exist not only the support but also the confidence and enthusiasm of the public.

Our neighboring state of Oregon has tried some plans that Idaho will do well not to emulate, but if that is true it is also unquestionably true that Oregon has lifted its state highway program clear of the impediments of politics. It has a three-man commission. Recently the chairman, a Republican, was sought as a candidate for governor. The one democratic member was also looked upon by leaders in his party as an eminently suitable candidate. Both men rebuffed the makers of these suggestions on the grounds that the state highway commission in Oregon never has been embroiled in politics and that for a mem-

ber to turn his service on the commission to political account would be tantamount to a betrayal of the best traditions established by the Oregon commission.

Such a spirit in Idaho is sorely needed.

BUSINESS CONDITIONS

FOLLOWING IS A RESUME OF CONDITIONS in the twelfth federal reserve district at the end of December, as published in the January report at San Francisco:

Evidence of recession in business activity in the twelfth federal reserve district accumulated during December. Greater than seasonal declines in production were reported for the month and most lines of trade were less active than in November. Changes in the banking and credit situation were noteworthy in that reporting member bank loans continued at high levels during the first two weeks of January, while borrowings from the Federal Reserve Bank of San Francisco declined to the lowest level in recent years.

An encouraging factor in the present business situation is the improved position of agriculture. A preliminary review of the season of 1929-1930 indicates that because of the higher prices received for many agricultural products small yields did not, in the aggregate, result in reduced returns to the farmers of the district. Recent rains have benefited livestock ranges, and have given promise of an adequate supply of soil moisture during the coming season.

During December industrial activity continued the downward trend which began in the late summer of last year. The effect of seasonal decreases in flour-milling and lumber production was accentuated by marked declines in output of many other important industries.

There was a slight increase in retail trade during December, 1929, as indicated by the district department store sales. A substantially decreased volume of trade and inter-declined and foreign figures of earnings on the district's railroads fell off sharply.

The general level of prices of commodities at wholesale was slightly lower in December than in November, and well under December, 1928, and was close to the lowest levels reached since 1922. Among the chief products, the prices of which did not decline during the month, were many of the agricultural products important in this district. Silver prices have recently been at the lowest point of record, and wool prices at the lowest point in seven years.

Total loans of reporting member banks of the district have been at record high levels during the past two months, as a result of the large volume of security loans being carried by the banks. Notwithstanding this record extension of credit by member banks, borrowing from the federal reserve bank has recently been at one of the low points of recent years. Interest rates changed little during the past month.

MONEY AND MORTALS

AIRPLANE TO BE USED IN TAKING PICTURES OF SUN

Dr. H. M. Jeffers awaits solar eclipse so that he may go high in air and record phenomena with a camera.

AN FRANKS, Feb. 7 (AP)—A certain portion of California's abandoned, dark and unutilized air field situated on August 26, 1929, will be used by Dr. H. M. Jeffers to take the pictures of the sun. These aerial pictures from the high altitudes near San Jose, California, will be taken during the total eclipse of the sun on that day for the length of several hours. Jeffers, a well-known astronomer, expects to make an eclipse of the sun.

Dr. Jeffers will be the first to take aerial pictures of the sun. He will use a special camera which is capable of obtaining an altitude of 10,000 feet. 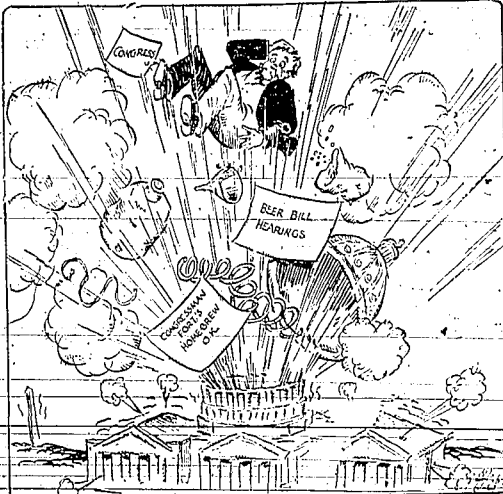

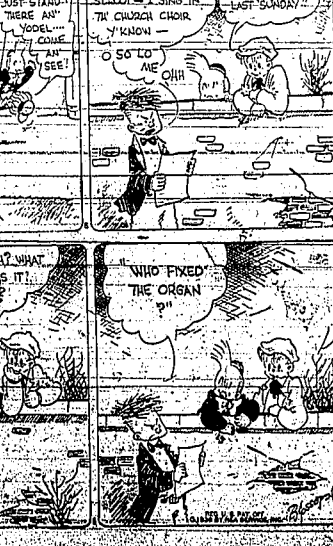

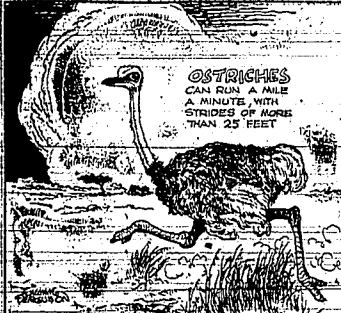
