A FALSE STATEMENT

The Evening Times is in receipt of a typewritten statement, signed "E. M. Holden, democratic chairman," in which the suggestion is made that in the event of a special session of the legislature the governor appoint a non-political board "which shall be vested with full and complete power to plan and execute all highway programs."

The burden of the suggestion meets with the approval of the Executive Times. The same idea occurred to others, as witness the action taken last week by the Bull Chamber of Commerce advocating the creation of a board of five, each member to represent a district of the state. When we get down to brass tacks, the present setup of highway administration in the state of Idaho is an even greater target of the opposition ranks than Britain or the United States possesses. The speeded up program itself, neither could get started to first base in a popularly contest in this part of the state.

But the impatience of the democratic chairman does not indicate possession of any vast amount of political acumen. An effort at this time to make a political issue out of the matter may be sport of the finest kind for the politicians, but such action stands little chance to help the people of the state realize their ambition of getting highways administration out of politics.

For the state democratic leader to meet the titular head of the republican party in the middle of the road and start advising him on how to take highways administration out of politics is just about as sensible a procedure as waving a bright red flag at a gentleman cow. Such action can be interpreted only as meaning that both parties have degenerated in the same degree in that they are so conducting themselves as to insure that highway building will continue to wear a lousy political cloak.

The democrats have an opportunity to assert themselves in due time and to take action that should reflect great credit on their party and enable them to render service of outstanding value to the people of Idaho. But what the democrats should have the gumption to do is, to keep still and let the republican party have every foot of rope it wants. At the present rate it is going, it will do a more artistic and effective job of entangling and hanging itself, if left alone, than any other agency could possibly do.

The Evening Times is not concerned about the welfare of either the republican or democratic party in this state. But between the two of them they furnish the vehicles whereby the people of this state get expression on not only political matters but on economic matters such as highway building. This newspaper would like, as a matter of fact, to see highway administration removed from politics. If the republican party insists on crucifying itself, then the democratic party would have a chance to be Moses. But it should be practicing wisdom in its conduct and not indulging in red flag waving.

THIS SHOULD BE DONE

The intention of the senate lobby investigation committee to turn the searchlight on the methods of the so-called power trust as a part of the sweeping investigations that have been under way is a commendable one. The public has been regaled with rather sweeping statements during recent years as to the methods of the power interests in attaining their ends. Whether the statements are wholly true, partially true, or wholly false the public has no way of knowing. As a matter of common justice to both

the public and the power interests, the truth should be secured. Some time ago an investigation conducted on the West coast divulged the fact that one newspaper man who conducted a news service as a sideline and furnished "reprints" from power interests for the small newspapers had received more than \$75,000 from power interests for publicity services in connection with propaganda he had sent out in the guise of news. If that man was reprehensible to all decent newspaper men, the attitude of the power interests is still quite a little less than fully white.

The level of intelligence among the common people of the United States is sufficiently high for them to be able to appreciate the merits of any given situation if they can acquire the necessary facts relating to it. Both the public and the power interests are entitled to have the full facts known as to how the power trust operates.

WHY JAPAN WANTS BATTLESHIPS

There are a lot of angles to the London naval conference that are being complicated. There is, for instance, the proposal to abolish battleships. Japan objects to this, and until you look into the matter you may find the Japanese objection hard to understand. There is a simple explanation, however, which makes the Japanese position quite logical.

The explanation is this: neither Britain or the United States possesses a naval base in the far east big enough to serve dreadnaughts. As a result, Japan knows that neither nation could ever force a big naval engagement in Japanese waters. Japan, in consequence, is secure from attack. But if all the battleships were abolished, the 10,000-ton cruiser would be the line-of-battle ship; and the British base at Hongkong and the American base at Manila are amply large enough for ships of this class. Under those circumstances, either Britain could hammer a naval base on Japan from a point close to Japanese waters, or Japan, therefore, wants to retain the battleship. Her position is not hard to understand.

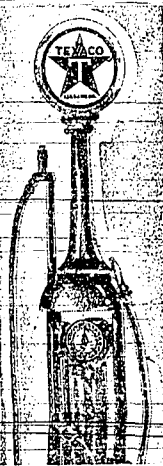

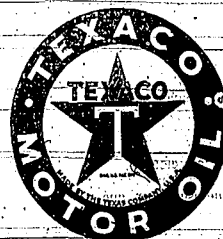
