Investigation of the strike showed that it was the result of a Communist attack on the factory. The Communist leaders are being arrested and the factory is being guarded.

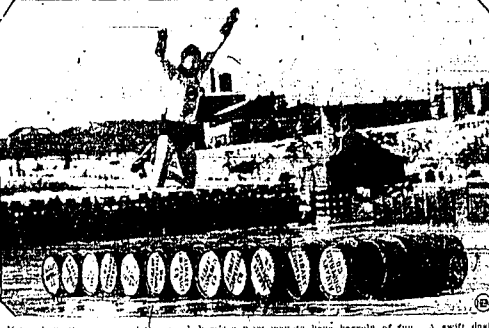
WILDCAT HAS A GOOD CHANCE TO MAKE ADVANCE

It is thought that the shooting of an islander by a white man in a light between Filipino and Mexican laborers which started in the city of Stockton, California, was the cause of the disorders.

At Stockton, a large number of Chinese, Japanese, and Filipino laborers gathered in a public square. A tense situation prevailed. A clash between Japanese and Filipino laborers resulted in a fight. The cause was the marriage of a Canadian Chamber of Commerce.
