CHEMIST LEAVES TRAIL OF CRIME, KILLS EIGHT MEN

James Baker, 25, Confesses to Wholesale Poisoning; Liked to See Victims Suffer and Die—Ho-Tola Police

DETROIT, Mich., Feb. 20 (UP)—Police today had some theory of the story of James Baker, 25, Warren, O., who told officers he had murdered eight men because he "liked to see them suffer and die."

Baker, whom New York police telephoned they wanted for the murder of Henry G. in connection with the murder of the Chicago labor leader, was arrested in a shack five miles west of Detroit yesterday.

He carried a revolver in which were eight bullets.

Carl Polson, Baker's neighbor, told officers, "I always used poison."

Baker claimed to be a chemist. He committed his first murder, he said, in Houston, Tex., 187, year ago, when he dropped poison into the coffee of one "Henry" Galt, a friend. The Galt murder was next to the last; anti-hippies had a rather long history.

"Another father was poisoned at Hamberg and three others on a Standard Oil tanker out of the Gulf of Mexico," Baker said.

"The last killing, he said, occurred in the Philippines."

For the last year, Baker would talk in his living room at the Park Hotel in Detroit.

The offer was made with the understanding that the American Legion will have charge of construction of the building and will hold title to the building.

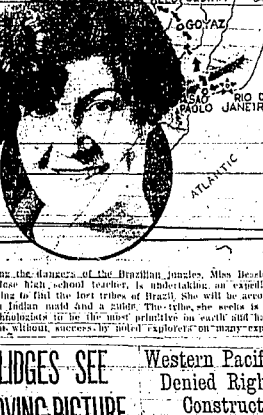

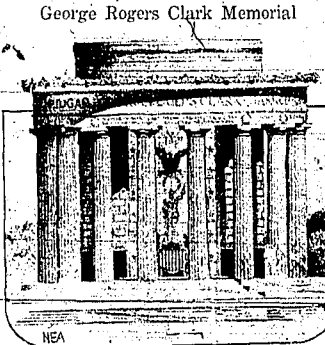

IDAHO POLITICIANS BREWING THEIR MEDICINE

Baker Democrat Herald
 An Idaho daily informs us that the political leaders of the legislature are beginning to get into mindless for the purpose of selecting the state's flag for the various state and county offices. A gathering has been held at Moscow, another at Pocatello, to be followed by a big one at Boise. Our informant comments as follows:

It is there that the decisions will be made. Candidates will be held and traded like the fitness of individuals will be considered in the political propaganda of awarding the faithful and letting geographical position largely dictate who shall hold and who shall not hold any one of our many offices. Still has the convention system for selecting nominees. The people do not choose the political leaders do it for them. And since Idaho is so strongly republican that nomination is usually equivalent to election. It follows that the selection of state and local officials is more the task of politicians than of the people, though the latter have a veto they may use in extreme cases.

As the price goes the general good of the state and the fitness of individuals may easily be lost in the consideration of who is most entitled to the "award" by reason of party factional service in the past, and by distribution of plums according to geographical location. The successful aspirant will owe his position not to the people but to the party he runs. As a result Idaho is governed by a "machine," and will be as long as it retains the present system. Defeat of the republicans would not substitute a democratic machine, a change in personnel, with little difference in the type of management. This is not to say Idaho's government is less efficient, but it must be obvious that it is less democratic and that the people have less control over it. We cannot help liking the Oregon system better. Our officials win their hold on the confidence of the people. They retain them only by holding that confidence. Our system does not tend to foster "machines" or "rings."

NEWS of the suicide of youthful members of society, more frequently heard than the world would like, has a particularly depressing effect on most of us. To witness the surrender to the complexities of life by any person through the means of suicide is a token of defeat we do not like to face, but when defeat is acknowledged by youths of 18 in the action of taking their own lives, we shrink from the implication provided. Boise has had two such cases within the past few weeks.

What the particular circumstances were to cause these youths, or any youths, to pull the curtain of death through their own voluntary acts and thus to end life does not so much matter. The minds that conceive and execute self destruction are morbid minds, minds that fail to see life in its fullness. They may have the courage of temporary madness that enables them to crush life, but they do not have the poise and courage to see their problems through and to utilize the good things of life to fashion their own individual salvations.

Life is made to be a too complex pattern by most of us, and to youth it is often apparently more forbiddingly complex than adults can, or do, realize. We should keep life simple, direct and wholesome. Life whips us all in greater or less degree, and if all of us, adults and youth alike, pause at intervals to ask what it is all about, and if it is required that we accept its challenges with courage and that we fill our places to the best of our ability,

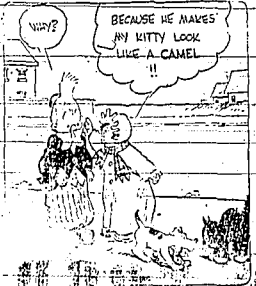
