STATE PENITENTIARY, PHOENIX, Ariz., Feb. 21 (UP)—The first woman ever to be executed by the state of Arizona—Mrs. Eva Dugan—was hanged on the gallows here today. After being dragged in a cart to the gallows she made a last look at the crowd and then stepped through the trap door.

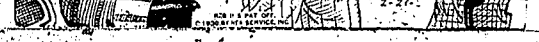

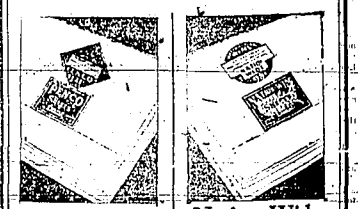

LEST WE FORGET
 THE project of securing the public subscription of funds needed to construct the American Legion memorial building on which solicitation started today has a wide and deep appeal.

The building sought will accomplish many things for us. Its construction is made imperative at this time in order to meet the demands of the federal government for adequate housing of the \$60,000 worth of property and equipment used by Co. F, 116th Engineers, our unit of the national guard.

Put in another way, one of the reasons for providing a \$20,000 structure is that a safe place may be assured for the keeping of these things that value of federal property which is required by the needs of self defense.

Some of the contributions made in the past to the American Legion building fund were submitted with the understanding that the money be spent in providing a public auditorium of sufficient size to serve conventions which in the past have been prevented from meeting in Twin Falls because of inadequate auditorium facilities.

Thus we have good and sufficient reasons from a practical point of view why we should subscribe \$10,000 for this project.

But, there are such sound causes for the expenditure from reasons of expediency, the deepest appeal of all lies in the fact that the building will be a modest memorial to the gallant group of patriots whose lives were yielded up in the service of country in the late war.

Forty-two men from Twin Falls county died in the service of this country. Nearly all of them were young men, mere boys as age is computed, yet they paid with the supreme sacrifice of young life itself. No one may question their devotion. Its measure has been expressed with an eloquence that defies mere words to convey. They are above and beyond any praise we may offer them.

THE RAILWAY SITUATION
 PROGRESS made to date in the movement to secure extension westward of the Minidoka-Buhl branch railroad offers encouragement to those who have been hoping for years to see a realization of the advantages that would accrue to this part of Idaho by building of the extension.

The response to the work by the joint committee from Buhl and Twin Falls from other interested communities has been very satisfactory. Members of that body declared in a brief meeting held here Wednesday evening. The efforts in behalf of the project have been carried on quietly without any fanfare of trumpets, and according to the plan being followed some little additional time will be required before the foundations of the enterprise will have been sufficiently established to permit of definite announcements of progress made and action contemplated.

But the good work proceeds, and the thoughts and energies of communities are definitely being harnessed to secure the extension. We should not have much longer to wait until we begin getting action on the program. We have dreamed of this extension for years and have waited long for the opportunity to make an organized effort to get it. That time rapidly approaches.

MAKING A REAR RESPECTABLE

THE London conference has agreed on rules to humanize submarine warfare. Submarines, it is agreed, are to be subject in their attacks on merchant ships to the same rules that apply to surface vessels; they are not to sink without warning, and they are always to make sure that passengers and crew are safely embarked in lifeboats, with help near at hand, before firing their torpedoes.

All of this sounds very nice, and Secretary Stimson is quoted as saying that this agreement alone was worth the trip to London. Possibly he is quite right; yet there seems to be something very futile about this business of devising rules for war, so that it can be "civilized" and "human." Does anyone suppose that in a major war all combatants would scrupulously observe these rules?

War is a dreadful thing and needs to be abolished. Cooking up regulations to make it respectable seems a pointless sort of job, at best. But it is a step in the right direction.

Best Editorial of the Day

THE ROAD TO THE MILKY WAY
 Christian Science Monitor
 If all the words which have ever been written upon the subject of prohibition were piled up and finally, with great exertion, piled up upon each other, they would easily reach from Twin Falls to the Milky Way. Yet not everything has been said upon this fascinating subject, and with the influence of our readers we should like to add a few hundred words more to this literary trek.

It seems that Mrs. Charles H. Sablin, chairman of the Women's Organization for National Prohibition Reform has been lately engaged in a little work with Louise A. Schuler, editor of the Ladies' Home Journal, who was "proud to present" through this publication a record of the fact that prohibition is unquestionably an economic success.

It was an impressive record, a detailed and well-documented record, a record of exhaustive direct and indirect evidence which has nowhere been refuted nor seriously challenged. But Mrs. Sablin pushes the economic benefits of prohibition into a detail of time-consuming detail, the detail of justice before American women as the justification of prohibition.

Many distinguished American women active in both social work and public affairs, have already answered Mrs. Sablin through the columns of The Christian Science Monitor with an avalanche of opposing arguments and dissenting opinions—dissenting opinions based upon first-hand experience. The commentator very respectfully observes that the economic benefits of prohibition "materialize" as he argues as it is to describe poverty as a blessing. Others aver that to enjoy a longer measure of the necessities and comforts of life is to receive an invaluable impetus to moral and law-abiding citizenship.

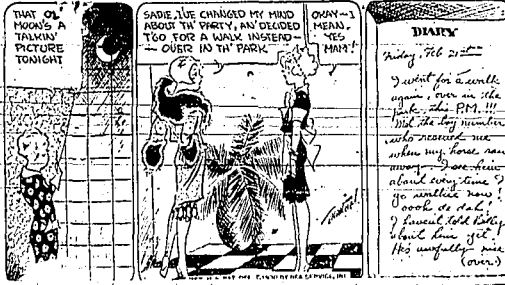
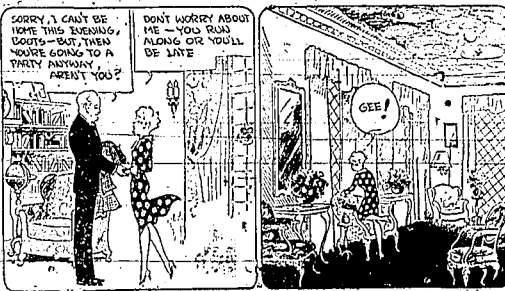

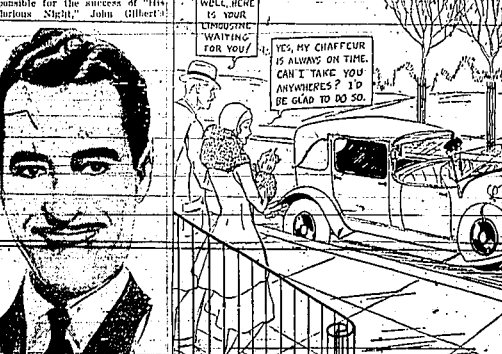
