NEW YORK, Feb. 28. (AP)—The St. Louis Cardinals have 16 new players on their 1930 squad but only five of them are stars among the Red Birds.

The 16 newcomers follow: Bob Carter, first baseman; Bob Morrow, George O'Neil, Pete Pitches, Herman Hill, Pete Fowler, at first base; Jim Lindsek, Andy Messenker, Phil Thom, Bob MacDraw.

Infielders—Earl Adams, Joe Hunt, Eddie Delker.

Outfielders—Max Flader, John Martin, Homer Bell.

All except Hunt, Fowler, Messenker, Morrow and O'Neil have worn a St. Louis uniform before. Hunt, a former Texas A. & M. football star, will compete with Charley Heistler for the shortstop job.

Messenker, drafted from the Wichita Falls Texas League club, won 16 games and lost 18 games last season. Fowler, a southpaw, obtained from the Boston International League club, won 16 and lost 12.

Morrow batted .293 for the Rochester International League club and O'Neil batted .282 for the Louisville American league club. They are both batters.

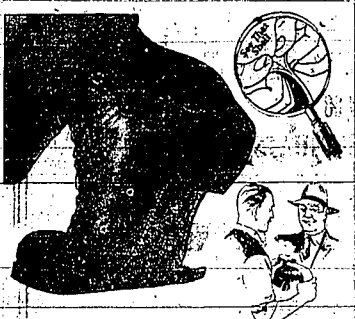

## The Daily Poem

### COMMON SENSE NEEDED

THE need for a setup in highway administration which will inspire confidence in the minds of the people of Idaho, vividly demonstrated by recent discussions of highway matters as a result of the state administration's efforts to speed up the highway program, should be satisfied.

The task is so big and complex that it can not be performed over night. Even with serious consideration on the part of men who will take the required time to study this important problem, it is probable that anywhere from one to three years will be necessary to do the preliminary work before legislation adequate to put highway administration on a sound basis inspiring confidence can be secured. But let the time and study required be what they may, this task must be done in behalf of Idaho. The people of the state are demanding that Idaho have an intelligent program of highway administration with a divorce from political considerations.

The argument may be made that highway building has always been a political football in Idaho and that it is impossible to get the matter out of politics. Such a confession of weakness is a reflection on the fundamental integrity of the state. There can be no argument over the contention that highway building and administration have been in politics. That's the trouble. But to contend that it is impossible to remove the politics and substitute good business and a sensible plan adequate to deal fairly with all the interests of the state is just plain foolishness.

This job can be done. It is a grave indictment against the state that the present condition was ever permitted to reach its present aggravated status. But if a serious mistake has been made and since this mistake must be provided with a remedy, common sense dictates that the remedy be made available.

We keep our schools out of politics. We lacked the vision to keep our highway problem out of politics. The common sense procedure now is to take the politics out of highway building and to substitute therefor a sound, carefully worked-out, comprehensive plan embodied in law to protect the people and the investment they have in highways as well as the heavy additional investments that are to be required of them in the future.

### ABOUT BOULDER DAM

FOLLOWING are some facts about Boulder dam presented to the membership of a local service club by C. L. Smith, Twin Falls farmer who is also an engineer:

The dam authorized under certain conditions to be built will be on the Colorado river which has a drainage area of 250,000 square miles. The river has a fall of 8,000 feet and carries a heavy burden of silt.  
The Colorado now irrigates two and

a half million acres of land, and the water supply is adequate to irrigate an additional five million acres.  
Boulder Canyon act provides for creation of a reservoir to impound not less than 20 million acre feet of water and a power house, as well as all American canal. The bill also provides for sale by the government at the switchboard of the power generated in the big plant below the dam. Electricity thus to be generated must be sold under the guidance of the secretary of the interior under 50 year contracts for enough to retire all costs within 50 years.

The dam as planned is to be 675 feet high, will impound 26 million acre feet of water in a reservoir that will be 115 miles long.

First actual construction work, according to plans, is to be of four diversion tunnels, two in the rim rock on either side of the river. These tunnels will divert the water of the river while construction of the dam is in progress. They will be plugged when the reservoir is put into use.  
The big all American canal, 70 miles long, presents many engineering problems and will require machinery larger and of greater capacity than any now in operation.

Cost of the dam will be 70 millions, of the power house more than 28 millions, and of the canal more than 28 millions which with interest charges will bring the entire charges up to 165 millions.

### GOOD OLD CHICAGO

A GANGSTER confined to a room in a Chicago hospital was visited by enemy gunmen. Some 30 or 40 shots were exchanged in the unequal battle before the gunmen retired. The gangster in the hospital suffered three wounds during the shooting. Other patients in the hospital were frightened, some of them to such an extent that they jumped from their beds and ran until exhausted.

Good old Chicago! Common sense would indicate that one could lead just about any sort of life one desired in Chicago from the calmest to the wildest. But the gangsters are hard-pressed by the desire for revenge when they invade hospitals.

Of course, we need to remember that gangsters are barbarians.

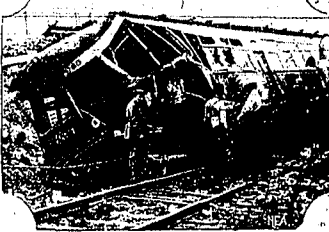
SIMPLE, PEACE-LOVING RUSSIA.

Red Russia acts according to form. It confutes charges, persecutes religion and propagates atheism. When Christian Europe tests, it declares this another attack of the capitalist world on the communist heaven, where the bread line forms daily and where money is valued only twice a week. The communist outfit in Berlin fires up their weakness to find whereupon the public crack the five trillion marks, and this is another attack by the millions of capitalist on the gentle proletariat. The leader of the white Russians in Paris disapproves and is believed to have been kidnapped by the Reds and imprisoned in the obnoxious. A march is set on the building and search is demanded. But indignation is expressed at the threatened violence of diplomatic immunity.

Only the red side of these stories is told in Russia to convince the people that Europe in concert intends to inaugurate other economic measures or military attack against the soviet. Therefore the ranks of the red army must be well-disciplined, must be maintained and the minds of red soldiers must be kept inflamed with the propaganda of the Russian people kept in ignorance of events in the outer world, of the attitude and policy of other nations toward the soviet. They are fed with reports of widespread poverty and distress in Europe and America at the very time when Europe is making steady progress in economic recovery all for the purpose of contrast with the conditions that prevail under soviet rule. Thus the impression is fostered that the hungry millions of capitalist nations will descend on Russia and destroy it.

While this picture is displayed to the red army and to the workmen and peasants in order to keep up their fighting spirit, a very different picture is presented to other nations. At the preparatory disarmament conference in Russia presented a complete plan for drastic disarmament of all nations in which she would join. The Russian delegation were shocked when the plan was coldly received. Knowing that it is a matter of principle with soviet Russia not to keep a promise or to respect a treaty with a capitalist nation, the conference did not accept this demonstration of bolshevik pacifism. To have done so would have made the way easy for the world revolution, which is the goal of bolshevik hope.

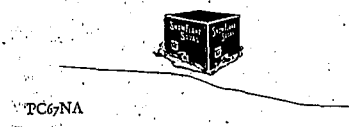
