THE CUTOFF WOULD HELP

A RESIDENT of Buhl was in the Evening Times office the other day, and during the course of a conversation he expressed a lively interest in the work done by this newspaper looking toward construction of the Minidoka-Buhl extension to the main line.

"Several years ago I shipped quite a lot of livestock from Buhl," this man said. "On more than one occasion I have left Buhl with a carload of hogs on the morning freight bound for Portland. Quite often if business was rushing it would be almost night before we got out of Twin Falls. We usually made better time after we got out of Twin Falls, but several times I fed hogs at Glenns Ferry because my 36-hour limit had been reached by the time I had reached there."

In other words, due to the necessity of shipping westbound freight, doka and thence west, it required 36 hours for a livestock shipper to get as far west as Glenns Ferry. Bear in mind that this time was slowed up materially by reason of the fact that the haul was made by local freight as far east as Minidoka. The fact still remains that because of the preliminary haul east to reach the main line, most of the 36 hours was spent going east, or away from the shipping destination.

By highway it is 72 miles from Twin Falls to Glenns Ferry, and from Buhl to it is only 56 miles to the first feeding stop this shipper had to make. In other words he spent 36 hours getting 56 miles nearer market than he had when he left home!

This is only one example of the disadvantage which this rich district of Idaho faces on westbound railroad transportation. The westbound haul for Twin Falls county shipping points would be shortened an average of 100 miles to tidewater by extension of the Minidoka-Buhl branch to the main line. In other words, we could have a railroad distance of 600 miles to Portland by construction of the cutoff, instead of the present distance of 701 miles.

Irrespective of the saving in rate to shippers that might be effected by the direct connection westward with the main line, the added convenience which in the case of livestock shipments means money by reason of saved time, would be a boon. A direct connection would also add easily to the convenience of passengers bound west. As it is now, there are few families which do not buy passenger tickets from either Bliss or Shoshone at some time during the year or which do not take friends in their car to one of these points to make direct main line connections.

A GOOD SHOWING

SINCE the first of the year, country children who bring cold lunches to schools in Twin Falls have had the opportunity of hot lunches in the three grade buildings, Bickel, Lincoln and Washington. The work is under the auspices of the Parent-Teacher association.

For the price of 20 cents per pupil per week, it is possible for the children who bring lunches to have a hot dish to supplement their own food. This added dish may be a vegetable soup, cocoa, or some other nourishing food. Its particular virtue is that it is warm.

The P. T. A. offered to furnish the hot dish free to any children not able to pay 20 cents a week. The funds for supplying the needs of children in this category were procured from the association's share of proceeds from health seals during the Christmas season.

The popularity of the hot lunch service is attested by the fact that approximately 200 pupils have availed themselves of it. Of this number, about one fourth, or approximately 50, have had the hot lunch by reason of the funds of the association. The larger number appreciated it sufficiently that they paid for it.

Next year the present plan is to extend this feature to include pupils in the junior and senior high schools. The new gymnasium-auditorium will be available as a place for serving the lunch. Those in charge of the work declare that the hot lunches have been practically self-supporting, except for the contribution from the association for those not able to pay. Interested country people have contributed supplies for the lunches in several instances.

This is good work. The fact that a great majority of present day adults may have managed to attain their growth on the cold lunches of their schooldays does not detract from the value and advisability of hot lunches for the present generation of school boys and girls. Dairy cows used to give little milk in the winter and "pickled up" only when grass came, and hogs laid most of their eggs in the spring. This is a newer and better day.

A WAY TO HELP

THE campaign to produce the necessary funds to insure construction of the American Legion memorial building goes slowly ahead. The various teams on the big committee are doing the work as rapidly as they can find the time, and a very good start has been made.

Some of those whose contributions are likely to be relatively heavy are out of town. The solicitation in a sense awaits them.

The wide appeal such a memorial has affords plenty of reasons why everyone should have a part in making this project a reality. A movement has been started for group contributions. Employees of a company may well make up a purse for the memorial campaign. Some groups have already done this. The idea has much to commend it and affords everyone an opportunity to be represented in giving without working a hardship on any. There should be many such group gifts.

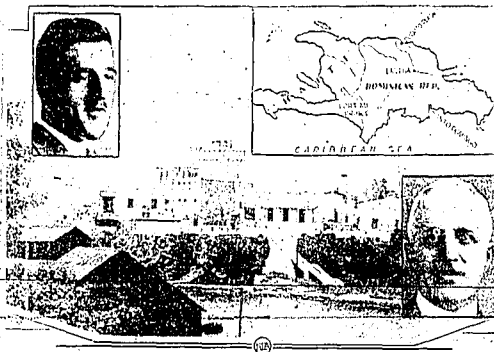
